

The plane quickly rolled to a stop and we descended with our hand luggage. We were met at the door by Jonathan and Kefa, our drivers and guides for our stay at the Mara Safari Club. Our luggage was quickly unloaded and transferred to the Land Rovers. Traveling with Jeanie is a lot of fun. She and Jonathan were good friends and we were warmly welcomed by Jonathan and by Lucy, the entertainment director of the Safari Club. It was Lucy's job to make sure we enjoyed our stay at the Club. Lucy and the rest of the staff excelled at their jobs. Jeanie had said we would receive a large amount of pampering here and as usual Jeanie understated the amount of pampering

Jeanne's favorite driver at the Mara Safari Club was Jonathan. Jonathan stood about 6'3" and had a very lean muscular body. His appearance was not quite so noticeable when he wore his guide's uniform complete with leather vest, but when he wore his Masai warrior clothes he was very striking looking. After a long conversation with Jonathan we found out that he worked three

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weeks (twenty one days in a row) then was off for seven days. Jonathan would leave the drivers' quarter and walk for over forty miles which would take him about half day to get to his home. We found this very difficult to believe but we did know he could move fast. Even though he was well acquainted with the two cultures, he insisted that his family live in the Masai village so they would learn and understand their culture.

After a short drive, we came to the steel gates that guarded the entrance to the Club. An armed guard greeted us and opened the gates so we could pass through. The short trip was filled with Jeanie, Lucy and Jonathan catching up on one another's lives since last year. It really was a delightful ride and a fitting prelude to our stay. As usual we arrived in time for lunch. We were escorted through the entrance to the club and proceeded to a table complete with table cloth and silver next to the swimming pool. Large trees shaded much of the pool and our table. After another meal fit for a king, we were given our tent numbers. Our


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heavier luggage had already been placed in our tents. Now we are ready to be pampered", said Jeanle.

Pampered in tents? Well, you should see the tents. The front porch of our tent was a few feet from the Mara River. We would stand on our porch and see the hip-popotamus basking in the sun while mostly submerged in the river. We were in tent #20 and the hippos were in front of tent #16. We had a very good view of the hippos and probably better than people in tent #16 in that we had no trees in our way. As we unzippered the mosquito netting and entered into the tent, it was if we entered another world. All of the windows were rolled open and a nice breeze kept the interior very cool. The large canopied beds on either side of the tent had mosquito netting all around

them. There was an oriental rug separating the two beds. Our luggage was sitting on luggage stands in the foyer of the tent ready for us to unzip. Farther in past the bed at the head of one of the beds there was a chifforobe complete with coat hangers waiting for our clothes to be hung up. On the opposite side was a complete vanity with a comfortable padded stool. At the end of the tent was the bathroom, complete with marble fixtures and vanity type wash basin. We were somewhat disappointed about not having a bathtub but the well appointed large shower was much more practical. We had only a few minutes to arrange our luggage and it was time to do our first game run in the Mara. With hippos at your front door all day we were looking forward to this new experience.

We met our drivers and the rest of the crew along with most of the guests of the Safari Club at the main entrance." We quickly found our vans and divided ourselves among the two drivers. Since there were two couples and Jeanie almost



always rode with Jonathan, the two couples swapped between the two vehicles to give everyone a chance to visit with both of the driver. Kela was new to Jeanie, so we did not know too much about him. He proved to have excellent animal sense and many times while were were at the Mara he maneuvered our land rover in perfect position before any of us saw the game. Usually our two vans stayed fairly close together, but sometimes we were not within evesight of one another.

Our first game run was exceedingly profitable. We saw countless varieties and arge numbers of each species. One of the highlights of the first evening was seeing a mother cheetah hunting dinner with her four cubs. These cubs were almost full grown, but not quite as mature as the family we had seen at Samburu. We were parked in a good position where we were able to watch the entire stalk and attempted kill. While the mother was stalking some gazelies; an impala almost walked over her. While the mother obviously welcomed dinner dropping in, she was unprepared and made a poor attempt at the kill. After the initial miss, the chase was fruitless. This was our first time we were aware of Kefa's knack for reading animals. He started the Land Rover and drove about a guarter mile and came to a stop in a small open field surrounded by

We had no sooner come to a stop, when the mother cheetah, completely out of breath and with a huge green grass stain on her left cheek, staggered out of the bushes. Cheetahs are very fast and can run up to 70 mph but only for a short distance. (around a quarter mile or less) They get so exhausted that it takes about two hours from them to recuperate. The cheetah slowly made her way to a mound of dirt right next to our Land Rover. She climbed up and plopped down. She lay there for over ten minutes breathing very deep and rapidly. She was completely tuckered out. The cameras were clicking

and the camcorders were recording almost every movement. It almost seemed as if she was posing for the cameras. After about ten to fifteen minutes she raised her head and mewed much like a house cat. About thirty seconds she repeated the sound. Soon all four of her offspring came silently out of the bush and gathered around her. After a few moments, the mother got up and led her four young to another site where she would try one more time to get dinner. It was fairly late and she might have missed her chance for the day. Every evening at the Mara Safari Club

there was some kind of entertainment for the guests. On our second night the entertainment was Jonathan, dressed in a Masai warrior's attire complete with spear. Jonathan seemed twice as big standing as he had previously sitting behind the wheel of the van. Jonathan gave a very polished slide presentation explaining life in a Masai village. Jonathan spoke perfectly in the King's English. He used Swahili only when it was appropriate. The setting for the slides was his village. Some of the photos were of him and his family. The next day back in uniform, we could hardly believe it was the same person. Their customs are centered around cattle, sheep and goats. They are shepherds that build semi-permanent villages to live in while they graze their livestock in a particular area. Their houses are built of a stick frame work covered with cow dung. If the roof were to leak, they would just plaster fresh cow dung in the vicinity of the leak. Their villages consist of houses built in a circle enclosing a corral for the livestock. The cattle are kept inside of the houses to protect them from large members of the cat family. Needless to say, we would think their dusty, dirty accommodations lacked a lot. Modern conveniences there usually consisted of a single flash light per family. A man can have more than one wife. Each wife much build a house for herself and her children. Each house has a separate room for the a gate so if you see three houses and a gate followed by two more houses and a gate, the first man had three wives and the second man had two wives. Most of their food and livelihood are derived from the livestock. From the dung houses to their meals, no part of the animal was wasted. Milk was also a main staple. Twice on our trips in the Mara, we came across a large herd of elephants. What we finally decided was that we had seen two different groups, the first group had more than thirty members. The second was much larger. The first time we saw elephants at the Mara was on a section of rolling hills. Everywhere we would look, we would see elephants grazing. It was close to lunch time for us and the elephants flowed around us eating as they went. We saw this group or another one or more other times. The last times we saw the elephants was in a open

Weight-Lifting Builds More Than Muscles In Older Women

Family & Consumer Sciences Strength training has traditionally

been associated with young men, but now it also is being recommended for older women. Research reported in the Spring 1995 issue of Nutrition Updates on strength training in women (ages 50-70) shows benefits in increasing hip bone density, increasing muscle mass and

strength, decreasing fat and improving balance. These improvements help prevent falls and broken bones, a debilitating problem for older women.

Once women are over 40, they can get estogen replacement therapy, but they can't replace bone mass already lost. Weight training leads to increased muscle mass, resulting in greater muscle stamina, greater ability to retain oxygen levels in the muscle tissues, and a decreased risk of bone fracture. Aerobic exercise also is beneficial for the cardiovascular system. It keeps the muscles strong and deters the weight gain common in aging individuals. Walking, climbing stairs and gardening are examples of aerobic exercise that benefit older adults. Check with your doctor before starting a new exercise program. Begin slowly and increase your time and activity level.

Recommendations for strength training for older adults:

*Try to exercise three or four, times per week.

*Choose a weight that you can lift 8 to 12 repetitions.

*Make sure the weight you choose is 80 percent of the heaviest. weight you can lift one time. For example, if you can lift 30 pounds one time, then 80 percent of that would be (30 x .080) - 24 pounds. *Keep retrying your strength on

the heaviest weight that you can lift as time passes.

*Warm up and stretch for at least 10 minutes to prevent injury.

*In the beginning concentrate on muscles in the shoulder, arms and." thighs.

*Alternate the muscle groups that you exercise. Exercise the upperbody muscles during one session. and lower-body muscles the next.

*Perform strength building movements slowly. Take 6 to 9 seconds per each repetition. Rest for a few seconds between each lift. *Inhale before you lift, exhale as.

you lift, and then inhale again as you lower the weight.

The potential for healthy. longevity is within each person-----but each person must accept the challenge of making it work for them.

Our most interesting viewing at the Mara centered around the lions. You might ask after seeing a herd of one hundred elephants what was so special about the lions. Early one morning we drove to a distant area. As we drove out of the small trees, we saw hundreds of zebras standing in a straight line all facing a point in the brush near where we had emerged. We were too fascinated to take pictures let along try to coun the zebras. Our driver made a small circle and pulled into the bush just beyond the point where the zebras seemed to be look-ing. We found four male lions sitting in the tail grass watching the zebras watch them. Farther out in the field we saw a large number of wildebeests who seemed to be obvious of the young lions. Most of the lions we saw in the Mara, however, were adult males and female pairs seriously engaged in the mating season. We saw very many couples at various points on our travels. We would love to go back in September or October to see the hundreds of lion cubs. Maybe our vans were invisible, but it did not appear that our presence slowed the couples at all. The drivers told us repeatedly that the animals were used to the vans and didn't pay any attention to them. However, if a person were to leave the van, they would really be noticed. All the people in our crews had been told to be very still and quiet while we

or the mud. But what do hippos eat and when? Every evening near dusk, the hippos at the Mara climbed the steep banks of the river and begin grazing in the lush pastures, The hippos may wander as much as ten miles from the river getting their daily supply of grasses. Since there are many evening predators, how do the hippos protect themselves from the lions and leopards? no as bi ing as they are, the a little or no trouble. Only the young ones are susceptible to the predators. The larger animals form a circle around the smaller ones while they are grazing and move very close to the young ones in case of an attack. From the number of lions and hippos we saw, it appeared that the lions found easier game than young hippos. While we were at the Mara, we were delighted to wake up between four and five in the morning to the sound of hippos coming back to the river after a night of grazing, that is if you didn't mind missing your sleep.



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field and the two groups were joining together greeting one another as they passed. We learned a lot of patience on our safari and this was one of our better examples. We sat for almost one hour watching the young frolic together, occasionally taking breaks to nurse, while the older ones caught one another up on the happenings since the last time they met.

We may be imagining things by watching them, but their behavior gave a strong case that they were really greeting one another. A similar occurrence happened the first morning we saw lions. Two small half grown lions were slowly making their way across an open field. They met up with an almost grown male lion but who had not grown his mane yet, being about one year old. They were evidently from the same pride because they playfully greeted one another. We saw the same type of behavior in Tanzania when two full grown male lions danced a little jig and rolled around in the grass when they first met. Our Masai warrior drivers pointed out these animal interactions when we questioned them. We never did see two sets of unfriendly animals except for cats looking for something to eat.

On one of our final game runs at the Mara we drove half way up one of the nearby foothills to see our first white rhinos. All of the rhinos in Kenya have been killed by poachers for their valuable horns. People in the far east believe that the horn has great medicinal powers. Whether it does or not is debatable but it seems such a waste to kill such a large animal for just the horn leaving the rest of the body to rot. Kenya has acquired eight white rhinos from South Africa. They have built large wooden stockades that are electrified. During the day, the Masai warriors accompanied by soldiers with Uzis take the minos out of the stockade and let them graze among the lush grass nearby. In the evening they are brought back into the stockade with the guards patrolling all night. At the stockade we saw a mother with the latest addition to the Kenya herd, a two week old male was running around the stockade under the watchful eyes of his mother and other armed guards. The little rhino had not yet formed much of a horn, but they were keeping a close eye on both he and his mother.


