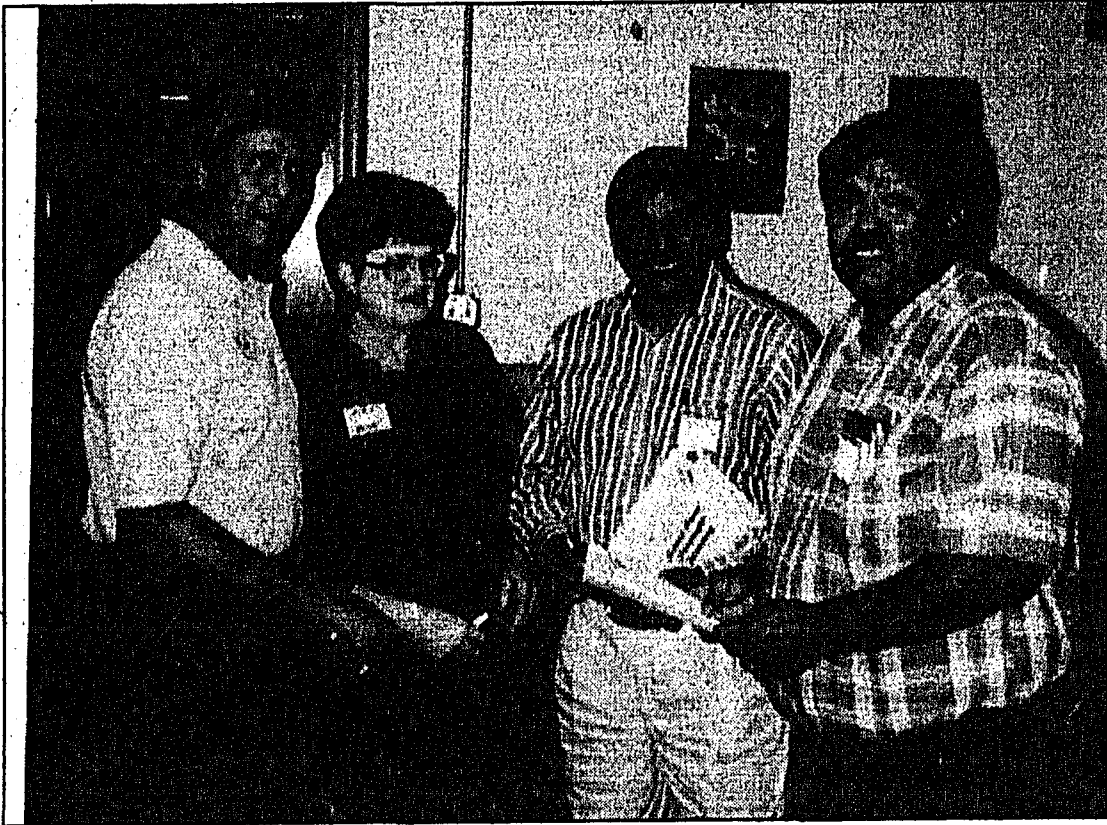

## Ideas Shared At Strategy Meetings Help Set Goals For Future Of Santa Anna

About 30 people from Santa Anna, including business people and other interested persons, joined in strategy meetings at the school cafeteria Monday and Tuesday in an attempt to set priorities and develop a vision for change that would take Santa Anna into a new era of community development and progress.

Those participating in the meetings talked frankly about the weaknesses of the community, but also its strengths, which all encompassed good or bad attitudes toward moving forward into the 21st century.

Those attending were divided into discussion groups. When coming back together the top strengths of the community were compiled. As seen by the groups, they are historical heritage/ties to Comanche Nation; technical communications, vehicular traffic (6000 a day through town); hub location to larger cities; land and water recreation; diversified churches; and the 1/2 cent sales tax.

Those attending the meetings from out of town stressed the importance of capitalizing on the

Internet and Web Access available here, something that many larger towns cannot yet claim. The technology has the potential of being a springboard to many other exciting possibilities.

Most of all, a concern was shown by those who want to try to build Santa Anna up into a clean and proud community meeting most of the needs of its citizens.

Agreed as major weaknesses of Santa Anna included lack of community pride/appearance; lack of support for local businesses; lack of suitable housing; lack of community involvement; lack of concern for natural resources - the mountain; lack of employment opportunities, resistance to change; and lack of infrastructure funds.

Possible industries to target included promotion of the mountain/outdoor theater; promotion of Bison products; promotion of Comanche arts, crafts and tourism; Promotion of Beer and wine sales; development of fishing and hunting businesses; promotion of antique enterprises; development of a museum; development of an

industrial park.

The groups adopted a visionary statement which read as follows:

Santa Anna is located in beautiful West Texas, committed in preserving its unique heritage, history and ties to the Comanche Nation. It offers rich opportunities in business, outdoor land and water recreation, tourism and quality of life.

Additional opportunities provide youth with excellent education and all citizens benefit from low cost of living, low crime, and a pristine environment with abundant water supply for city and rural residents.

Santa Anna is situated at the hub of three major highways and the information super highway. Thousands of diverse travelers come into the community each day, creating and ensuring economic progress in this prosperous community.

(How about it Santa Anna, .....will you join us in this vision?) The meetings were held in order to get a vision of what direction Santa Anna needs to move and how the 1/2 cent economic sales tax can help the town save itself.

Meeting with citizens of Santa Anna and helping coordinate the meetings were Mike Martindale, Shirley Deal and Sterling Brooks, all associated with West Texas Utilities. Martindale is a community development specialist and Ms. Deal and Brooks are community relations specialists. Also Matt Davis of Brownwood, a community development specialist with Lone Star Gas.

Also attending as participants were Ozzie Red Elk, Educational Director of the Comanche Tribe, and Johnny Wauqua, Vocational Coordinator of the Comanche Tribe, both of Lawton, Oklahoma.

## Charlie's FUNDay Next Week

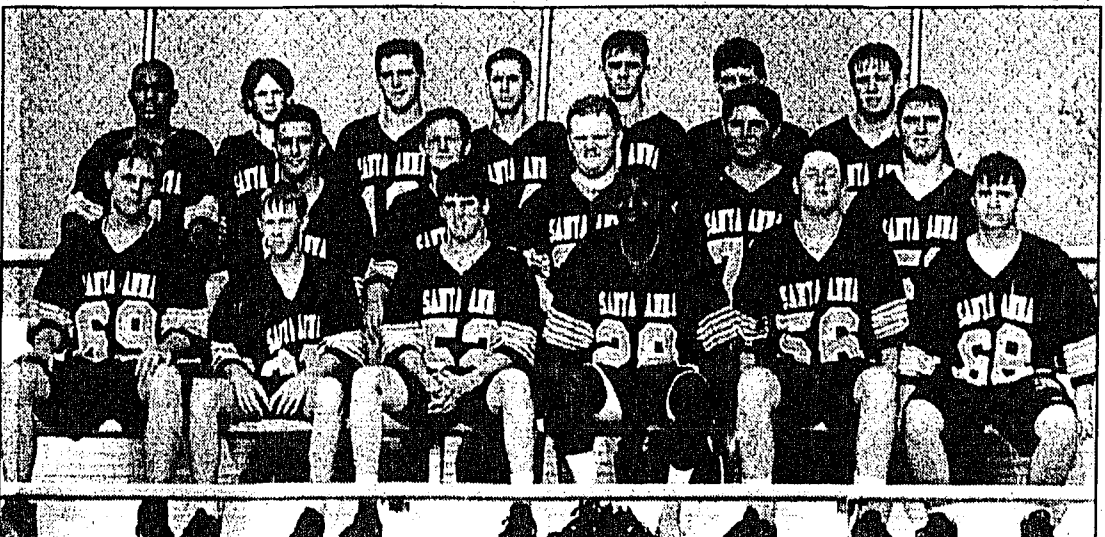

## SAISD Gets Acceptable Rating

The Santa Anna ISD has received an "Acceptable" rating on the school report card of performance.

The local school scored very good on TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) scores, improving over the previous year in Reading and Mathematics.

In grades 3-6 89.1% passed reading compared to 81.2% in the spring of 1995. In math students the percent of students passing was 93.7% compared to 87% last year. A drop was reported in writing with

grades 3-6 showing a passing percentage of 77.8% compared to 100% the previous year.

TAAS reading scores for grade 7-8 and 10 showed 78.6% of those taking the test passing. The previous year's score in reading was 78.4%. Math scores showed 77.8% passing. Math took another big leap from 60.8% passing the previous year. Writing scores showed 87.2% passing compared to 94.3% last year.

### Check It Out

Fall seed catalogues have been coming to our house. These remind everyone that September is usually a good time to plant in this part of Texas.

If you are interested in bluebonnets now is the time to get prepared. Chemically scarified seed should be planted no later than September 15. You can get bulletin L-2346 Texas Bluebonnets from the county extension office. My most successful planting was with seeds harvested by M. L. Guthrie and David Key. We broadcast these on the bare spots in our side lawn and then cut the tall grass. The best growth come from spots under edges of other plants. Maybe birds couldn't get to them or they were protected from winter weather. The seeds must be covered in some manner. This worked for all our native wildflowers.

Now is also the time to plant trees and shrubs. Their roots can start to grow before freeze and it isn't so hot as spring. A good mulch will help too. The library has several good gardening books. You can get bulletins from the county extension service.

Now is the time to inform yourself for the coming election. Read everything—then decide what you believe. Perhaps start with **Modern Maturity** Sept.-Oct. This has some interesting views about those who are running and those who are leaving Washington. The recent **Time** and **U. S. News and World Report** magazines have articles. The library has these and there are some books about candidates. Much of the information on TV is slanted by the individual who is speaking. Read and make up your mind.

Do you have a home library? That doesn't have to be a room full of books. You do need things like a dictionary, a thesaurus, a simple one volume encyclopedia, maybe an atlas. Do you have a bible? A book of poetry? Books for your children? These do not have to cost much. Almost every library has good book sales. Garage sales have low priced finds and so do used book stores.

Recently a book has been published **Growing Up with Dick and Jane: Learning and Living the American Dream**. Those of us, my age, can recall Dick, Jane and their dog Spot and cat Puff. It would be good to see and enjoy that book. Recent books for children that might be good birthday or Christmas gifts are from **Scholastic**. These are diaries from the Revolutionary War days to the Civil War. More are planned. These would be excellent books to

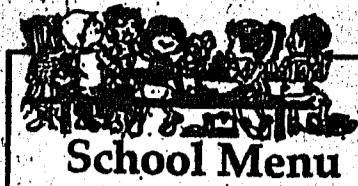
