AUSTIN — The state Senate approved a \$83.3 billion state budget last week that would increase funding for public schools, prisons and social services programs.

But the 1998-99 budget does not include pay raises for state employees and education programs such as Gov. George W. Bush's \$470 million reading initiative and a \$1 billion back-to-basics program sought by university officials to increase the number of graduates.

"Higher education pay raises have been forced to take a back seat to public education and prisons," said Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant.

Also not included in the budget, which is now up for consideration by a House and Senate conference committee, is the \$1 billion surplus from Texans who belong to such from the 1996-97 budget that Gov.

Bush has proposed using for school

property tax relief. "The budget keeps the scales balanced between the state's most critical services and the taxpayer's demand for leaner government," said Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who

presides over the Senate. The proposed budget would increase general tax revenue for public schools by 7.7 percent, prisons by 8 percent and social services funding by 3 percent.

Ratliff said general revenues of about \$600 million in the proposed budget would be available to spread across more than \$5 billion worth of wish-list items compiled by state

legislators. Tax Them All, Bush Says

Last week, the House Select Committee on Revenue and Public Education Funding continued in its quest to raise \$5.7 billion to cut property taxes by killing sales tax exemptions and expanding the franchise tax to include partner-

Gov. Bush said that to help pay for property tax relief, he supports taxing all types of business,

including partnerships. "This plan ought to make sure there are no loopholes for people who are in the business world. support including all forms of business entities in this plan," he



#### The Way It Was In 1930's

This picture of Santa Anna High School was reproduced from a postcard that was put out in the mid-1930's. It shows the building when it was covered with vines which had to be removed at a later date due to the fact they were deteriorating the mortar. This building which we in Santa Anna are still so proud of was built in 1927. An article from a 1927 edition of the Santa Anna News describes the "new building" as a "two-story brick and stone with reinforced concrete. It has a tile roof of Spanish Renaissance design. One of the distinctive features of the design is the use of symbolic ornaments. Around the main entrance of the building are grouped six plaques representing Sam Houston, Stephen F. Austin and the four well-known Alamo heroes, Travis, Bonham, Bowie and Crockett. Four shields are also used; on either side of the entrance, the Mexican shield, the Teas Republic shield, and over the fountain niches in the end bays, the United States shield and Confederate shield." #### **Last Minute Tax** Help is Available

DALLAS--Time is running out to file those federal income tax returns and with the April 15 deadline less than two weeks away, the message from the Internal Revenue Service is "Don't wait. File now."

As of March 28, 1997, the IRS received 1,767,500 individual income tax returns from North Texans. 55.818 more returns than were filed at this time last year.

The increase in tax filing may be attributed to popular filing alternatives such as Telefile and Electronic Filing. TeleFile is a file by telephone system available to people who received a special tax booklet this year. "TeleFile is an easy, fast and paperless way of filing taxes and 115,521 North Texans have already chosen to file their taxes this way," said Bobby Scott, North Texas district director.

An estimated 3.4 million people in North will file their individual tax returns this year. For people who have not opened their tax booklet yet, the IRS encourages 4160. them not to wait much longer. "File as soon as you can," Scott

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
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
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
