District Court Handles Number Of Court Cases

District Judge John Weeks heard several cases for disposition presented by District Attorney Ross L. Jones on Thursday, October 17:

Ramon Vasquez pled guilty to Forgery and was sentenced to two (2) years confinement in a State Jail Facility, probation for a term of five (5) years, payment of a \$500.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, and restitution totaling \$200.00. He will also be required, as a condition of his community supervision, to serve not less than 120 hours of community service. This sentence will run concurrently with another sentence imposed in the 42nd District Court of Coleman County, Texas.

Ramon Vasquez pled guilty to Passing a Forged Instrument and was sentenced to two (2) years confinement in a State Jail Facility, probation for a term of five (5) years, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, Community Supervision fees of \$30.00 per month and restitution totaling 415.00. He will also be required, as a condition of his community supervision, to serve not less than 120 hours of community service. He was represented by court-appointed defense counsel James Bowen.

The following cases were presented for disposition on Thursday, November 14:

Santos Z. Seballos, Revocation of Community Supervision. He pled true to violation of his community supervision and was sentenced to four (4) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. He was represented by court-appointed defense counsel James L. Bowen.

Kevin Thompson pled guilty to Indecency with a Child, a Class "A" misdemeanor and was sentenced to one (1) year confinement in the Coleman County Jail, probation for a term of two (2) years, payment of a \$2,000.00 fine, court costs and Community Supervision fees of \$30.00 per month. He will also be required, as a condition of his Community Supervision, to serve not less than 80 hours of community service. He was represented by defense counsel Roger Nicholas.

Larry Dale Allcorn pled guilty to Felony D.W.I. and was sentenced to two (2) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas

Department of Criminal Justice, probation for a term of two (2) years, payment of a \$1,000.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, and Community Supervision fees of \$30.00 per month. He will also be required, as a condition of his Community Supervision, to remain in the Substance Abuse Felony Punishment Facility operated by the Community Justice Assistance Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for no more than one (1) year, to comply with all rules, regulations and treatment programs, and shall remain in such facility until discharged by the Court. He was represented by court-appointed defense counsel James L. Bowen.

Roberto M. DeLaRosa pled guilty to Felony D.W.I. and was sentenced to two (2) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, probation for a term of two (2) years, payment of a \$1,000.00 fine, court costs, court-appointed attorney fees, and Community Supervision fees of \$30.00 per month. He will also be

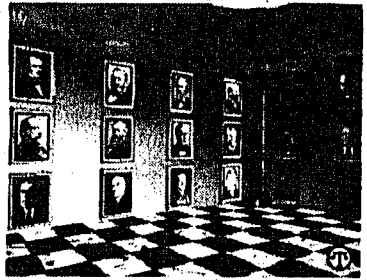

Bass fishing is continuing to pick up a little and will probably do so the next couple of weeks.

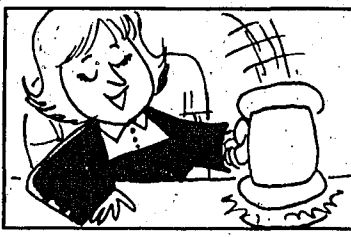
Black bass and smallmouth are biting pretty good now, mostly on Carolina rigs fished in the main lake.

Fishing for catfish has been fair using trotlines baited with cut bait fished over baited holes.

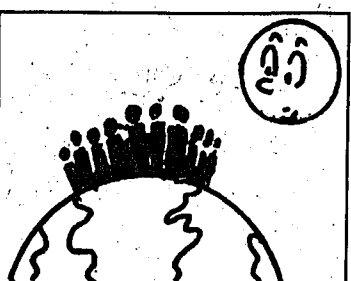

This "report card" on SAISD is issued annually by Texas Education Agency to the public so that an evaluation of our school's performance can be made.

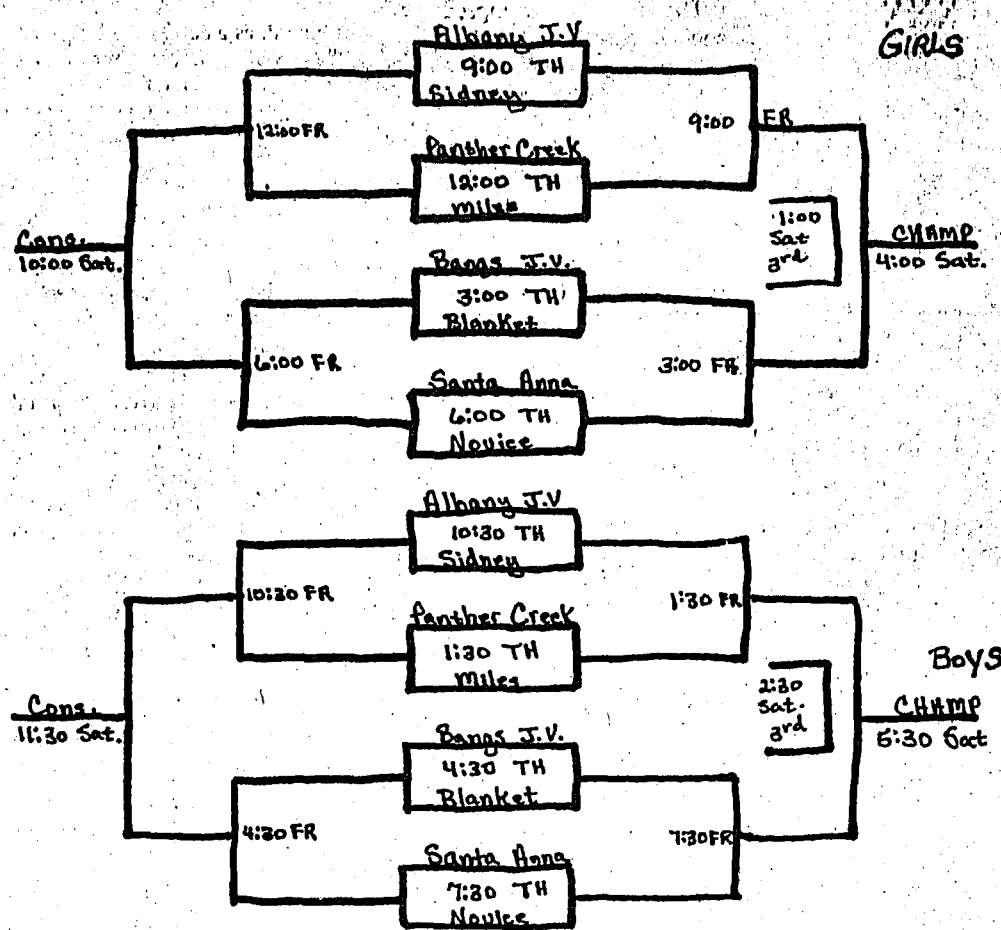

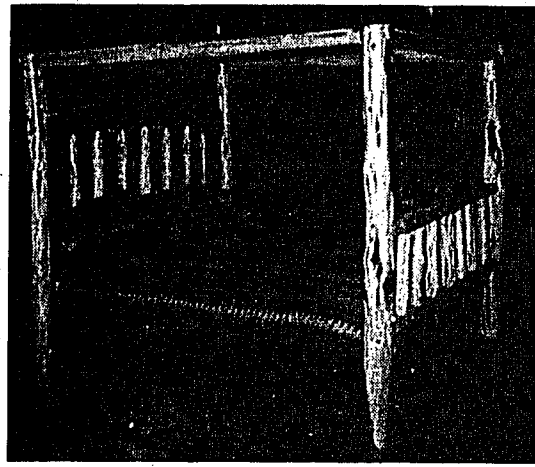
