





According to a City official, 35% (268) of the registered voters within the city limits of Santa Anna must sign the petition in order for an election to be held.

The petition is asking for an election allowing legal sale of beer for off-premise consumption within the city limits of Santa Anna. The required number of signatures must be obtained within 31 days from last Thursday, April 10, which was the first day the petition signature forms were placed before the public.

"We have more kids being pushed into special education for the wrong reasons. More often than not, it is a place where kids are languishing in an educational cesspool that forever labels and stifles their educational progress," Dutton said.

Education Commissioner Mike Moses believes special education students should be tested and their scores counted. "We need to get as many children as possible in the assessment system," he said.
