School Officials Will Enforce 'No Tobacco' Policy

ISD are reminding everyone that it is their responsibility to prohibit the use of tobacco products on school grounds and at schoolsponsored activities.

According to a letter received by the school from Mike Moses, Commissioner of Education with the Texas Education Agency the Gun-Free and Smoke-Free Schools provisions that passed as part of the Goals 2000: Educate America Act prohibits smoke on school property. Federal law allows for an administrative penalty of up to

Officials with the Santa Anna \$1,000.00 per occurance for violation of this policy.

Senate Bill 1 also contains provisions which prohibit the use of tobacco products on school property and at school-sponsored events. Students may neither possess nor use tobacco products on school grounds or at schoolsponsored events. Parents and other adults may not use tobacco products on school grounds or at any schoolsponsored event. School districts are charged with ensuring that school district employees enforce these provisions on Senate Bill 1.

Commissioner Willard Allen said his Precinct 2 equipment had received quite a bit of damage from vandals. Over twenty windows number of windows had been knocked out of various pieces of equipment and trucks.

Commissioner Davis of Precinct 4 said his equipment had been damaged to the tune of over \$800 worth of windows.

The two figured their combined losses due to vandalism had been more than \$3,000 in pass weeks.

If you are young, healthy, and active, consider yourself blessed. You probably get very few prescriptions filled, or even visit your doctor's office for anything more than a checkup.

Study after study confirms this. A recent University of Nebraska study found that in only a twomonth period, five Nebraska pharmacies saved the health care system \$752,391 in averted hospitalizations, doctor visits, and other medical services-that's \$75,000 in savings a month per pharmacy.

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

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


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

AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush announced new rules on ethics last week to prohibit lobbying by former staff members.

Bush asked his 184-member staff to sign a promise that if they leave their jobs, they will not lobby the governor's office for at least one year, the Dallas Morning News

"My administration will uphold the highest ethical standards. We must all continue to conduct ourselves in a manner which makes Texas proud," Bush said in a memo to his staff.

It has not been unusual for former legislators, aides and governor's staffers to accept lobbying posts after leaving the state payroll. Treasury, Treasurer Close Doors

Texas Treasurer Martha Whitehead scraped her name off the window of her office in Austin on Aug. 30, her last day on the job.

The 150-year-old Texas Treasury officially ceased operations Sept. 1. in accordance with a constitutional amendment to close the agency and transfer its duties to the office of Comptroller John Sharp.

Whitehead, who campaigned in favor of closing the agency in efforts to streamline state government, was appointed to office in 1993 by then-Gov. Ann Richards.

During the September 9, Livestock and Wildlife Protection Association meeting in the county judge's office, it was noted that seventeen coyotes were taken by the county ADC trappers. They also reported approximately 20 lambs. and 15 kids as confirmed kills by predators. There is an unofficial opinion that almost as many kills go unreported because of the difficulty in locating the small carcasses in tall grass. There is no exact estimate as to the number of fawns, dove, quail and turkey killed but it is much higher than the domestic animal count. With lambs selling at \$60.00 level and kids in the \$40.00 range, we are losing a substantial amount of predation. Additionally it is almost impossible to place a value on the wildlife casualties which impact our economy from hunting.

There were also four incidents of rabies in the last few weeks and the cost to the county was \$1,289.00 in manpower and travel to monitor quarantined animals as required by state law. Predator control is a necessity under any circumstance.



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
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
