Slight Drop In Sales Tax Rebate

A sales tax rebate report from John Sharp, Comptroller of Public Accounts, shows that Santa Anna's November rebate payment was \$3,599.53 as compared to \$3,777.74 for the same period last year. Total sales tax rebates for Santa Anna are down by 4.50% as compared to last year at this time.

Coleman showed a drop of 7.88% for the period but an overall gain for the year of 8.89%.

The rebates received do not reflect sales tax remittance to the state that

may have arrived late.

October was the first month for Santa Anna merchants to collect the one cent additional sales tax for economic development and property tax relief.

Coleman County Swine Validation Set For Saturday

The Coleman County Swine Validation and Tagging date has been set for all upcoming junior livestock show. This year's date is Saturday, November 16.

All Coleman County FFA and 4-H swine exhibitors who planto show in the Coleman County Junior Livestock Show and/or any major livestock show in Texas for the 1996-97 stock show season must have their show pigs validated as to ownership and tagged with special tags. If the exhibitors' pigs are not validated on November 16, they will not be permitted to show at county show or major show.

The Santa Anna FFA and 4-H will validate and tag at the Santa

Anna Show Barn at 1 p.m.

All pigs at Santa Anna should be in the Santa Anna Barn prior to 12 noon. There will be livestock scales in the barn for weighing. All pigs should be weighed and weights recorded and pigs should be left in the barn until tagging is completed to eliminate confusion.

"STATE VALIDATION" forms must contain exhibitors' signature and a parent or guardian's signature. Fees for tagging will be \$1.00 per head for pigs validated for county only and \$3.00 per pig for major livestock show validation. Everyone needs to pay fees at the time of tagging and also sign major validation forms as required by state shows.

The Class of 1946 celebrated our 50th graduation anniversary at HOMECOMING 1996. What a great time.

We had such a great time, getting re-acquainted, sharing what has happened in the ensuing 50 years.

How great it is to have been part of a small class in a small school. We were small enough, not to be just classmates, but more like family. It warmed my heart to see how easily we 'took up' where we left off, 50 years ago. There were some of us who had not seen others since that great graduation day in 1946.

I guess, none of us attained great notoriety, fame or great success in the eyes of the world, but we did well, raised good families, and live what we term good lives.

One of the things that came to front is that most of us, still live in the great state of Texas and some of us have come back to Santa Anna to live our retirement years.

We missed those of our classmates who did not make it for some reason or the other. Our desire was to have all here, but that did not happen and I guess it was not possible to believe that might happen.

We are fortunate, too, that not many of us have died in these 50 years. Only seven of our class, maybe eight, as we were not successful in finding two of our classmates. We are thankful for our longevity.

Without exception, our classmates were complimentary of the education that we received at Santa Anna High School. Of those polled, it seemed, almost without exception the teachers that meant the most to us, because we seemed to have gotten special attention from them were Mrs. Maud Evans and Mrs. I. Williamson. We all remembered them with fondness and appreciation. I feel sure that if they knew of the impact they had on our lives, they would be pleased.

We plan on getting together at another homecoming in two years. I am sure that we all look forward to that time.



Michael Hartman Elected Scurry County Attorney

On November 5, in conjunction with the national and state elections, former Santa Anna resident Michael W. Hartman was elected to the office of County Attorney for Scurry County.

Hartman, running on the Republican ticket, defeated his Democratic challenger by garnering 64% of the vote and accumulating 3,635 votes to 2,073 for his opponent.

He resides in Snyder with his wife, Donna and three-year-old son Travis.

After graduating from Santa Anna High School in 1983, Hartman received a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from Angelo State University in 1987 and a Doctorate of Jurisprudence degree from Texas Tech School of Law in 1991.

Sen. Sims Against Ban On Steel Leghold Traps

AUSTIN—Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock) has been advised that an animal rights activists group plans to ask officials to outlaw steel leghold traps during the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department meeting scheduled this week.

"I am very much against the effort to ban the use of steel leghold traps," stated Senator Sims. "This type of predator control saves much of our game in Texas; and as a state senator, a protector of wildlife and as a rancher, I have contacted the Texas Department of Parks & Wildlife to make them aware of my concerns regarding this issue," stated Senator Sims.

"I think these individuals fail to realize the importance of this method of predator control. This would not be a good move; it would be a step backwards," said Senator Sims.

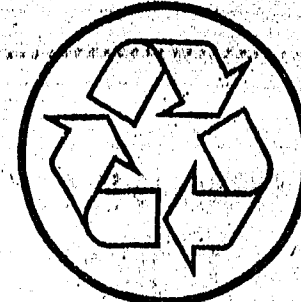
After the panel discussion, there will be a question and answer session.
