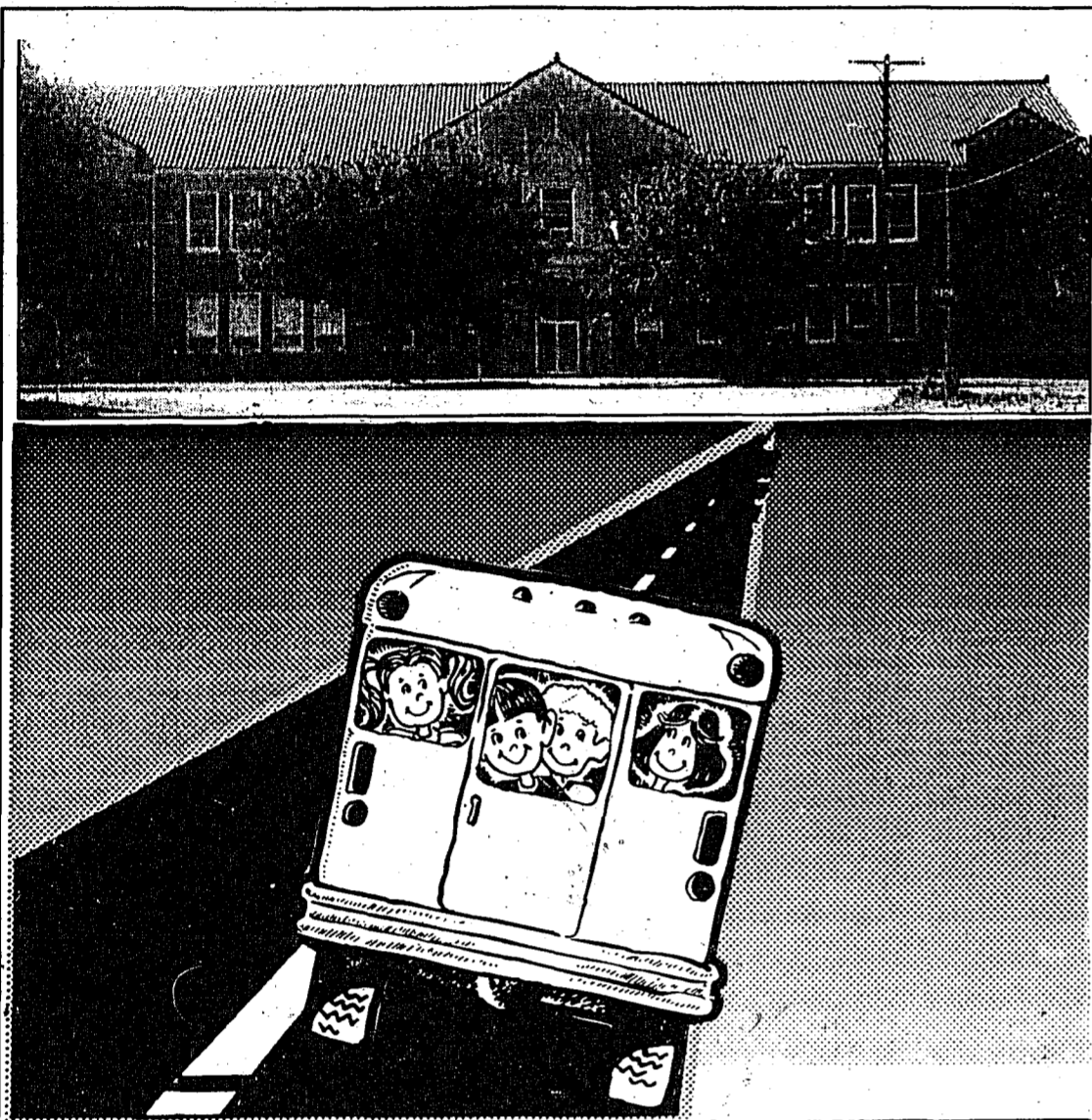

Along their craft show trails Rick

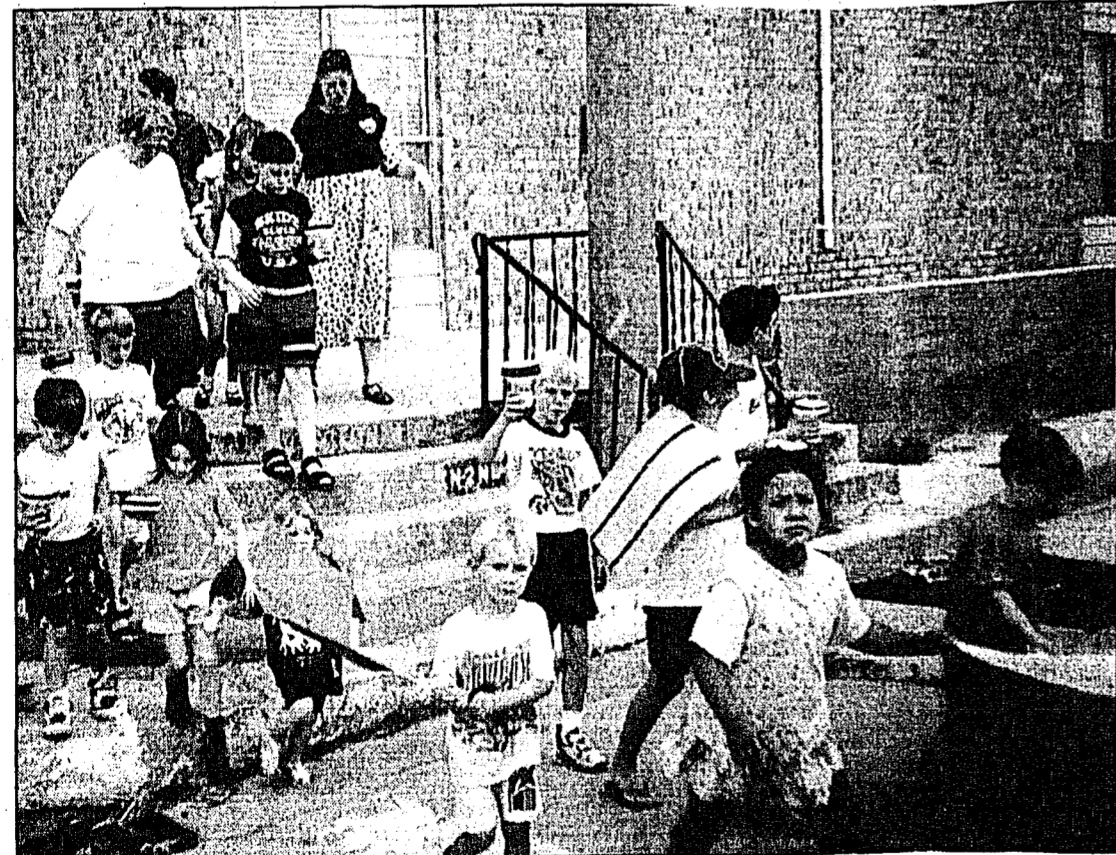

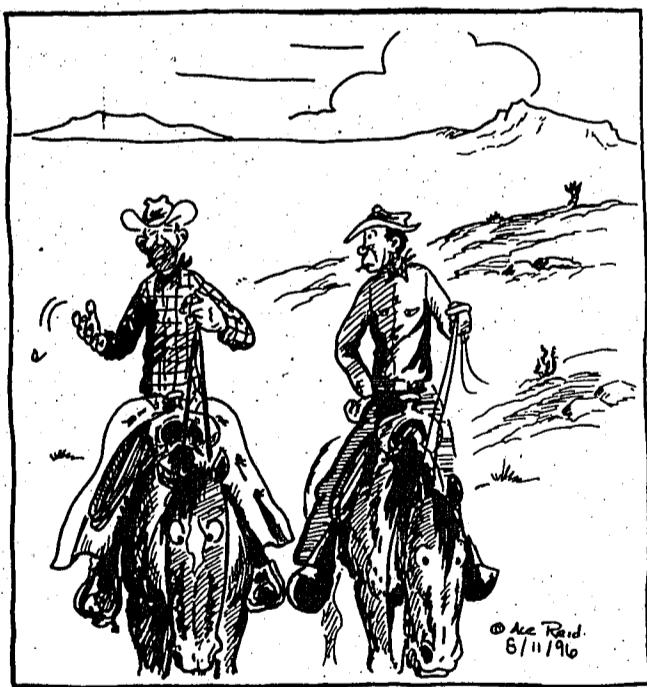

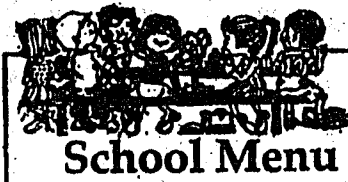

### A Perspective On The Protection Of Santa Anna's Peaks

By Linda Pelon  
It is very encouraging to know that many concerned individuals have taken time to express their support for the protection of Santa Anna's Peaks. I hope you will share these letters with your elected county, state and federal representatives and with the Texas Historical Commission. I feel sure your readers will be anxious to hear how these officials can assist.

We must do much more than write letters if these important landmarks are to be preserved. This will take the involvement of many individuals and a plan of action. The following accomplishments could assist greatly in your advocacy efforts:

1. Identify those responsible for the destruction (Who owns the land? Who is operating the quarry? Who is buying the gravel blasted from the caprock?) Ask those responsible to share their plan for the restoration and stabilization of the peak. Determine if this plan is adequate for preserving the peaks and the time frame for completion of the project.

2. Investigate the feasibility of purchasing Santa Anna's peaks and placing them in a public land trust. These internationally significant landmarks should be owned by those who want to preserve them.

3. Create a fund through the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization to be used for expenses associated with the protection of the peaks.

Because of my interest in the inspiring and dramatic history associated with Santa Anna's Peaks I've met many area property owners. I admire the land owners who demonstrate as much passion for their property owner responsibilities as they do for their property owner-rights. Many generations of some families have recognized and protected sites of importance to the various peoples who occupied the land over the past several thousand years. Their stewardship of these cultural and natural resources is a great public service.

It is unfortunate that a few irresponsible and short-sighted property owners make it necessary to create and enforce regulations which also impact property owners who do not participate in abusive land management practices. Perhaps land owners who have organized to advocate for their rights should consider creating a Code of Ethics to define their responsibilities and set the standard for responsible land use. This could significantly reduce the amount of public regulation imposed

to prevent the destruction of resources of collective importance such as landmarks and historic sites.

*The Destruction of Santa Anna's Peaks*  
Do Property Owners Have the "Right" to Destroy a Historic Landmark?

"...two low hills, mere flat topped mesas, some 300 feet high. They (Santa Anna Peaks) are the only eminence above the miles of slopes that lift them up to sight for long distances. You can look from the cap rock fifty miles to Salt Gap in the Brady Mountains, or forty miles to Caddo Peaks...landmarks today, as they have been since the white men first came near them, and must have been for eons before that, for whatever human beings dwelt here or crossed their way. They were there to guide explorers, armies, Texas Rangers and surveyors. They were the focus, the axis of further travel.

"The meeting place of the Sata Exiponi or Dog Soldier secret organization was Conas and was unusual and deserves mention. It was an underground secret cavern located midway up the steep east end of Santanna--now called Santa Anna--Mountain...In this Dog Soldier cavern, in perfect secrecy, meetings were held at stated intervals of the moon. Subjects of importance to the Comanches were discussed and decisions made....It was on this High Point that "the firerock (a sacred meteorite) fell" and it was here the "eternal fires" were kept burning. Here was also the center of "fire and smoke communications." The fire rock, which tradition said was sent them by the Sun, was given as honored position in the secret chamber.

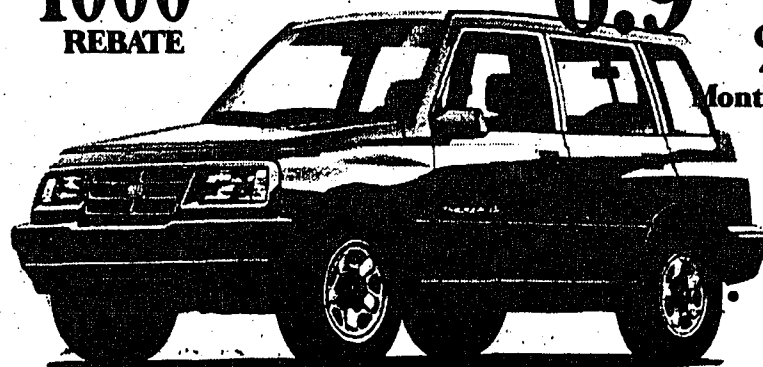
