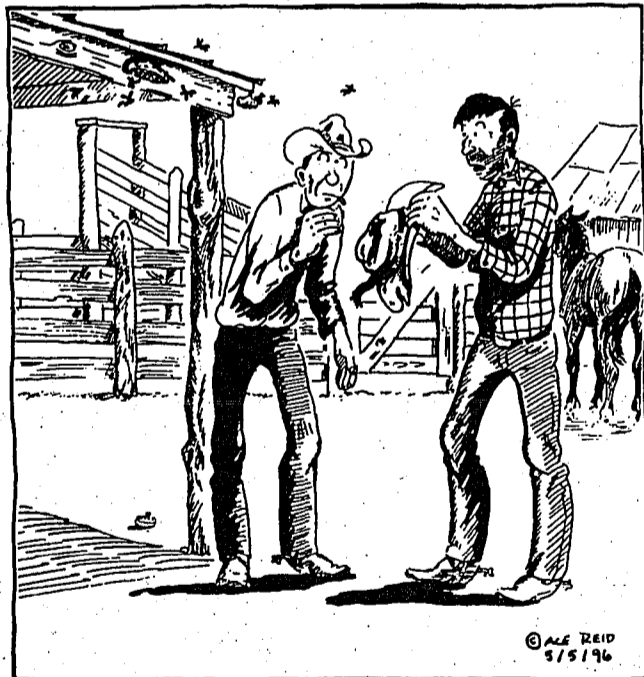

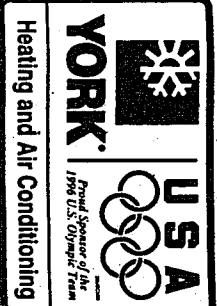

On An African Safari

By David and Margaret Karthäuser

We drove on and on, too fast at times for the rough roads. It soon became dark and only the lights of our three vans supplemented the starlight as we drove through the countryside. It got later and later and darker and darker and the fabulous box lunch at 2:30 this afternoon was already gone and all of us became hungry. You sort of sneak into Arusha at night in there are no street lights and very little electricity outside of the hotels and public buildings. We could see an occasional kerosene lantern with thirty to forty people gathered around it. Some of these places were homes and others appeared to be stores. Sometimes the only light was from the fires that were roasting corn and other vegetables and some meat that street vendors were selling. Their smells didn't help our hungry crew. The roads in Arusha were among the hardest hit, so our progress was painfully slow. Finally after much twisting and turning we drove up to the front of an electrified building. The lights reached up five or six stories. We had finally arrived the Hotel in Arusha.

We went through the normal procedure when we arrived at the hotel. Our large luggage was taken to our room and we took our hand luggage. Since it was close to 9 p.m., we quickly washed some of the Tanzanian roads from us and hurried to the dining room. At this time of night, neither of us felt that we could eat a big meal and sleep so we opted for soup, salad and fruit. The meal looked scrumptious but at 9 p.m., it wasn't real exciting. We ate and visited and then quickly returned to our rooms.

If you ever stay at this hotel make sure when you make reservations specify you want in the new

wing. Somehow our reservations for the new wing were ignored and most of us found ourselves in the old wing. It was clean, neat and comfortable but it did lack a little in aesthetics and we wished for our humble tent at the Mara Safari Club. Everything was fine in the room, but the bath lacked a lot. The basic design of the bathroom was the major problem. The shower, the toilet and the wash basin were all arranged together so that you could use the toilet while taking a shower or washing your hands. With a little bit of scheduling we were able to overcome most of the obstacles. The one obstacle that we could not avoid was that when the occupants of the floor directly above us took a shower, so did we. We called the front desk and the management agreed that the plumbing repair from earlier that day wasn't complete. We found out the next day that Cathy and Christy occupied the room above us and we had fun telling them we knew when they had the shower on. Needless to say that this was the low point of our entire trip and everyone including the hotel apologized profusely for this inconvenience that will "never happen again" and we believe that they were all sincere. I think the main problem was that we had been so spoiled at the Mara that anything could not have measured up to that experience. Since we were going to have to be under way by 7 a.m., it would be a short night anyway.

We were up before 6 a.m. and had a wonderful multi-course breakfast. The breakfast would compare with any of the places we had been so far with a large variety of selections. The mood at the breakfast table was much more somber than usual.

The late arrival and the fun filled rooms were the main contributors. Our luggage was picked up at the door as usual and we carried our hand luggage down and distributed ourselves among the three vans. We headed southwest from the center of Arusha to the outskirts. Our progress was extremely slow due to the bad roads and the extreme congestion on the roads. We drove on semi-paved roads until it was time to stop for refueling. This refueling was the normal fun filled adventure with the vendors vying for our dollars. The price of the goods was very reasonable and a lot of T-shirts

and other gifts were purchased. Within a mile after leaving the gas station we turned to the west and soon left the last paved road. The drive was at a very high rate of speed and appeared to be faster than the roads warranted. We seemed to bounce from one side of the road to the other. Fortunately, there was not too much traffic, so the drivers were able to select the smoothest part of the road independent of the direction. The roads were very dusty so the drivers of our three vehicles left a large gap between cards to help minimize the amount of dust that we inhaled. About ten o'clock that morning, we drove into a little town that we very heavily damaged by the heavy rains and the smaller river on the west side of town. A large portion of the road

shore. We were not able to spot the hippos and other animals that some saw. After a brief stop which included some picture taking, we reluctantly got back in the vans for the rest of our bumpy trip. Even with a snack of bananas we were getting quite hungry as it was past noon.

It was very chilly as we got out of the vans at Ngorongora Lodge. We had an excellent view of the crater to the west of us. Almost as far as the eye could see we could see the rim of the crater from the north rim arcing to where we were standing and on to the south of us. Faintly in the distance to the west we could see the western rim. We only had a few minutes to freshen up before we entered the dining room. A large table was reserved

the park, we traveled up a fairly good sized wooded hill. As we got to the top we could see the road stretching out toward the west without even a tree in sight. We immediately guessed that we had a long way to go. The roads in the park were in much better condition than the road outside the park. Our drivers may have started driving a little bit faster, but we didn't seem to notice as the roads were so much smoother we seemed to float over the road.

Ever since we had crossed the Tanzanian border, we were on a game run. Except for one or two small villages we passed through, game could be observed on both sides of the road. We had seen genueks between the border and Arusha as well as giraffes and all forms of antelopes. And we had seen a very large group of baboons as we climbed up from the Ngorongora crater. As soon as we entered the park, the wildlife became very numerous. In the eastern part of the park the main inhabitants were many varieties of antelopes, the most numerous were the Thompson's gazelles and Grant's gazelles. The time seemed to pass much quicker but as the sun began to set, we saw a large outcropping of rocks looming ahead in the roadway.

One of the major features of the Serengeti are the kopjes, granite outcroppings that are home to many animals. Frequently there appeared to be a large mound of rocks that appeared to rise out of the otherwise flat plain. Some of the boulders were over forty feet in diameter. At first they were not too noticeable but after seeing a few, we began to see very many of these irregularities. Our guides had informed us that the lions used these as their homes. The tops of some of these kopjes were almost fifty feet above the plain and the top served as an outlook. The lionesses could look out and find out where the closest grocery store was. After telling us about the kopjes, our drivers pulled their vans up in front of our lodge that was built around one of the biggest kopjes in the area. The dining room of the hotel was built in the old lion's den. We all hoped that this was a people dining room and not a lion's restaurant.

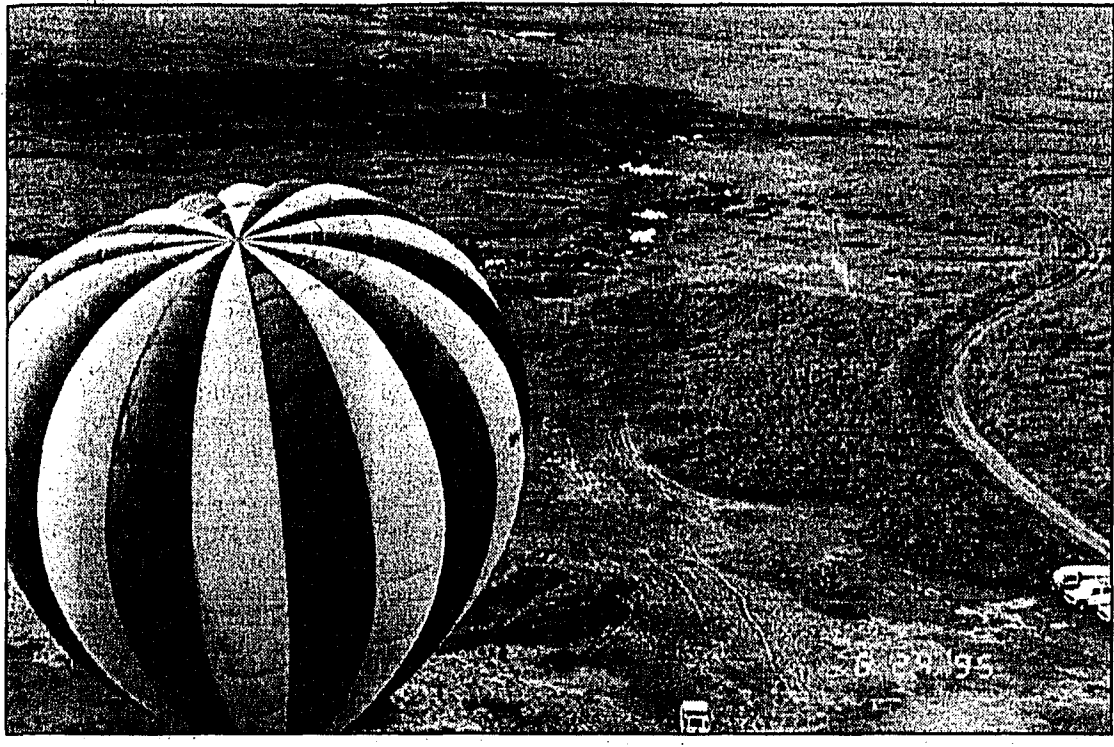

was washed out and impossible to use for a few months. During the times that the roads was washed out the drivers and passengers would exchange vehicles by carrying their luggage across the river bed to the vehicles on the other side. I guess they finally figured out who was paid what as the driver stayed with their vans. Our driver, Hussein, stopped in the middle of town and bought two varieties of bananas. Margaret and David sampled both of them while getting a lecture on the three varieties of bananas grown in Africa. The third kind was a green banana that was used in cooking and is not as good to eat raw. Most of our fellow passengers refused to eat the weird looking bananas. David and Margaret made up for our fellow travelers as the bananas were very delicious.

As soon as we crossed the river, the road wound up a very steep hill. We had left the plans for a while and we were approaching the Ngorongora crater. It was very good that we had four wheel drive vehicles because the road was steep and very, very rough. When we reached the top, Yeosef pulled the vehicle over to the side of the road and parked. We got out and looked back at the valley below. From here we could see the shores of Lake Manyara that also had a band of pink around the shoreline. On our way through here on our return trip we would stop and see the flamingos. The distance was quite great and a few people in our party could see wildlife close to the

for us in front of large windows that gave a panoramic view of the crater that spread out below us. The first four people chose four seats facing the windows. The next two chose each end seats and the last four had to sit with their backs toward the crater. The meal was excellent, consisting of many courses. Jeanie explained to us that we would come back and spend our last two days in this lodge and would eat our meals here. You could almost see the people calculating on how they would acquire better seats when we returned. Jeanie did remind us to try to get finished as soon as practical as we had a lot of driving left today. For the next two hours we drove along the rim of the crater and eventually down the southeast side and were out of the plains again. Early on at a fork in the road, we took the left fork and went outside of the crater. We were told that we would take the right fork into the crater when we returned for our stay at the lodge. We headed west on the plains until about 4 p.m. in the afternoon, when we came to an entrance to the Serengeti. We had a rest stop while our drivers checked in and paid our fees for our stay, we all felt that our lodge must be just around the corner. As we entered

Grades 7-12 Dress Code For the 1996-97 School Year

The following is the dress code approved by the Board of Trustees for grade 7-12 for the 1996-97 school year.

- Students are to:**
- Dress in a safe, neat and respectable manner.
 - Wear shirts and blouses that are long enough to cover the midriff area of the body (reach below the waist) at all times.
 - Button primary shirts and blouses from the first button below the collar downward.
 - Wear proper undergarments. Undergarments should not be visible.
 - Keep hair neatly groomed. Mustaches must be neatly groomed. No other facial hair is allowed.
- SPECIFICALLY PROHIBITED:**

- Any garment without sleeves unless it has fitted armholes.
- Wearing of caps, hats, sweatbands, and sun shades in the building.
- The use of personal grooming items (hair picks, combs, brushes, make-up, etc.) in the building except in appropriate places, (i.e., bathroom).
- Jean with holes in the knees or other areas to excess.
- Shirts or blouses that are equal in length or longer than the shorts, skirt or split skirt being worn.
- Ear adornment (male students).
- Shower thongs and the like.
- Cleated shoes (baseball, football, soccer, etc.).
- Articles of clothing that are sheer, or "see through" without proper undergarments.

- Articles of clothing that advertise alcoholic beverages, drugs, tobacco, etc. (such as Red Dog or Camel).
- Articles of clothing with "off color" slogans, or pictures of persons dressed in a manner not consistent with good taste outlined in this policy.
- Skirts or dresses that do not reach a length within two inches above the knee when the student is standing erect.
- Shorts and split skirts shorter than mid-thigh.
- Athletic shorts, bicycle shorts and wind shorts.
- Cut-off jeans that are not hemmed or rolled at the bottom.
- Any item of clothing that is judged to be inappropriate in regard to fit, and/or create any distraction from, or disturbance of, the learning environment.

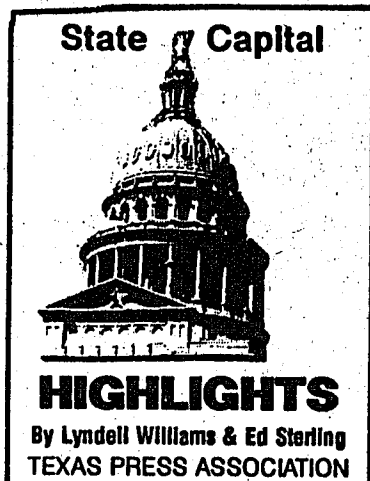
Senior League Finishes Regular Schedule With Another Win

Committee hearing on concealed handguns in Houston last week, Wilson, who heads the agency in charge of background checks for permit applicants, said, "So far, it has impressed me how remarkably responsible the permit holders have been."

Since the concealed handgun law went into effect Jan. 1, two permit holders have fatally shot other people, and there have been two suicides by permit holders.

A total of 51 shots have been fired from lawfully carried handguns, 40 of them fired by an individual at a tree in a public park.

As of last week, 83,000 applications for concealed handgun permits have been received by the DPS and some 67,000 permits have been issued.

Bush Wants Thorough Checks
Meanwhile, Gov. George W. Bush said he would like to see more thorough mental background checks on people applying for concealed handgun permits, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Wilson told the committee that mental health background checks have been run on less than 1 percent of the 83,158 Texans who have submitted applications, due to rules regarding confidentiality.

Bush said he would like to "be practical about it" but see if there is a way to conduct more thorough checks within legal limitations.

Bush said he believes the handgun law has made Texas safer and indicated there may be a correlation between the drop in violent crime and the new law.
