World Champion Bison Cook-off, Frontier Heritage Festival Saturday Ranch Rodeo, Native American Artisans, Bison Burgers, Comanche Dancers

At press time there were 15 contestants for the sanctioned World Championship Bison Cook-off to be held Saturday at the Santa Anna rodeo grounds in conjunction with the First Annual Frontier Heritage Festival. More contestants were expected by the time the cook-off begins.

Prizes in the cook-off will be \$1,000, first place, \$500 2nd, and \$200, 3rd place. According to Rod Musick who is organizer of the cook-off, "Judges will be members of the Bison Association who know how Bison is supposed to taste." "Too many times," he says, "cooks try to make

bison taste like beef. Bison has its own distinctive flavor which is very good, and this needs to be brought out in the cooking."

A complete American Bison meal will be available at noon Saturday for \$5.00 and Bison burgers will be offered later in the day.

Native Americans will have booths displaying and selling a variety of special arts and crafts.

There will be Comanche Indian dancers, and a variety of living history demonstrations taking part at various times throughout the day.

A ranch rodeo will start at 1:00 p.m. following a demonstration by the Horse Cavalry detachment of the 1st Cavalry Division from Fort Hood.

A goat scramble and boot scramble announced earlier will not take place but there will be lots of exciting ranch rodeo events featuring working cowboys from the area.

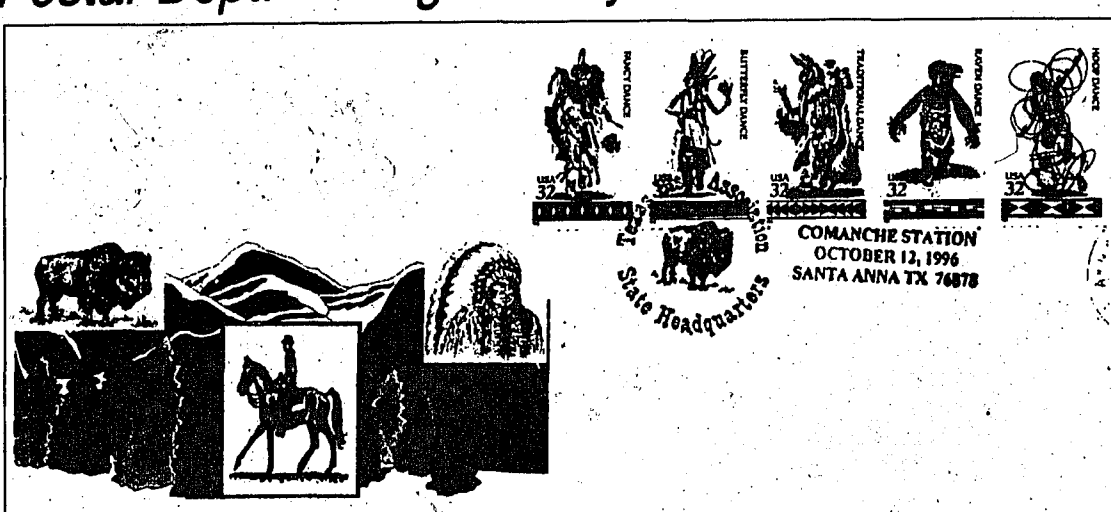
The Frontier Heritage Festival is sponsored by the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization and Rod Musick is chairman of the Bison Cookoff events.

Postal Dept. To Sign Treaty With Comanches

On Saturday, October 12, 1996, the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce and the Santa Anna Post Office will host a special first day cancellation and a specially designed envelope to commemorate the close tie between the Comanche Nation and the People of Santa Anna.

At 2:15 p.m. a representative from the Comanche Nation will be appointed Postmaster of the newly created Santa Anna Post Office,

"Comanche Branch" during the Frontier Heritage Festival at the Santa Anna Youth Rodeo Arena. Immediately following, a treaty will be signed between the Comanche Nation and many postal representatives to continue to bring mail through the Santa Anna Mountain Gap provided no sacred Indian Burial Grounds were not violated.

The special cancellation cover will include the five Indian Dance

Stamps and the Texas Bison Association special cancellation. The cost of the envelopes will be \$5.00 each and are collector items and always will be.

The special cancellation/cover, The "Comanche Branch" Postmaster Certificate, The Treaty and photographs will have a special exhibit at the Smithsonian Postal Museum in Washington, D. C.

Ranch Rodeo Will Feature Unique Events

A Ranch Rodeo will be held during the Frontier Heritage Festival this Saturday at the Santa Anna Youth Rodeo Arena.

The event will begin at 1 p.m. with such events as penning, wild cow milking, branding, mugging and doctoring.

Each team will consist of four members with prizes awarded to the

winners. Entry fee is \$120.00 per team.

Team penning is a timed event of separating and penning of three specific head.

The event of Milking is roping and milking a cow.

Branding is separating from a herd, heeling a specific calf and branding.

Mugging is roping, throwing by hand and tying three legs. Doctoring is separating, heading and heeling and marking one head of cattle.

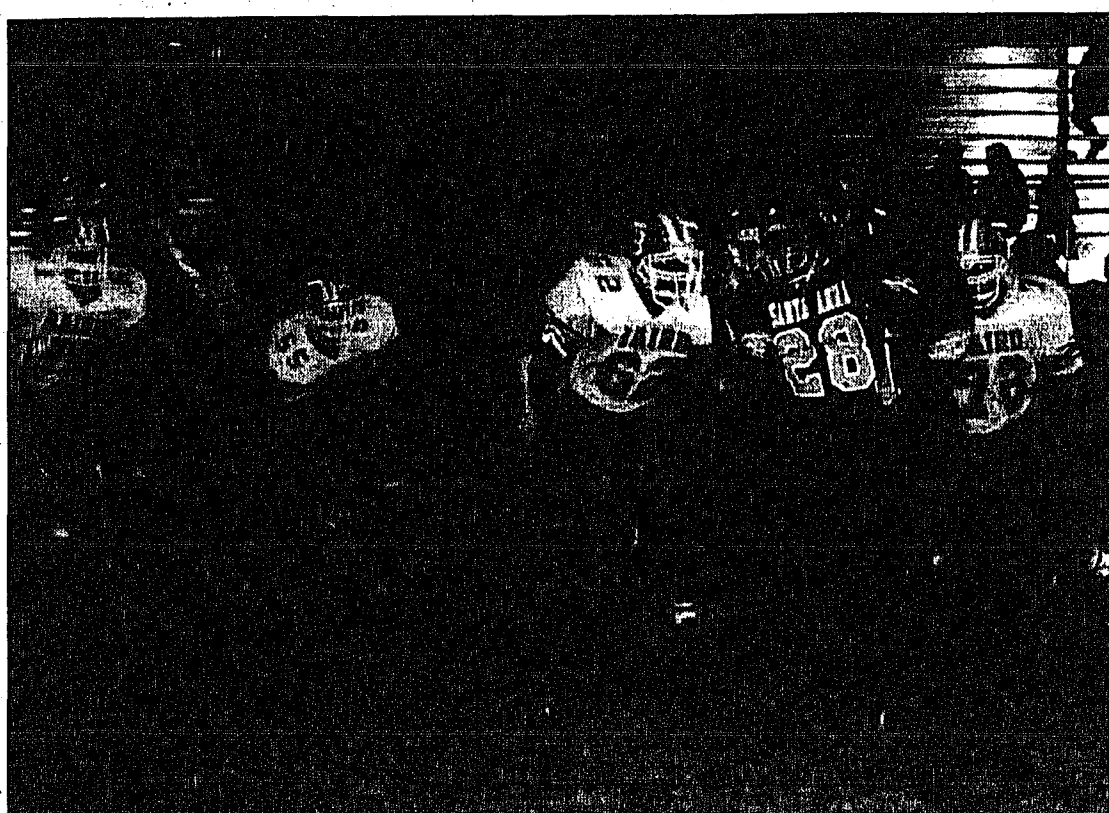

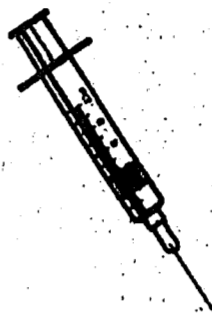
This clinic should answer everything you always wanted to know, but were afraid to ask.

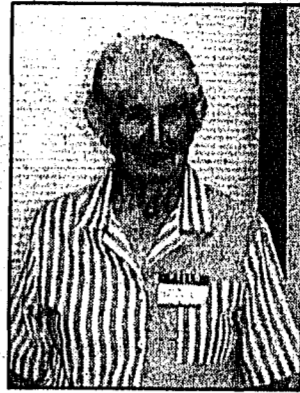

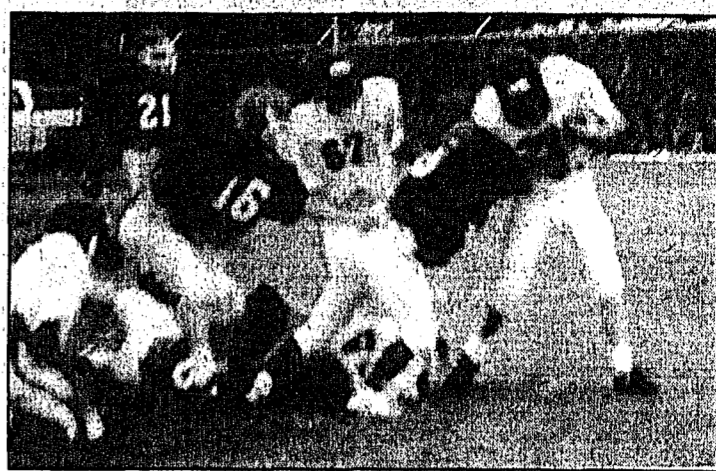

DPS Has Openings For Trooper-Trainees

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants for a recruit school scheduled to begin Jan. 7, 1997. Persons who successfully complete the rigorous six-month recruit training academy in Austin will join one of the country's premier law enforcement agencies.

"We're encouraging all persons interested in a career with the DPS to go by their nearest DPS office and get a complete application package and a list of all the qualifications," said Lt. Curley Colquitt, who heads the DPS's recruitment effort. "The DPS is very interested in attracting qualified female and minority applicants, since historically those groups have been under-represented in law enforcement," he said.
