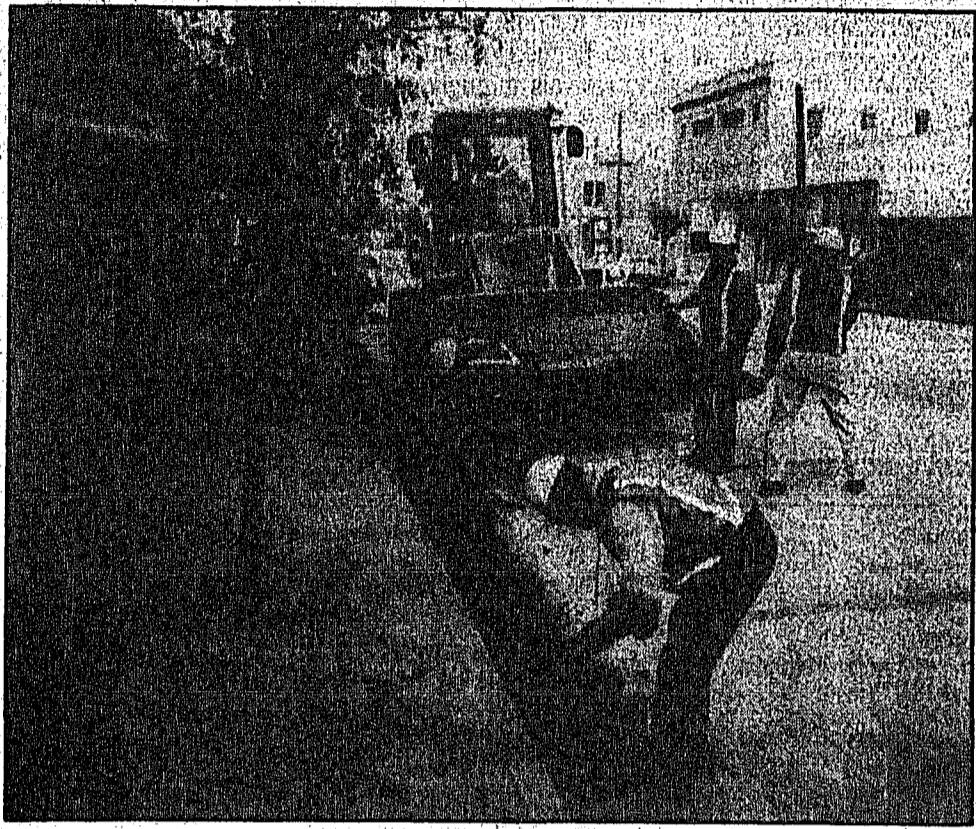

After a week or so of wondering if there were going to be any candidates, the City Hall and School Administration office have both had several applicants for the City Council and School Board respective elections.

We told you last week there had been no candidates for City Council or the Mayor's seat. We now have David Powell and Ellen Goodwin along with incumbent Jim Spillman as candidates for two places of full terms. Jean Findley

has decided to ask for election to the unexpired term to which she had been appointed in late 1996. Rick Grissom joins her on the ballot as another candidate for the unexpired term.

Mike Pritchard, currently serving on the City Council, and Becky Ramirez had previously signed up as candidates for the School Board. Incumbent Barbara Simmons had announced she would not seek reelection to the school board. Since that time Sharon Guthrie, the other

incumbent whose term is expiring, has filed as a candidate for reelection, bringing that total to three now running for the two places on the board to be filled in the election.

Deadline for filing in either election is Wednesday, March 19. City candidates must make application during business hours at the City Hall. School Board candidates sign up at the school administration office.

Santa Anna High School's one act play cast and crew will present "I'm a Fool" on Monday evening, March 17 beginning at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

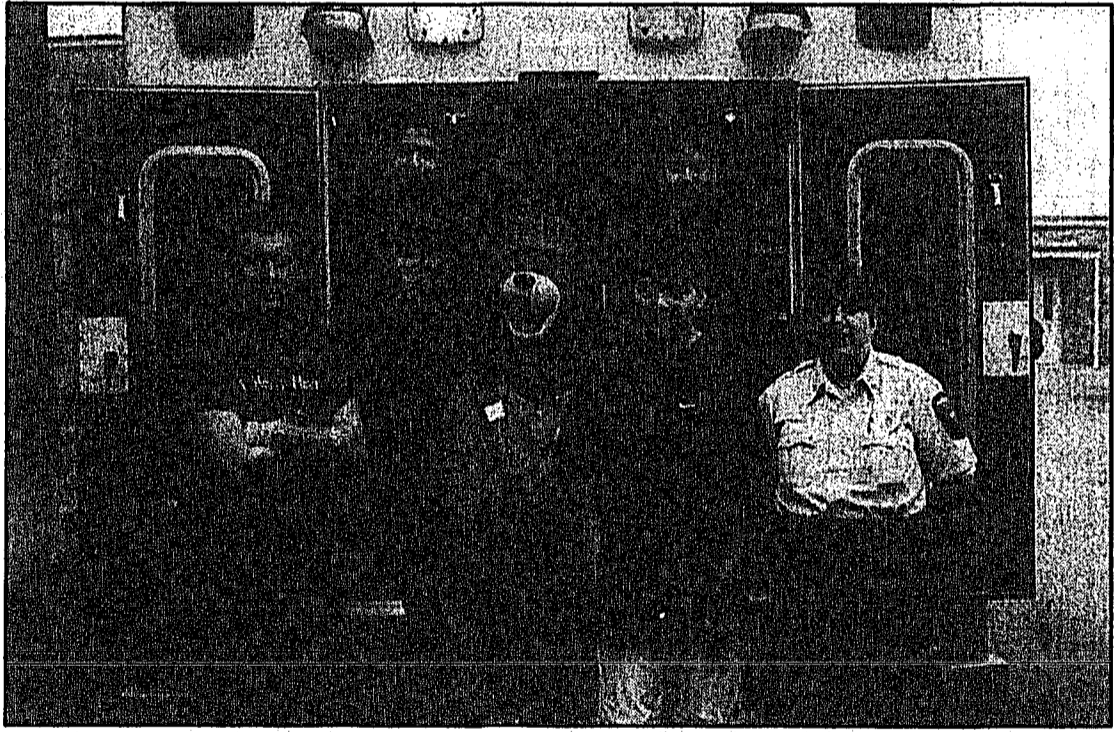
Admission will be \$2.00 for

## Mickey Mantle Inspired West Texas Little Leaguer By Example

Editors Note: The following article written by Rockwood native, Mike Estes, appeared recently in the Lubbock Avalanche.

After we Rockwood Indians played our championship game, I adopted by first philosophy of life. Mickey Mantle changed my philosophy the coming October.

We undefeated Indians were heavy favorites to whip the Trickham Tricksters. It was our 1960 Little League climatic game. We deserved to win.

We practiced the most in our ten-team league. Many of us played baseball between chores all day. Even the busiest ranch boys made our structured evening practices.

The day before our big game, our crackerjack second baseman Ronnie Pete Cooper and I decided to spy on the Tricksters. Older Cousin Bruce Estes bounced us down a ten-mile dirt road.

Sure enough, the lazy Tricksters were playing tag in Trickham's deserted cotton gin. Later Bruce heard the Tricksters spend the afternoon swimming on the Colorado River instead of playing baseball.

Bruce doubled his dollar bet on us Indians.

We had the most bats, although they were all the same size. Ronnie Pete probably had the league's best glove before he started chewing up the glove's middle fin-

ger. I blamed his chewing on a vitamin deficiency.

During the league's best in-field practice, Coach Big Shorty often

told us that if he could run, hit and catch like Mickey Mantle, he would be in the big leagues. You could count on Big Shorty for other astute observations.

Unlike the sorry Santa Anna teams, we Indians were smart, but aggressive base runners. Like Big Shorty preached, "First base, second base, third base, home. Around those bases, we will roam!"

Our pitcher was the league's best. He threw hundreds of small rocks daily. Many were aimed at his older sister's blue-jeaned knees.

The day for our glorious, deserved championship victory finally arrived. It would be a welcome break and reward. Fence and brush work was mainly past, but the hard summer hay season lay ahead.

By the third inning, two balls had bounced through Ronnie Pete's legs. They sneaked under his diminishing middle glove finger.

Big Shorty had directed traffic for a road construction crew all day. As third base coach, he waved us into three thrown outs at home.

Our pitcher hit four Tricksters on the knee. My two hard singles could not carry us. We lost, 8 to 6.

We losers were decent sports. The way the Tricksters celebrated,

their triumph had to improve their feelings about themselves.

Maybe they would give up their silly cotton gin games.

While I nightly scratched my hay rash, I slowly realized that even with the stock show's best steer, I could still lose. I needed to just enjoy the competition and not work quite so hard.

That October the underdog Pittsburgh Pirates won the World Series. My dusty West Texas Yankee heart broke again.

Shortly I read that after the Yankees' loss, Mickey Mantle said good things about the Pirates. But he cried in the locker room. He cried again on the return flight to

New York.

Mickey Mantle had already won seven championships in his first nine seasons.

Maybe he usually won because he hated losing so much.

On our spy mission before our big game, Cousin Bruce barricaded the Tricksters in their cotton gin.

But Bruce was right after all. We should have stirred up the snakes on the Colorado River.
