Council Addresses Problem Of Dogs Running Loose In City

The Santa Anna City Council met Tuesday evening, February 11 with Mayor Pro-Temp Bobby Morgan presiding at the meeting. Council members present were Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, Mike Pritchard and Jean Findley. Chief of Police Carlos Torres presented his monthly report to the council.

A motion was passed to table the CAP resolution from West Texas Utilities.

Supervisor Doug Watson reported there had been 10 water leaks in January. The city crew has continued their work with the telephone and sewer line contractors.

Fees for Dogs Running At-Large were raised to \$15 for pick-up fee and \$5 per day for care. The previous fees were \$5 for pick-up fee and \$2 per day for care.

Santa Anna City officials say the city streets have been taken over of late by dogs running loose. The animal owners are breaking the law by allowing the dogs to run loose. Not only are the owners breaking the law, but by allowing their animals to run loose, they could be contributing to the endangerment of citizens of the town with the unleashed dogs.

Due to the unusual number of dogs running loose, the City of Santa Anna reminds citizens that there is an ordinance against unrestrained dogs.

According to the ordinance a dog at-large is one not under the control of the owner either by a leash, chain, cord or other suitable material attached to a collar or harness on the dog or not restrained securely within an enclosure or fenced premises.

The owner of any dog permitted to run at-large is subject to citation, and if convicted in Municipal Court, and may be fined up to \$200.

Owner should also be aware that it is unlawful to harbor or permit any dog over the age of three months to remain within the City of Santa Anna without having obtained a certificate of vaccination for such dog and having paid an annual license fee of \$2.00 to the City. Dogs must also where the dog tags issued by the veterinarian each year when vaccinated.

All dogs found in violation of the provision of the Ordinance may be impounded by a duly authorized officer of the City.

An impoundment fee of \$15.00 shall be charged for the

impoundment of any dog. A fee of \$5.00 per day shall be charged for the feeding, care and handling of each dog impounded.

The owner of any dog impounded shall have the animal returned to them when any and all fees have been paid.

A licensed dog will be held for six days while an unlicensed dog will only be held for three days.

After the expiration of the redemption of any dog, the Animal Control Office, may without further notice or advertising, sell for cash any unclaimed dog.

A two year contract to Lee Coffman as district administrator;

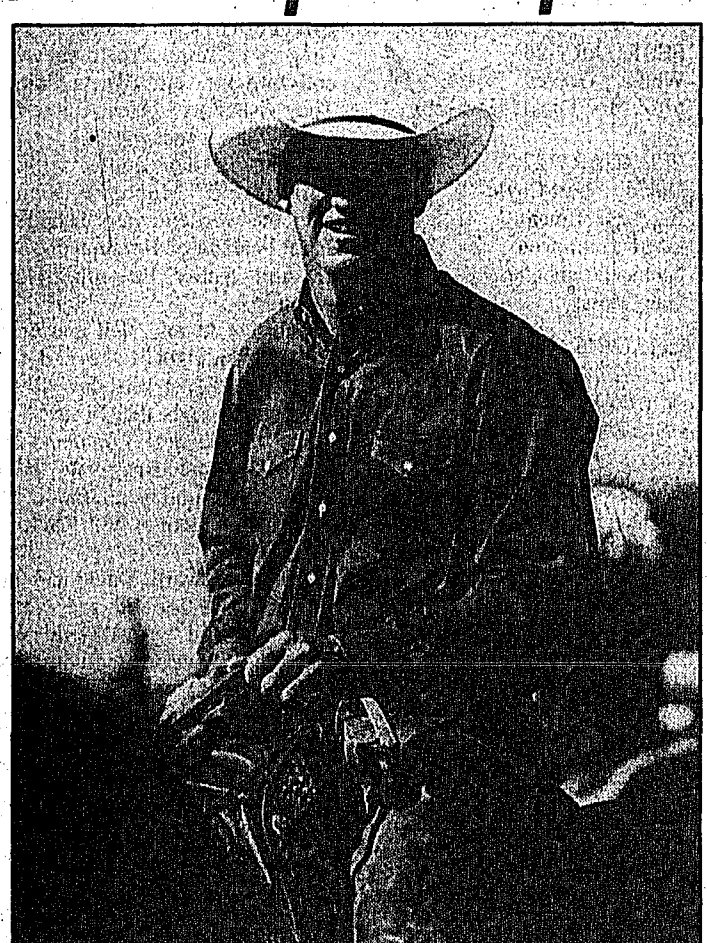
A one year-11 month contract to Debbie Bacon as assistant principal;

Roper Guy Allen Sets Record For Number Of Championships



Guy Allen Wins 11th Roping Championship

Santa Anna native Guy Allen has won an eleventh, roping championship and goes in the record books for having the most championships.

While the cowboy was winning his latest championship at the Lazy E in Guthrie, Oklahoma, his father James Allen who has returned to make Santa Anna his home again, was being named "Super Senior" Roper for 1996 at events taking place at the same arena.

The following article by Bryan Painter appeared in a recently issue of ProRodeo Sports News.

At a rodeo a few months back,

announcer Clem McSpadden was introducing some contestants.

When Guy Allen rode out, McSpadden said, "Wouldn't we all like our children to be like Guy Allen?"

A man sitting close to the announcer's stand turned to his friend and said, "Boy if they were, wouldn't the steer roping be tough?"

It was a fitting tribute to "The Legend".

Normally in the year someone is inducted into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame there's a chance to reflect on a storied career. Instead the Lovington, N.M., cowboy put to-

gether a season worthy of a display all its own.

The end result was an 11th steer roping world championship, which moves him one ahead of barrel racer Charnayne James for the most world championships in one event by a PRCA or WPRA contestant.

"To have people say things like that guy (McSpadden) said makes you feel good," Allen said. "That's what I wanted is to be the best steer roper I could be."

"I want to do my best and let the people make their judgment."

In 1996 his best included much more than the 11th title.

Allen went hard and he went fast—very fast.

Just days after induction into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame, he made PRCA history by tying down a steer in 8.1 seconds in Coffeyville,

Kan.

Then at the NFSR—his 20th consecutive appearance at the world championship event—Allen hustled back into the record books.

In the fifth go, Marty Jones clocked a 9.8-second time to tie the NFSR arena record set by the late Shaun Burchett in 1990.

But Jones predicted the next morning that the record would be beat sometime in the final five rounds.

"Sometimes" came in the seventh round in the form of Allen.

He had seen Jim Davis' run on the steer the night before and had talked to David about it.

"Everything was happening real fast," Allen said. "He (the steer) came out of the chute pretty good, but kind of came to the right and

Troy Fraser To Serve On Property Tax Reform Committee

AUSTIN—Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Marble Falls, has been appointed by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock to a special, 11-member Senate committee examining property tax relief in response to a proposal submitted by Gov. George W. Bush in his State of the State address.

"As a freshman senator, I'm honored and pleased to be part of the committee that will help shape what likely will be the most important part of legislation this session," Fraser said. "Hopefully, Lt. Gov. Bullock recognized my business experience and thought I could make a meaningful contribution."

The Senate Select Committee on Tax Reform and Public School Finance comprises seven Republicans and four Democrats. It is chaired by Sen. Kenneth Armbrister, D-Victoria.

Gov. Bush's plan is intended to lower school property taxes by nearly \$3 billion annually by increasing the sales and motor vehicle taxes, using a \$1 billion in savings from the state budget and implementing a new tax on business.

A special House committee was appointed by Speaker Pete Laney earlier in the session and already has begun hearings on the governor's plan, which is detailed in a 77-page bill (HB4).

Fraser represents Senate District 24, a 21-county area that stretches from Colorado City to Temple.

Doris Richeson Elected To Dairy Queen Board Of Directors

BEDFORD—Doris Richeson, owner of the Dairy Queen store in Santa Anna, has been elected to serve on the board of directors of the Texas Dairy Queen Operators' Council (TDQOC).

Richeson will serve a three-year term on the board, representing Dairy Queen operators in the Abilene, San Angelo and Wichita Falls areas.

Final Income Tax Return Due



As strange as it may seem, tax obligations do not end at death. If people have enough income before dying to require tax returns, then their families or executors must file a final income tax return to report that income and pay any taxes or claim any refund due.

And depending on when a person dies, more than one tax return may need to be filed. For a calendar year taxpayer who dies between January 1 and April 15 without filing the previous year's return, two income tax returns are due. The first is due by April 15 of the year of death. The second and final return is due by April 15 of the following year to report any income and deduct any expenses the decedent (person who died) had between January 1 and the date of death.

All these things can be handled by a personal representative of the decedent's estate: an executor, an administrator, or anyone who is in charge of the decedent's property.

If taxes are owed, the representative must collect them from the estate and send a check with the tax return to the Internal Revenue Service. If a refund is due, the representative must attach to the return a copy of the court certificate showing his or her appointment as representative. This certificate authorizes the IRS to make the refund payment to the decedent's estate. A power of attorney or copy of the will is not acceptable. For those who are not court-appointed or certified personal representatives, a Form 1310, "Statement of Person Claiming Refund Due a Deceased Taxpayer," may be required.

Usually a surviving spouse can file a joint return for the decedent if he or she did not remarry in the year of death. Making a payment or claiming a refund is handled the same way as if the decedent were still living. The surviving spouse does not need to file Form 1310.

The surviving spouse or representative should immediately give notice of the death to all parties, including financial institutions, who paid income to the decedent. This will ensure the proper reporting of income earned by the estate or heirs.

A person's death can also affect the tax returns of the heirs and the estate. It may be wise to have the representative coordinate the filing of all tax returns to make sure they are done correctly.

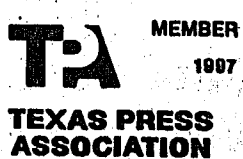

CHILD SUPPORT: SERVING OUR MOST IMPORTANT CLIENTS

THE CHILD SUPPORT Division of the Office of the Attorney General is given one of the most important jobs in our state: Every day we collect child support payments for some of the most important clients any law firm can have: the children of Texas.

It is not the easiest job in the world. All too often, non-custodial parents who owe child support jump from job to job, residence to residence, or state to state, in an effort to avoid paying their obligations.

Our job is to locate absent parents, establish paternity, establish child support orders and orders for medical support, enforce those orders and collect and distribute child support payments.

Continuing progress

Despite these obstacles the Child Support Division continues to exceed the performance of previous years.

The Attorney General's Office has collected in excess of \$3.08 billion since taking over management of the Child Support program from the Texas Department of Human Services in 1983. More than \$2.4 billion alone has been

collected during my administration.

In a report released by the federal government, Texas ranked 7th in the nation in child support collections, up from 14th in 1991. Texas also ranked second in the nation, up from 12th, in paternity establishment and fourth in the nation, up from 21st, in getting court orders for child support.

The use of enforcement weapons such as IRS intercepts, wage-withholding (garnishment), garnishing lottery winnings, license suspension and other standard collection methods has helped bring in more than \$619 million in fiscal year 1996. This represents an overwhelming increase of \$105 million over 1995 collections.

Exceeding the projected goal of \$20 million, the license suspension program collected \$33.2 million during its first year of implementation.

Utilizing all resources

The Internal Revenue Service cooperates with us by forwarding to our office tax refund checks for non-custodial parents who are delinquent in child support payments. In 1996 our office collected \$67 million through the IRS intercept program.

The child support program was handling 399,528 obligated cases at the end of this fiscal year. Before our office may collect delinquent child support payments, there must be a court order requiring the non-custodial parent to pay.

For 447,715 cases, no such order existed. These are the cases in which we must attempt to locate absent parents or begin the process of getting on over-burdened court dockets to establish paternity or child support obligations.

In 1996 the child support program established paternity for 43,891 children — a 10% increase over the prior year.

Collecting child support is a rewarding — and challenging — task. Our improved numbers show that we are making enormous strides in giving children what they deserve. But we will not be satisfied until every dollar owed to every child is collected.
