## **Doctors Clear Up Mysteries** Surrounding 'Slipped Discs'

(NU) - Just the words "slipped disc" are enough to make most active people wince with pain. They immediately think surgery and long recovery. They're sure their backs will never be quite right again.

And those are just some of the misconceptions about this common condition.

Here, from the doctors at the nation's largest spine-care center, the Florida Spine Institute (1-800-477-7746), are some myths and the truth about slipped discs.

But first, let's get the terminology right. Discs don't really "slip," they rupture, or herniate. The causes range from age and wear and tear to sudden pressure, like lifting or trauma. Even a violent sneeze can cause a disc to rupture.

Myth: Only surgery can repair a ruptured disc.

Truth: Most physicians prefer trying more conservative treatments first. For instance, doctors at the Florida Spine Institute often start patients out with a simple regimen of a day or two of bed rest, regular applications of ice packs and over-thecounter pain medications.

After a couple of days in bed, patients begin light physical activity like walking, but no sitting or driving. Once the pain is gone, the Spine Institute doctors recommend visiting a physical therapist to learn back-healthy exercises.

Some ruptured discs can also be treated with a series of injections using a cortisone-like drug. The injections are usually given on an outpatient basis and, Spine Institute doctors say, can be repeated up to three times.
In conjunction with the injections,

patients should begin an aquatic exercise program. Most can return to work but should avoid heavy lifting. Myth: Disc surgery is invasive

and involves a long recovery period.

Truth: Many ruptured discs can be repaired using lasers and other high-tech, minimally invasive techniques. Some operations can even be done on an outpatient basis. Many patients make a full return

to activity within three to six weeks. When a disc ruptures, body weight and muscle load squeeze the soft material inside the disc out through the tear toward the spinal canal. Pain occurs when sensitive nerve roots are pressed.

Can a "slipped disc" be prevented? Maybe not. But care when lifting and a regular exercise program that strengthens your back will keep your back healthier as you age.

## Local Voters Show Up Better Than National Average

The General election held last week is now past history and it came at a time when, because of Wednesday morning deadlines, we were unable to give more than the bare details. We feel, however, that our readers would like to know how local voters responded to the candidates' pleas for election.

At a time when the national average of those showing up to vote in the general election was only 49%, Coleman County voters showed up at the rate of 60%. In all there were 3,656 Coleman County people who cast votes out of some 6,200 who were registered to vote. Although the nation re-elected

Bill Clinton as President with 50% of the vote, Coleman County voters supported the Dole-Kemp ticket 1,804 to 1,489 for Clinton-Gore. Ross Perot received 349 votes in our county.

Coleman County gave Congressman Charlie Stenholm the edge by 107 votes in his close reelection by a 5% margin over Republican challenger Rudy Izzard. Coleman County voted 1,861 for Stenholm and 1,754 for Izzard.

Republican Troy Fraser defeated Democrat Rick Rhodes by a 51% to 49% margin of voters for the 24th District State Senate seat being vacated by retiring Senator Bill Sims. Coleman County voters, however, voted 1,921 to 1,647 for Rhodes.

Coleman County voters followed statewide trends in helping re-elect U.S. Senator Phil Gramm by a margin of 56% to 43% over Democrat challenger Victor Morales. Coleman County voters gave Gramm the nod by 2,220 to

AUSTIN - A committee that studied over the last six months how Texans feel about school property taxes made its final report to Gov. George W. Bush last week. And there were no surprises: Texans want relief from high

property taxes. According to the Austin American-Statesman, which published an article on the findings before they were officially released, the report said, "From the public testimony received, it is clear that high property taxes in Texas are having an effect on the economy and are placing a substantial burden on

homeownership." Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, said, "The report gives credence to the governor's belief that property taxes are too high and are hampering growth and job creation."

Still unsolved is the riddle of how to replace the \$11 billion in property taxes that Texas' public schools collect each year. A mix of new sales and business taxes has been discussed. The issue will take top priority when the state Legislature convenes in January.

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

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

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
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## **Future Home Of Chamber Of Commerce**
