Prohibition Repeal Submitted to States

The Blaine amendment to the United States Constitution, end-ing the fifteen year regime of federal prohibition was submitted Tuesday to the Forty-eight states for ratification. Secretary of State fittmson mailed copies of the amendment, together with an explanatory letter to the governors of the states, asking them to inform the State Department when the state conventions had acted on the amendment. When thirty-six states have raticled it, the Secretary of State can proclaim it to be in full effect.

For the first time in 157 years of American Constitutionalism a secretary of state has asked the states to decide whether they will strike from the constitution ng amendment they previously pul on it.


