Students Help With Child Abuse Programs
April is Child Abuse Prevention Month and has been observed this month in Santa Anna and Coleman County. The county Child Welfare Board has been sending a clear message with the billboards located throughout the county. A member of the Board presented a Child Abuse program to the students in the Santa Anna ISD last Tuesday afternoon at an assembly sponsored by the SAHS Student Council. State statistics provided by the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services for Coleman County for the year ending Sept. 30, 1996 showed the following: (1) Child population of Coleman County is 2,272 ; (2) 368 children were identifed by DPRS as "at risk"; (3) 121 children were alleged victims of child abuse and/or neglect. DPAS accepted intakes on them; (4) 55 childran were confirmed as victims by DPRS; (5) This is 24.21 contirmed victims per 1,000 children, (6) There were 79 investigations by DPRS, (7) 30 of the investigations were conirmed as abuse and/or neglect; and (8) This is $38 \%$ of the investigations. Among the 254 counties in the state of Texas, Coleman County's confirmed victims per 1,000 children is the seventh largest in the state. This is in the top $1 / 3$ of one percent of counties.
