Social Security and SSI Benefits To increase

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits will increase 2.9 percent, beginning with the payments that Social Security beneficiaries receive January 3 and SSI recipients receive on December 31. The automatic cost-of-living adjustment is made annually.

For Social Security beneficiaries, the average monthly benefit amount for all retired workers will rise from \$724 to \$745. The maximum federal SSI monthly payments to an individual will rise from \$470 to \$484. For a couple, the maximum federal SSI payment will rise from \$705 to \$726.

Social Security and SSI benefits increase automatically each year based on the rise in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) from the third quarter of one year through the corresponding period of the next. This year's increase in the CPI-W was 2.9 percent.

Nowlin and Nell Myers are both Coleman County natives, he born in Santa Anna, the son of George and Mary Ellen Goodgoin Myers and she born in the Shields community, the daughter of T.V. (Thomas Valentine) and Dora Byrd Bell.

Nowlin graduated from Santa Anna schools in 1933. He served one year in the U.S. Air Force at Kelly Field in San Antonio before returning home to help his mother with the family following the death of his father. He spent several years in the National Guard and worked as a ginner and two years with the Texas Highway Patrol.

Nell's family moved to Santa Anna where she school from the second grade through graduation from high school in 1934 after which she lived for a while in Fort Worth and Houston as well as in Santa Anna.

Nowlin and Nell were married in Santa Anna in November of 1940 at the home of M.L. Womack, the Presbyterian minister.







Moving On and Getting Rich

For many Texas legislators, it was well worth burning their candles at both ends during their years as public servants. Especially for those who are now lobbyists.

Texas Ethics Commission records show that 67 former lawmakers are registered as lobbyists, and some make more than a million dollars serving special interests.

Those lawmakers-turned-lobbyist: reported earnings totaling between \$10 million and \$22 million, according to a study released by Tom Smith, director of the Texas office of the government watchdog group, Public Citizen.

"These (former) legislators are using the inside knowledge and contacts they developed while serving the public's interest ...' Smith told the Associated Press, adding that the reported earnings are about 15 percent of what has been reported by registered




