



Coleman Rodeo Starts Thursday Quadrille Team Is New Feature

Fans attending the Coleman Rodeo are in for a treat when Coleman County Cowgirls arrive astride their trusty steeds.

Eleven county ladies will perform a quadrille routine just prior to the Grand Entry each evening of the rodeo as well as a grand finale at the completion of the three nightly shows.

Precision and timing are extremely important when performing a quadrille at a fast pace. The girls have been practicing since April.

Quadrille riding is not new to the Coleman Rodeo. In the late 40's and early 50's, routines were performed by cowgirls and cowboys. They called their routines 'square dancing' horseback and rode together in 'twos'.

For many reasons, I spent a year in Bosnia with the International Police Task Force (IPTF). Some were valid but curiosity was an important factor.

Bosnia & IPTF- Bosnia had previously been part of the former Yugoslavia and had been torn by four years of civil war. The war halted as a results of the Peace Accord reached in Dayton, Ohio.

At Dayton, the world community committed to establishing a free and democratic police force for the newly created nation. Thus the International Police Task Force came into being. Its mission was to establish, monitor, and advise in the establishment of a democratic police force for Bosnia.

War - Initially, the war was an effort to hold Yugoslavia together, but soon evolved into a religious conflict. Resulting in an attempt by the Serbians to annihilate the Muslims population of Bosnia or force them out. How this came about, I can not begin to explain. It's impossible for an outsider to comprehend what occurred, because people themselves do not understand. I am sure the historians will develop many complex theories, but the only explanation that is reasonable to me stems from the deep hatred and the entire population going insane at the same instant. It's difficult to believe what went on and the atrocities which occurred. But more confusing is the total failure, to date, to bring those who are responsible to justice. Currently, the Western


World has more than sufficient military forces in place to achieve this with little danger to NATO military or UN personnel. In my opinion, should NATO withdraw without the Western World first arresting and bring to trial those responsible, there will be a renewal of the conflict within a year. The Muslims, will not allow this to end without first justice for the thousands of victims of ethnic

cleansing. Other contributing factors are an imposed cease fire, with no clear victor and a country composed of three completely different segments, divided by hatred and religion.

The Bosnians - I spent most of my time in the Muslim sector and came to the conclusion that these people are first and foremost Europeans. They are Muslims but, as in this country, most were born into their religions and are not consumed by it. In no way can they be compared with the Muslims in the Middle East. Kulen Vakuf - To illustrate the impact of the war upon the people of Bosnia I will use as an example the small Muslim community of Kulen Vakuf (about the same population of Santa Anna) where I worked for ten weeks. Kulen Vakuf is typical of what occurred. In June 1992, approximately 5,500 individuals lived in the valley surrounding Kulen Vakuf. The area provided 1,300 soldiers, of which 214 are missing in combat, 105 were killed, 109 taken prisoner and 64 were handicapped. One of the schools located in Kulen Vakuf was the fifth oldest in Bosnia. The school's teachers and students were



Carol Voss shared a book this week. If you know anyone who has a copy of The Service Book of



With the religious fervor of an Amway salesman and the salesmanship of a Southern Baptist, Benny Cecil seized the microphone and shouted, "Welcome to the 56th Annual Estes Family Reunion!".

Cakes fell, and the dead rose from the nearby cemetery at the deafening blast.

This year's reunion was under way, in a new place, with a new style. In 1940, 14 grown brothers and sisters gathered in their parents' West Texas pasture, 40 miles southwest of Brownwood. (Rockwood).

Good guitar-picking, bad singing, loud guffawing from the men, quiet gossip among the women, cool watermelons and hot afternoons spent in the paltry shade of mesquite trees have been early summer annual events since. That is, until this vear

Early Friday arrivals fish and swim in the Colorado River. Horseshoes, dominoes, barbecuing, baseball and storytelling fill Saturdays, Until this year.

Each generation produces young buck-toothed cowboys who terrorize everyone under 16. Dunking Betty June (Cecil Day's wife) and Joe Fred in the horse trough has been among the tamer stunts.

Sunday mornings are much like Saturdays. Each of the 14 clans pose for group photos. Bets are made about which preacher cousin will turn dinner thanks, and how lengthy the prayer will be. At noon, a 30-foot outdoor buffet is attacked like Omaha Beach. Those at the back of the huge line are as illplaced as country dogs in the city. Several years ago, two osgood pies were rustled in midmorning. After, that, the aging bakers watched their prizes without blinking until they were eaten in the proper fashion.

My favorite cousins still come. Onetime young cowboy bully Bruce now annually spins his yarns. He declares that he hasn't ridden his horse to church in 20 years, although lately I hear he sometimes wears house shoes to evening services.

Sixty-ish Mattie Ella still tells everyone off like a trail bossette. In 1993, while flying home just in time for the reunion, she explained livestock castration and cow horses to comedian Steve Martin. She did

Vernon is everyone's favorite. Years ago, during the period when he was a decent bronc buster, he strangely fell off a moving tractor. When asked why he tumbled, he flashes his wolf-like grin and only admits, "Well, it wasn't easy."

Arm wrestling is not as popular these days since we men gave up taking on Willie Frances and the other womenfolk.

The food doesn't taste as good either, mainly because my greataunts' hands no longer prepare it. The good guitar-picking hands have passed on, too.

But surprisingly, little else changed about our reunion since 1940. That is, not much changed until this year.

A few cousins have stood in a red ant bed while wearing sandals. Or have backed up to cactus while wearing shorts.

A few cousins no longer play dominoes or horseshoes or listen to long stories.

A few cannot spend an hour away from central air, or survive 25 miles from a convenience store.

These few, still a distinct numerical minority, moved the Estes reunion to a big, nice, modern Brownwood motel, beginning this year. The malcontents were organized, and they had a purpose.

Like most Progress, this will be hard to roll back.

But this reunion, like my old granddad, will continue.



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This week President Clinton endorsed new air quality standards proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). I have been a consistent opponent of the implementation of these new standards for ozone and dust, not because I do not want our children to breathe healthy air, but because the Administration's own experts do not agree on the benefits of this legislation. It is crucial that our environmental policy be based on sound scientific information.

I had hoped that the tremendous uncertainty surrounding the science on which the standards were based would convince the President to delay or block implementation.

Unfortunately, the Administration has, indicated that they will impose these unnecessary cost-burdens on agriculture, industry, and small businesses without any indication that there will be a tangible health benefit in return. Implementing these strict new standards without an adequate cost benefit analysis will only deliver another blow to the viability of rural America.

ESTATE TAX RELIEF

This week the House of Representatives considered several proposals to cut taxes. I voted against the Republican tax cut proposal which was passed by the House because it failed to target tax relief to small businesses, family farms, and working men and women.

While the legislation which the House passed included some estate tax relief, that relief would be phased in over a long time period rather than being effective immediately. As anyone who has owned a family farm or small business knows, estate taxes are an area where immediate relief is needed. I attempted to change the bill to provide for immediate estate tax relief for family businesses and family farms.

Unfortunately, the House leadership opposed this effort because they preferred other tax cuts that I believe

are not as important as estate tax relief.

The Senate is currently considering tax cut legislation, and the differences between the House and Senate bills must be reconciled in a conference committee. I will be actively involved in the negotiation of the final tax cut legislation, and I am hopeful that it will include true estate tax relief which is of real importance to rural America and the 17th District
