Terry McIver Purchases Grain Elevator Area Farmers Anticipating Best Grain Harvest In Years

The grain elevator in Santa Anna will be open for the coming grain season, operating under the name of Central Texas Grain. Terry McIver has purchased the elevator from Alderman-Cave Company of Winters, who have owned it for the past 15 years. The facility was not open last year because of the poor grain crop in this area.

McIver was the previous owner of the business that operated under the Central Texas Grain name for about ten years. Alderman-Cave did extensive improvements at the facility, and it will be in operations when the grain harvest opens in a few weeks.

Area farmers are anticipating the best grain harvest in a number of years as a result of the good rains and growing conditions.

Coleman Air Show Saturday

The Coleman Air Show will be held Saturday, May 24 at the Coleman Municipal Airport.

New to the show this year will be the "Young Eagles" program, where youngsters age eight to 17 will have the opportunity to fly from 9 a.m. until noon.

The show will begin a 9 a.m. with radio-controlled airplanes fly-

ing through their paces. The airport will close from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. as the aerobatics portion of the show occurs. Four warbirds--the T-b, T-34, the Yak and F-86--will put on a show for spectators. Various fly-bys by World II aircraft are scheduled.

There will be helicopters from Fort Hood and parachutists from

Dallas as well as small civilian aerobatic displays.

The concession will be run by members of the Coleman Aviation Club with proceeds to benefit the Meals on Wheels program and the Senior Citizen.

There is no admission charge to the show.

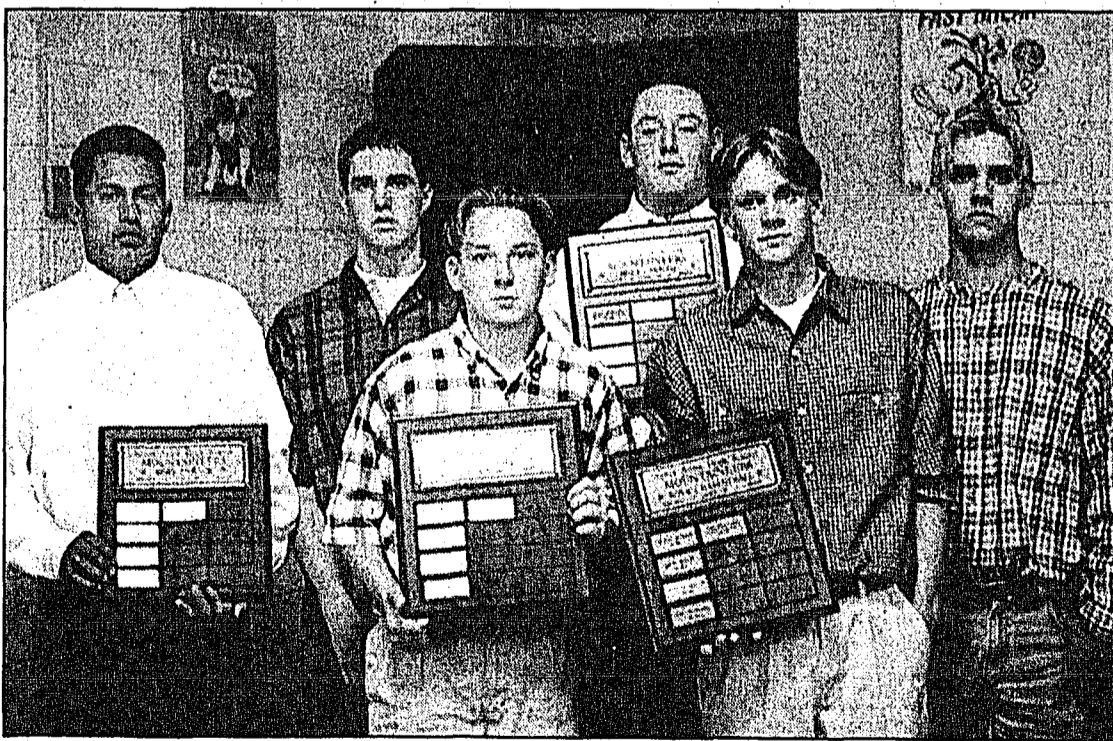
The bank and post office will also be closed. Other businesses may be closed, so you might want to make a call before making a trip to town on Monday.

Stenholm Announces Head Start Funding

Small party favors were distributed as the students returned to school.

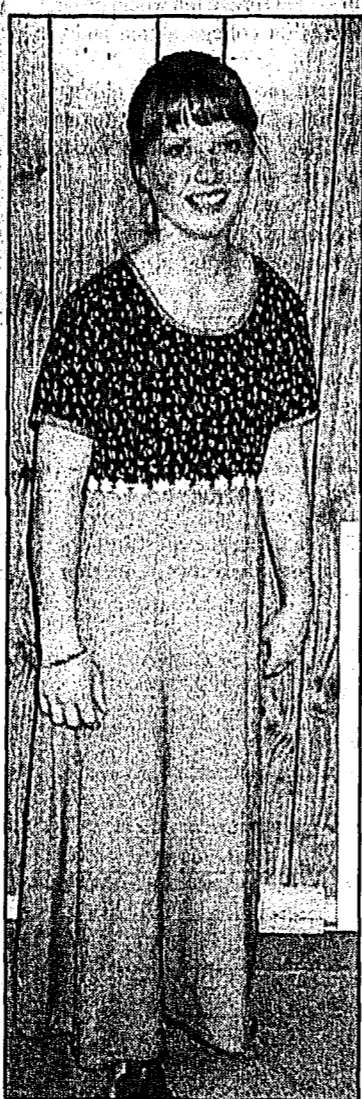
After the luncheon, Self Culture Club held a short business meeting. Minutes were read, the treasurers report given and dues for next year were paid.

Turner Passes Landowner Protection Bill

Rep. Bob Turner (D-Voss) has passed legislation which gives liability protection to owners of agricultural land who allow the public to enter their property for recreational purposes. House Bill 2664 has been signed by the governor. Turner passed a similar bill in 1995, but a subsequent lawsuit identified areas in the law that needed to be strengthened.

"There is a growing demand by the public for quality outdoor recreational opportunities and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department already owns more land than it can take care of. The state cannot afford to keep buying park land," explained Turner. "Besides Texas is 97% privately owned and we need to keep it that way," he continued.

House Bill 2664 clarifies that an owner of agricultural land who does not charge admission or who invites a person to enter the property for recreational purposes is entitled to the same limits on liability as one who does charge admission. A landowner must have a liability insurance policy in place in order to qualify for the limits afforded by this bill.

"I believe this legislation accomplishes two important goals," said Turner. "First, it helps reduce the pressure on the state to acquire private land for public recreation. Second, it gives landowners an incentive to invite everybody from the girl scouts and boy scouts to bird watchers to hunters to come on their land and enjoy nature. The incentive I am speaking of is actually the removal of a disincentive--which is the threat of an unlimited liability claim that could literally cost somebody the farm," Turner said.

Rep. Turner, who represents 17 mostly rural counties in Central and West Texas, is the chief proponent of private property rights in the Texas House of Representatives and is the leading advocate for rural Texans.

**Tax Cuts
on the Drawing Board**

The acid test for any budget plan put forward by Congress and the executive branch is whether it actually cuts government spending, reduces the size of government and leaves more money in the hands of those who earn it.

Balancing the budget and cutting taxes is the foremost goal of the 105th Congress. The jury is still out on the budget agreement announced May 2, and that proposal itself is long on good intentions and short on specifics.

But the proposal includes a net tax cut of about \$85 billion. The taxes targeted for cutting include:

*** Estate tax relief** — This provision would increase from \$600,000 to \$1 million the amount of estates not taxed, to be phased in over eight years. It would eliminate outright estate taxes on family-owned businesses worth up to \$1.6 million and halve the current tax rate on higher amounts.

*** Child tax credit** — This provision would give taxpayers a \$500 credit for each child under 18. The credit would be phased out for single parents earning \$75,000 and for joint filers earning \$110,000.

*** Capital gains tax cut** — This provision would halve the current capital gains tax rate for individuals, leaving the maximum rate at 14 percent. The rate would be pegged at 28 percent for collectibles such as art. Capital gains tax rates would be adjusted for inflation beginning in 1997 for individuals. It will require assets acquired after 1996 to be held for a minimum of three years before the lower rate applies.

*** Education tax cut** — This provision would provide tax credits for expenditures on college tuition and job training programs.

*** Individual retirement accounts** — This provision would phase out income limits for deductible IRA contributions and create new IRAs that don't have tax-free deductions, but allow tax-free withdrawals.

Pecan Spraying Time

A major pest of pecan trees is the pecan nut casebearer which destroys a large portion of homeowners pecan crops each year. These casebearers emerge in the spring as moths which lay eggs on pecan nut clusters which hatch into larvae and feed on the young pecan nutlets. Pecan nut casebearers can be difficult to control since there is usually only a 3-4 day window between when they hatch and enter the nutlet causing damage.

The predicted dates for spraying for pecan nut casebearers in Coleman County is May 25-29. Treatment consists of spraying the entire tree with an approved insecticide formulation of carbaryl, chlorpyrifos, malathion or diazinon. Refer to label instructions for mixing, application rates and precautions.

Homeowners should consider whether to spray casebearers or leave them alone to avoid more serious problems with aphids and honeydew later. There are two Bt products (natural insecticides) which could be used to produce 50-60 percent control of casebearers without reducing beneficial insects which help control aphids. Also, unless sufficient water and fertilizer are applied to fill out the pecan crop, the casebearer may do more than it hurts by thinning the pecan crop. Producing a few well filled pecans may be better than lots of partially filled pecans.



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



AUSTIN — A committee of five House and five Senate conferees last week continued to search for common ground on a tax plan that would give property tax relief to Texans.

About \$800 million in new taxes would be raised and school property taxes would be cut by an average of 17 cents per \$100 valuation under the Senate committee's plan, while the House plan would raise \$3.8 billion in new taxes to pay for lower school property taxes of 60 cents per \$100 valuation.

The House plan would cut local school taxes by about \$5 billion every two years, while the less-ambitious Senate plan would bring cuts of about \$2.5 billion over the period. Each plan has a mix
