About \$800 million in new taxes would be raised and school property taxes would be cut by an average 17 cents per \$100 valuation under the Senate committee's plan, while the House plan would raise \$3.8 billion in new taxes to pay for school property tax cuts of 60 cents per \$100 valuation.

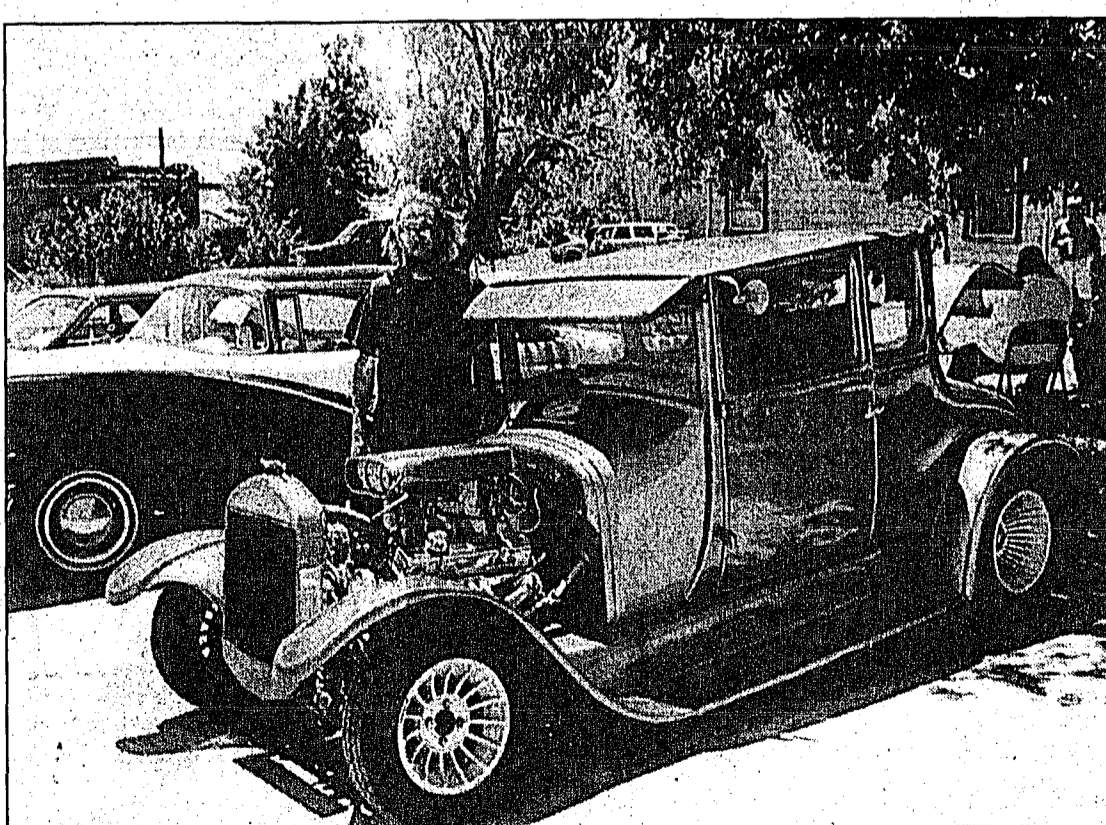
If the Senate passes the bill, a final version must be hashed out in a conference committee of senators and representatives.

May Sales Tax Rebates Up Here

State Comptroller of Public Accounts John Sharo mailed sales tax rebates last week to cities and counties across the state of Texas.

The City of Santa Anna received a check for \$9,896.21, an increase of 145.44% over the same period in 1996. Coleman's payment amounted to \$46,412.63, an increase of .57% over last year's payment at this time.

Brownwood's receipts held pretty steady, up only .24%; Bangs' receipts were down by 2.73%; and Early's receipts showed a 1.26% dip.

The rebates included local taxes collected on March sales by businesses filing monthly returns

and reported to the Comptroller in April, and those businesses filing quarterly returns for January, February and March. The state as a whole showed an increase of 5.6% over this time last year.

Glen Donham Commended For Naval Duty Accomplishments

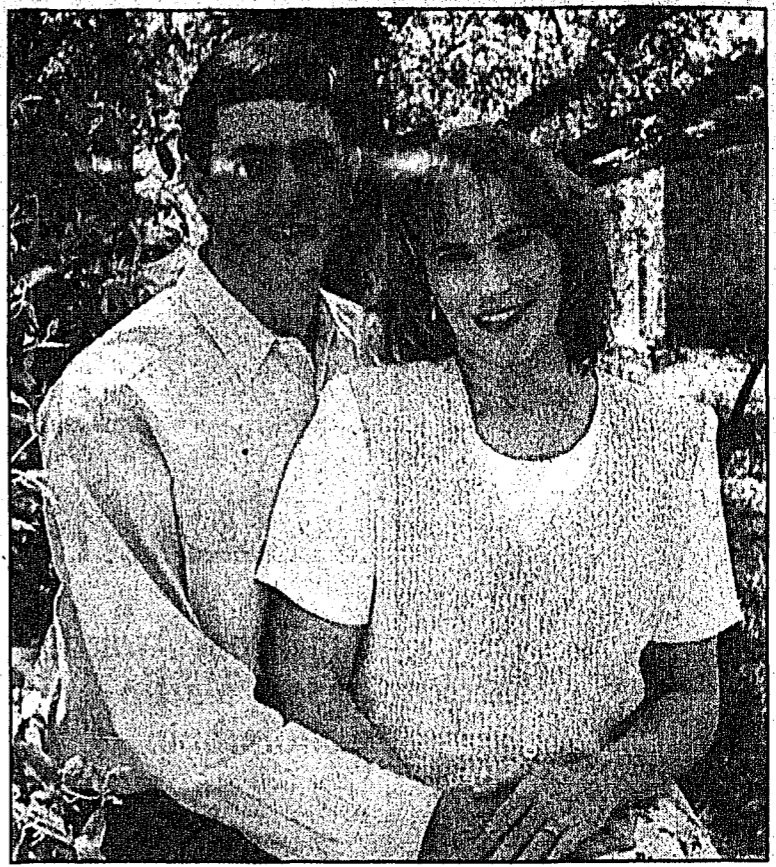

Consequences As A Parenting Tool

Consequences can be a useful tool for parents to have in their parenting tool box. Parents need to know how to use consequences for molding and shaping children's behavior. Consequences are at work all the time. We run into them everyday—on our job, at home, with friends, and so on. If we don't get our work done, the boss criticizes us. If we don't remember to let the dog outside, he leaves a calling card. Consequences affect all of us, positively and negatively.

As parents, it helps to understand why giving consequences to our kids is so essential. Consequences teach kids to think. Consequences help children learn that their actions lead to results, both positive and negative. They learn that life of full choices and the choices they make greatly influence what happens to them.

Knowing how to use consequences to teach kids is so important. If consequences have the power to change behavior, it makes sense that we should use them to benefit our kids. The basics of using consequences with children include the following:

BE CLEAR. Make sure your child knows what the consequence is and who and what he or she did to earn or lose it.

BE CONSISTENT. Don't give a big consequence for a behavior one time and then ignore the same behavior the next time.

BE BRIEF. This is especially true with younger children. Clear messages usually get lost when you lecture.

FOLLOW THROUGH. If you set up a deal for your child to earn a positive consequence, be sure he gets the reward after he's done what he needs to. Likewise for a negative consequence.

BE AS PLEASANT AS POSSIBLE. This is generally easier when you give positive consequences. But, when you give negative consequences, keep it in mind, as well. Yelling and screaming are not effective. Kids cannot hear your words, they can only hear your anger.

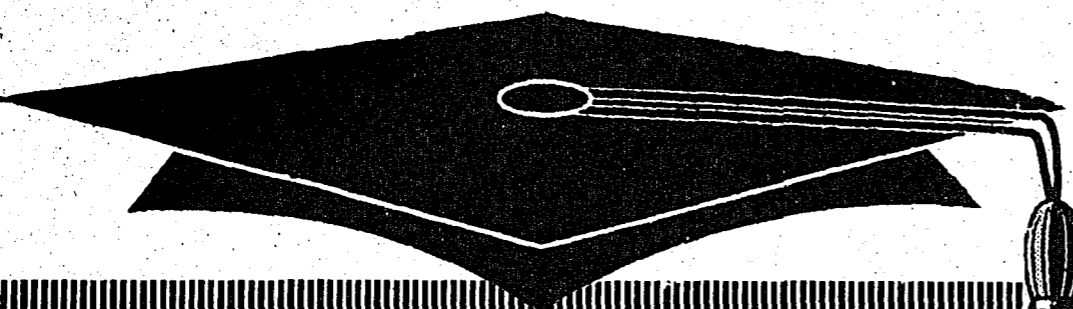
The following is a list of positive consequences that parents can use that cost no money:

Stay up late, stay out late, have a friend over, go over to a friend's house, one less chore, extra TV or video game time, pick a movie, stay up late reading, time with mom and dad, use car, extra phone time, plan the menu, special snacks, sit at the head of the table, messy room for a day, sleep downstairs or outside, shorter study period, extra night out with friends, permission for a special event, extra time on the computer and pick breakfast cereal.

Fishing Lake Ivie

The water temperature at Lake Ivie is ranging from mid 60's on the main lake to 70 degrees or more in the shallow sloughs and coves. The temperature is ideal for catching most game fish and the great fishing in relatively shallow water should continue for the next few weeks, or until the water warms to about 80 degrees and the fish start spending more time in deeper water. White bass have become aggressive the past week or so and we have begun to appreciate the color red as they have turned on to red colored lures. We are using the Exacluber Spot from Pradco, mostly in shallow water but then started letting it sink a little in deeper water. Largemouths started grabbing the red lures a couple of weeks ago and then the whites started going for them, too.

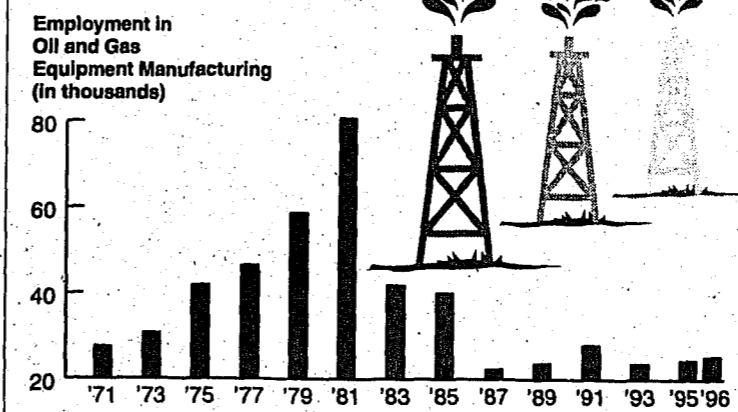

SCHOLARSHIP SCAMS HURT STUDENTS

SINCE 1980, THE COST OF tuition at public colleges and universities nationwide has risen three times faster than household income, putting many parents and students in a severe financial bind. As a result, thousands of Texas students search for financial assistance to help pay for their education. Scholarships are the

most attractive form of financial aid because they have no work-study requirements and do not have to be repaid. At the same time, the amount of scholarship funding is shrinking when compared with loans and other forms of financial aid. The competition for scholarship dollars is fierce. We at the Office of the Attorney General know that this creates the perfect environment for scholarship scams. 300,000 victims According to the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, roughly 300,000 people are victimized by scholarship scams each year, losing more than \$50 million that could have gone toward paying tuition. Students and parents are lured into

these scams by tales of billions of dollars in hidden scholarship money going unused each year. In reality, more than 96 percent of all available scholarship funds are distributed to students each year. Some common scholarship scams are: The scholarship prize. This is a variation on the old "lucky winner" scam, in which you are required to pay an up-front fee to receive the scholarship. The scholarship with an application fee. This looks like a real scholarship, and may even hand out some money, but the amount of fees received far outweighs the amount given in scholarships. The low-interest loan. In this scam, you are asked for an initiation or insurance fee up front. Real student loans charge these fees when the money is disbursed. The scholarship search service. This service guarantees that you will win a scholarship or your money will be refunded. If they do provide you with any information, it is usually out-of-date or worthless. While there are legitimate financial aid search firms that will compile a list of scholarships you might qualify for, you can find nearly all of this information yourself by spending some time in the library, at your high school or college financial aid office, or on the Internet. Common tip-offs Some common clues to a scholarship scam include: "We have access to scholarships you won't hear about anywhere else or that aren't readily available to the public." "We will do all the work for you." In reality, applicants usually must fill out their own scholarship and financial aid forms. "You have been selected by a national foundation to receive a scholarship" or "You are a finalist in a scholarship competition." Chances are you have never heard of the foundation and did not apply for the competition. "We guarantee you a scholarship or your money back." No one can guarantee that you will

Other signs of a scholarship scam are the use of official-sounding names that imply a connection to the government (like "Federal", "Division" and "Administration"), having a mail drop for a return address, not providing a telephone number, claiming that everyone is eligible, undue time pressure, and excessive hype. I wish you the best of luck in your search for financial assistance as you pursue your educational goals.

was convicted of the 1987 murder of a co-worker at a College Station diner.

Peggy Griffey, who heads the capital punishment section of the Texas attorney general's office, said the legislation is needed to create uniform competency procedures.

Another bill that passed the House and is pending in the Senate would allow sheriffs and other law enforcement officials to order evaluations of those arrested for crimes to determine if those arrested are mentally ill or retarded, and then, to make special arrangements for their confinement.

The bill, by Rep. Allen Place, D-Gatesville, and Sen. Mike Moncrief, D-Fort Worth, would help in gauging punishment.

Concerning the execution of Washington, Place said that if an evaluation had been ordered, the prosecutor might have considered the defendant's retardation as a mitigating factor and opted for a life sentence instead of the death penalty, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

Senate OKs Records Bill

The Senate passed a bill last week that would make criminal case records public again.

SB 1101, by Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, is aimed at undoing a Texas Supreme Court decision last year that closed those records maintained by Texas district

- Wentworth said his bill would:
 - Make criminal case files open to the public unless the release of the information would not interfere law enforcement investigations.
 - Exempt from disclosure attorneys' working papers, including notes about witnesses.
 - Exempt from disclosure information that did not lead to prosecution.

Wentworth's bill has moved to the House, where a similar bill was defeated in April.

Bill Expands Open Records Law. Earlier, the Senate approved a bill that would subject private companies that take over government duties to the state's open records and open meetings laws.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria, is aimed at ensuring that the public can monitor how tax money is being spent as more state functions are assigned to private companies.

The bill would apply to companies that are awarded contracts worth at least \$1 million to perform services that had been done by a governmental entity.

Governor Sent Castration Bill. The House has sent Gov. George W. Bush a bill that would make Texas the first state to perform surgical castration on prisoners who are repeat child molesters.

The House voted 138-7 in favor of the bill to make surgical castration available on a voluntary basis to inmates who had been convicted at least twice of aggravated sexual assault of a child, indecency with a child or sexual assault of a child.

The bill had previously been approved by the Senate.
