Mountaineers Pull Off Big Upset Beat Rising Star; Ready For Gorman This Week

The Santa Anna Mountaineers traveled to Rising Star last Friday evening to beat the Wildcats 7-3 in the fourth quarter.

The Mountaineers took the ball on the opening kickoff but were unable to move toward the goal line. They fumbled on a punt on their own 24-yard line. The Wildcats kicked a 32-yard field goal leading 3-0 in the first quarter.

According to Coach David Robinett, turnovers were major. He said, "The little things win or lose ball games and we were still able to win."

The Mountaineers fumbled six times during the game and lost three of the fumbles.

In the fourth quarter the

Mountaineer offense put things together. Fourth and two from the 29-yard line quarterback Shane Watson took the ball for a first down. Four more plays and another fourth down situation with 13 yard to go, Watson threw to Josh Lewis for another first down.

With another fourth down, the Mountaineers chose to run with the ball and Watson took the ball to the left, broke two tackles and cross the goal line as he was tackled. Chris Cheaney kicked the extra point.

Josh Lewis led the Mountaineers with 60-yard passing.

The students were requested to

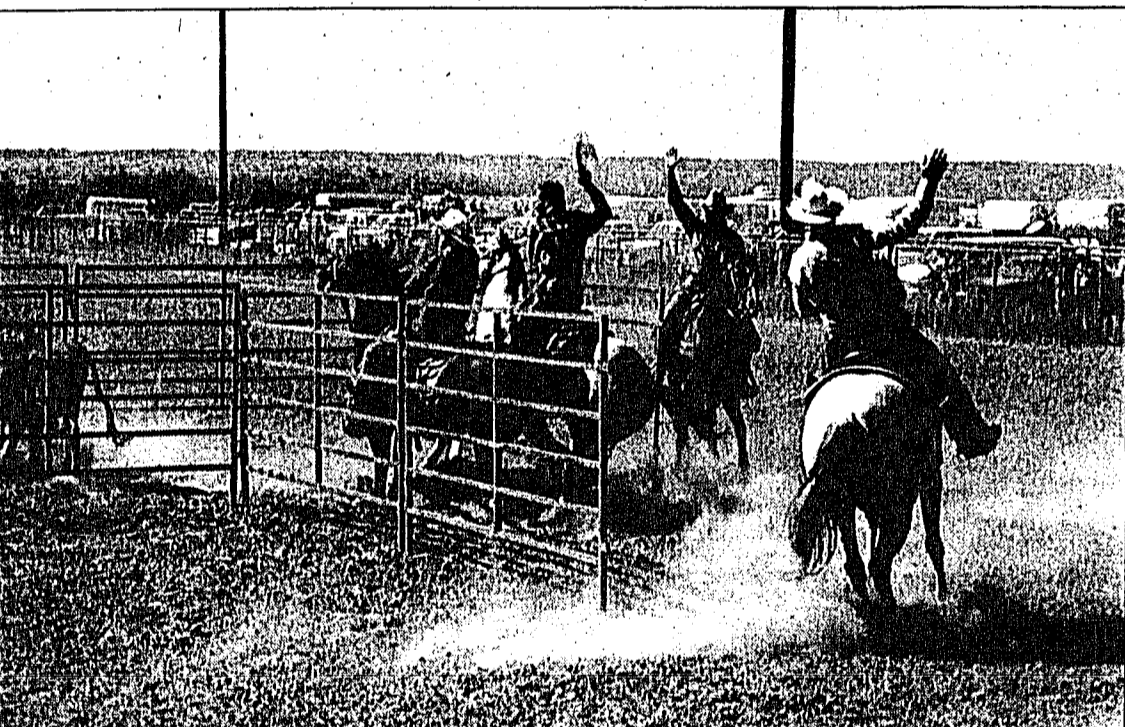

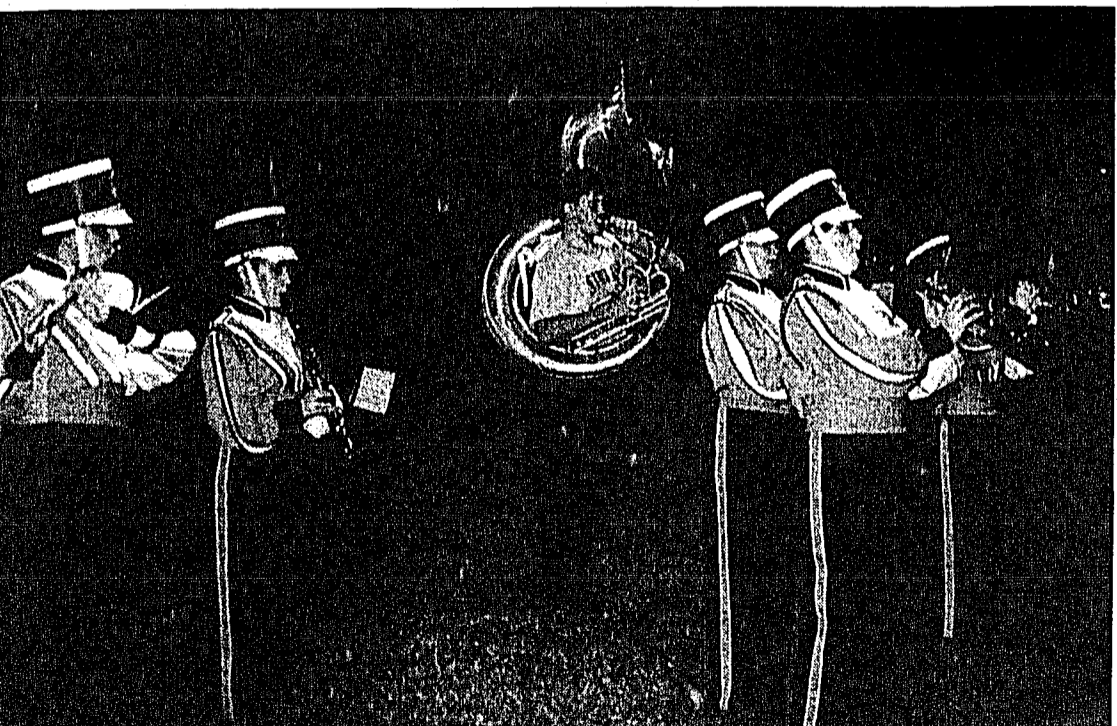

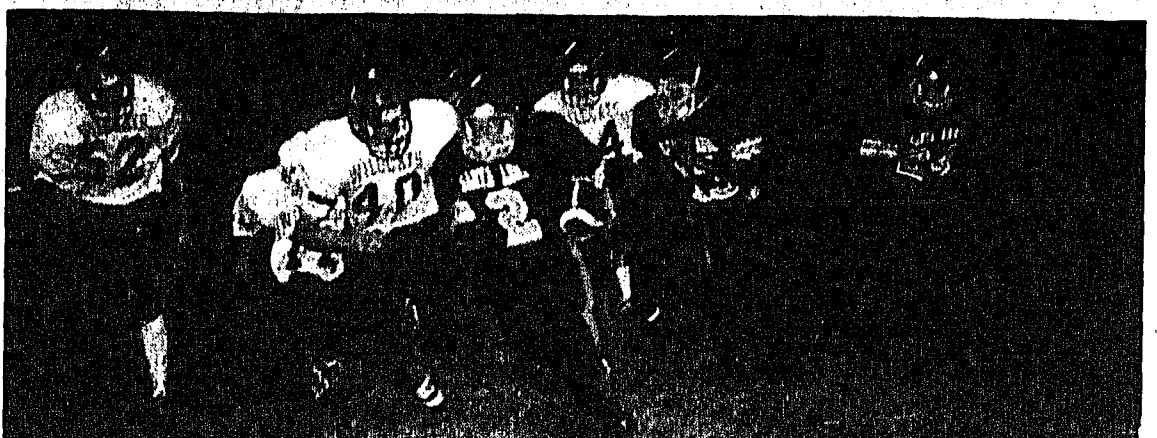
