

a Bank

10 Function

We believe if the public kept in mind the true function of a bank it would make far better understanding and banks would be more esteemed by the communities which they serve. The officers who work in a bank work for its stockholders and they do not own the money which they handle and which they loan.

As we understand it the function of a bank is to gather up the resources of the community in which it exists and, as far as they can safely do so, loan these funds to the customers of the bank. These loans must be so made that they are liquid because the bank is pledged to return the deposits on demand and if its loans are bad or frozen then it can not be in a position to pay the depositors when they want or need their funds.

It is the duty of every person who borrows from a bank to not only pay his note, but to, for at least a part of the time, have funds on deposit in the bank that can be loaned to other customers. In other words a good hank is a mutual proposition, its customers combining their resources to accommodate each other and thus it follows that no one who is not a depositor of the bank should expect a loan from the bank.
