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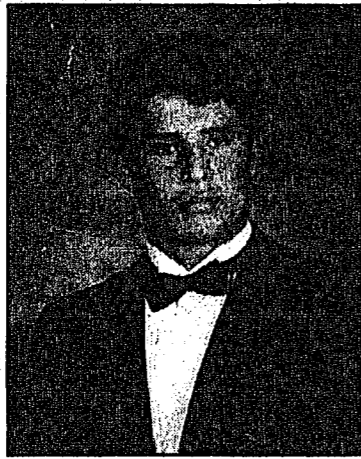

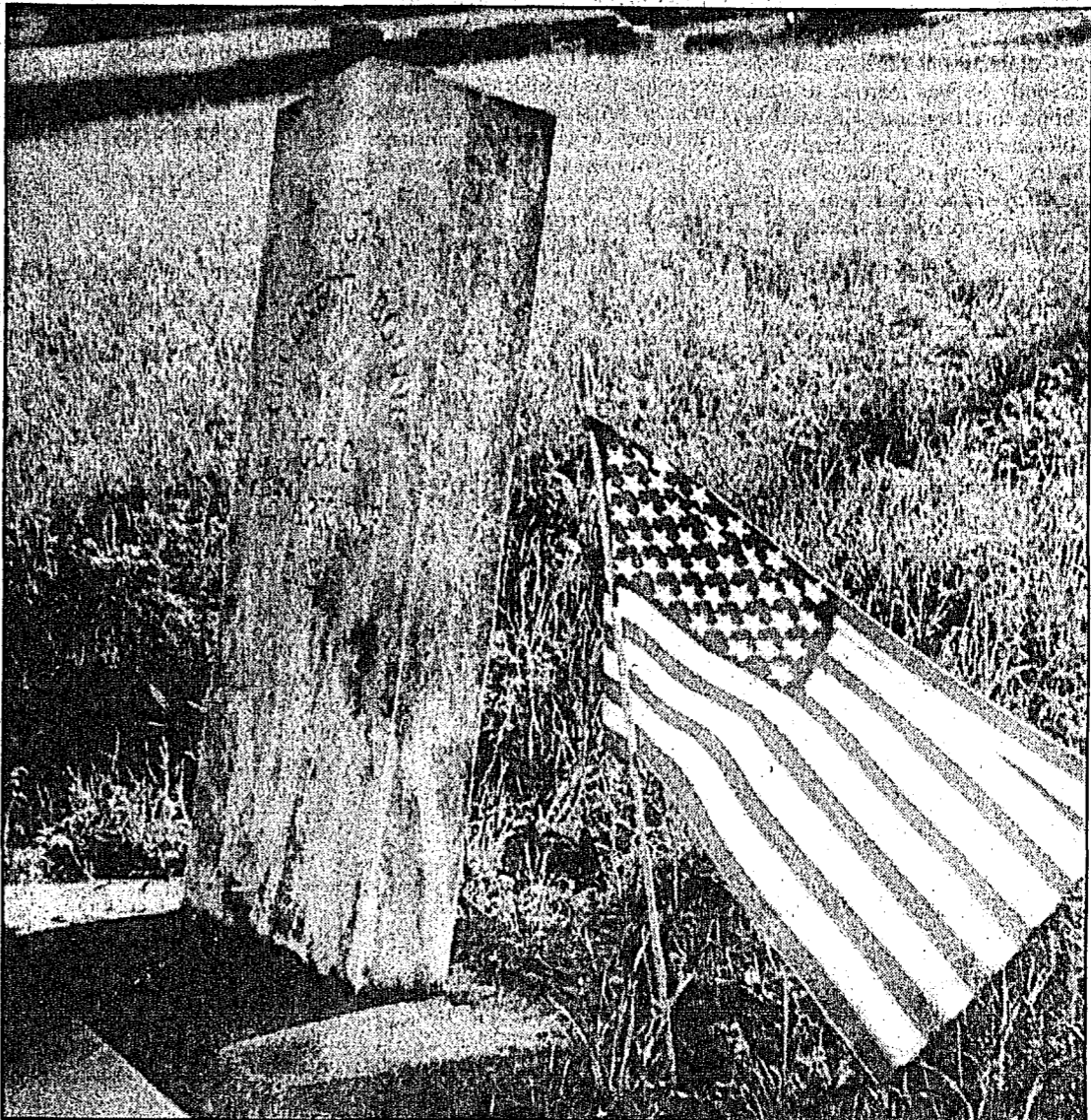

Honoring Those Who Served

Flags are waving at many graves at Santa Anna Cemetery honoring those who served, and in some cases, died, in wars during the history of our nation. They were

placed there Monday courtesy of the Coleman VFW. Among them was the one shown above at the grave of Col. Crockett Boone who served in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. Boone was an early-day publisher of the Santa Anna News.

We are told there is also a Union Civil War veteran buried in the local cemetery with the last name of Robinson, buried in 1905.

Others are a member of the Republic of Texas Army, some from the Spanish-American War, and, of course, many who served in WW I and WW II, and Vietnam.

Editors Note: This obituary of Col. Crockett Boone is dated January 1911.

COL. CROCKETT BOONE DIES AT VAN HORN

Col. Crockett Boone, familiarly known to Santa Anna people as "Uncle" Crockett, died yesterday morning after a brief illness with pneumonia, at Van Horn, Texas, where he had gone some months since to accept an editorial position with the Van Horn Chronicle. His last request was that he might be buried at Santa Anna.

Col. Boone was born in Davies county, Kentucky, in 1846. In his early youth his father moved to Franklin county, Arkansas, and here at the age of nine he began work on a paper published at Ozark.

He was only fifteen when the bloody struggle between the states began, but he immediately espoused the cause of the Confederacy and gallantly served through the war, being at Corinth, Iuka and the siege of Vicksburg.

After the star of the Confederacy had set at Appomattox Col. Boone

went to Old Mexico to cast his lot with Prince Maximilian.

Later he returned to Texas and after taking up his residence at Jefferson, acquired half interest in the Jimplicute, one of the oldest papers in the state.

Since leaving Jefferson he has owned twelve different publications and has managed scores of others, his newspaper work taking him into eight different states and the Indian territory. At one time he was editor of the American side of the "Two Republics," published at Mexico City.

In point of service he was one of the oldest newspaper men in the state and his life was filled with rare and varied experiences from his youth.

After the war he was made U.C.V. colonel under General Ross.

Three years ago he was editor of the Santa Anna News and was later connected with the Coleman Democrat and the Teague Chronicle.

Daniel G. Boone, of this place and Squire Boone of San Angelo, were his nephews and he was distantly related to the famous Daniel Boone of Kentucky.

All that is mortal of him will be laid to rest in the city cemetery at this place tomorrow.

Daniel G. Boone came to Santa Anna as editor of the Santa Anna News. He moved here from Brownwood where he had been associated with the Brownwood Banner.

FDA Warns Against Consuming The Arise & Shine Product "Chomper"

The Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers not to purchase or consume "CHOMPER", one of a line of dietary supplemental products distributed by "Arise & Shine" of Mount Shasta, California. FDA has determined that this product has been associated with a severe injury and that it may contain substances that may result in an abnormal heart rate and rhythm and could potentially cause cardiac arrest.

FDA has learned of a recent case where the consumption of this product as part of Arise & Shine "The Cleanse Thyself" program by a young woman apparently resulted in abnormal heart rate with heart-block, a potentially life-threatening condition. The agency is also investigating if other injuries have been associated with this product.

The "CHOMPER" product is promoted as an "herbal laxative" and "cleansing" agent to be used as part of a regimen of dietary products distributed by this company. Laboratory analyses of the product revealed that it contains substances similar to those that affect the heart. Use of these powerful substances, which are found in a number of poisonous plants, may result in a severe, potentially fatal heart-block, even in otherwise healthy

Alcohol and the Human Body

Alcohol is a general term denoting some family of organic chemicals with common properties. Members of its family include ethanol, methanol, isopropanol and others. Alcohol (ethanol) is a clear, volatile liquid that burns easily. It has a slight characteristic odor and is very soluble in water. This is why alcohol can affect everyone.

Alcohol is a central nervous system depressant, and it is the central nervous system that is most severely affected by alcohol. As more alcohol is consumed, the more the nervous system is affected. One is said to be intoxicated after consuming any amount of alcohol. There are seven stages of alcohol-intoxication, and how each is categorized depends on how much alcohol is in the blood system.

In the first two stages, subclinical and euphoria, the body is affected by alcohol some, but one may still be conscious of what he or she does. In the subclinical stage, behavior is nearly normal by ordinary observation. In the second stage, euphoria, alcohol begins to affect the body a little more, he or she can expect symptoms that include self-confidence, lack of judgment and control, and some sensory-motor impairment.

The excitement, confusion and stupor stages are all more dangerous because one will expect to find from .09 to .40 grams of alcohol can be found in the blood. In the excitement stage one experiences emotional instability, as well as loss of critical judgment, and decreased sensory response. In the confusion stage you can expect to see some dizziness, slurred speech, and disturbances of vision and perception of color, form, motion and dimensions. Inability to stand

or walk, vomiting, impaired consciousness are all symptoms of the stupor stage. It is under these three stages where we find most of our drunk drivers, as well as most of our drinking accidents.

The last two intoxications stages are the most dangerous. They include coma and death. Within the coma stage, symptoms include complete unconsciousness, depressed or abolished reflexes and possible death. The most severe stage is death. Most of the time, people die from respiratory arrest due to the high level of alcohol in the body.

In the end, alcohol affects everyone in some way or another according to how much they consume. It is best for everyone to avoid alcohol because if it can't get in some kind of trouble, it can get you killed.
