
Jack Bain



The American Heritage Rivers Initiative Makes No Sense

Quality (CEQ) published a notice in the Federal Register announcing the American Heritage Rivers Initiative (AHRI), following up on a promise by the President in his State of the Union address to designate 10 rivers as American Heritage Rivers in 1997. The CEQ had allowed a scant 21 days for public comments, after which the President could issue an executive order making the new federal Program official. Since then. citizens and elected officials from the county level to the U.S. Senate have been scrambling to make sense of the initiative, in order to submit meaningful comments by the deadline.

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Toward that end, my office called the CEQ on May 22 to learn more what problem does the AHRI seek to solve? What are its goals and purposes? These questions are relevant to Texas, because Land Commissioner Garry Mauro is working with the White House to have the entire Rio Grande designated as one of the first 10 American Heritage Rivers. So far, neither the phone call to the CEQ, my June 10 letter to Garry Mauro, nor a July 9 briefing by the CEQ's Ray Clark and Assistant Land Commissioner Ty Fain have yielded many, if any, specifics about the initiative. No one can explain what will be possible with a federal designation that is not possible now.

According to the CEQ, the problem is poor performance by federal agencies. The AHRI will reinvent government and thereby improve the delivery of services by 13 federal agencies using existing budgets and no new regulations. Apparently, there is money enough for local projects such as water and waste water treatment plants and economic development, but federal agencies are doing a poor job of getting the money back to the communities.

A petition must be based upon some aspect of restoring the river. What does that mean? According to the CEQ, a petition might be based upon restoring stream flow which would be accomplished by removing impediments (dams, levees. impoundments) to natural flow of water. When asked how that might impact drinking water supplies, surface water permits for irrigation, hydroelectric power or flood control, the CEQ employee either. allowed that restoration of stream flow by actually removing obstructions might be going too far, but could not suggest other everything we know about federal ways a river's original stream flow might be restored. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Conservation Commission (TNRCC) are charged with carrying out the mandates imposed by that federal act. Does the AHRI suggest these agencies are failing at their jobs as well? Furthermore, if the AHRI involves no new regulations, what more can be done under a federal designation that is not already possible under the Clean Water Act? In 1994, we rejected an effort to designate five Texas water bodies as Outstanding National Resource Waters. We understood

then that the federal designation would severely and unnecessarily restrict land use surrounding the designated water body. The fact that the water bodies contained such high quality water was testament enough that the state already was doing an excellent job managing our natural resources.

Also in I 994, we managed to fend off the federal designation of 33 central-Texas counties as critical habitat for the endangered goldencheeked warbler. Again, Texans understood that the designation would deny them of the right to own, maintain and transfer their private property without federal involvement. And again, the fact that the creatures were thriving in these counties was testament to the fact that Texans do an excellent job of taking care of their land.

No one yet has explained how the federal designation of the Rio Grande River as an American Heritage River will be different from any other federal designation. Yes, water quality in the Rio Grande needs to be improved, but we need to be honest about the source of the pollution. Texas is doing its share. Mexico still dumps raw sewage into the river. And, yes, we need good clean economic development projects in communities along the Rio Grande. But we don't need a federal designation to make that happen,

In my humble view, the American Heritage Rivers Initiative makes no sense. Based upon designations, I cannot imagine why anyone would offer up the Rio Grande as a federal American purpose of restoring stream flow Heritage River for any reason, much less as an incentive for federal agencies to shape up.

The new deadline for public comments on the initiative has been extended to August 19. After that time, it is my understanding have a Clean Water Act which President Clinton will sign the executive order breathing life into the AHRI. We in Texas may not be able to change that, but we can and Texas Natural Resource should adopt a wait and see approach before requesting the federal designation of Texas river. In the meantime, I suggest we invite the heads of those 13 federal

agencies to Texas and ask them to outline for us the array of federal programs which offer assistance to



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
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

All Heads **Need Helmets**

Bicycle crashes are one of the most common cause of sports and recreational injuries. More than 1.000 people die annually in America from bicycle injuries--with as many as 75 percent of deaths being caused by head trauma. Each year, brain injuries permanently disable 7,000-9,000 American bicyclists. The real tragedy is that head trauma doesn't have to happen.

Research shows that bike helmets may reduce risk of head injury by 85 percent. Helmets work by absorbing and distributing the impact of the crash before reaching the brain. A bicyclist must wear a helmet on every bike trip. Here are some tips for choosing and wearing bicycle helmets:

*Look for a helmet label with ANSI. ASTM or Snell. These labels note that the helmet has passed a safety standard.

*Choose a properly-sized helmet. The helmet should fit snugly and feel comfortable.

The front straps should be vertical and in front of the ear (see manufacturing instructions).

*The helmet lip should fit about one inch above the eyebrow. That



MEDICARE REPAIR

edicare is on the financial critical list. The Congressional Budget Office says that the Medicare trust fund will be broke in the year 2001. It ran a deficit for the first time last year and will run a \$12 billion deficit this year. If this "patient" doesn't receive immediate treatment, all taxpayers will be called upon to provide a massive transfusion of cash very shortly.

On June 24, the Senate approved a prescription that will help save the Medicare system so it will be there for current and future generations of Americans.

The medicine includes a provision to slowly raise the eligibility age for future recipients from age 65 to age 67. This will take place by increasing the eligibility age one month each year for 24 years beginning in the year 2003. To honor commitments made to those nearest to eligibility, this change will not affect anyone now 59 or older.

In 1983, facing a Social Security system on the verge of bankruptcy, Congress and President Reagan changed the age provision in Social Security, raising the eligibility age gradually from 65 to 67 by the year 2027. The Senate has voted to put Medicare on the same track for much the same reason.

For example, if you were born in 1942, Social Security benefits and Medicare coverage will begin for you when you are 65 years and 10 months of age. If you were born in 1950, Social Security and Medicare coverage will begin for you when you are 66 years old.

This measure will help to stabilize Medicare until badly needed structural reforms can be implemented to restore Medicare to sound financial health. It seems a reasonable step to take to ensure that Medicare still exists when Baby Boomers and Generation-Xers retire.

The alternative would be eventually to raise payroll taxes a whopping 250 percent on working families least able to afford it, or drastically reduce the coverage provided all beneficiaries.

To do nothing would be totally reckless. We had to make some tough decisions here. When Medicare was enacted, the average life expectancy for men at age 65 was about 13 more years, for women, about 16. In 2030, when the age provision is fully phased in, the average life expectancy for men at age 65 will have risen to 17 years, for women, to 20.5 years. Raising the eligibility age slowly represents a modest step that will help save the system and give people plenty of time to plan. Many people now continue to work past 65 and, according to trends, more will in the future.

The Senate bill also includes a provision that increases the premium for Part B Medicare services for seniors making over \$50,000 a year and couples making over \$75,000 a year. (Part B is a voluntary program that includes all physician services after retirement.) All of the savings collected from this provision will go directly to the Medicare trust fund. Asking our seniors who can afford to do so to pay a little more for this voluntary program is one more way for us to save the Medicare program, while keeping our commitment to providing health care at reasonable cost for all. (The increase for those affected would range from \$42.80 to \$175 per month, depending on the amount earned in excess of \$50,000 per year.)

Congress and the President have the responsibility to meet this crisis, and 38 million Medicare beneficiaries have the right to expect decisive leadership rather than gimmicks. Our principal concern is to make sure that Medicare beneficiaries continue to have access to quality health care.

This bill now goes to conference between the House and Senate and must be signed by the President. I would be interested in your views on this solution, and if you disagree with it, what thoughts you may have on how we can ensure Medicare will be there for every senior citizen now and in the

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

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


