

### Surcharge Added To WTU Customer Bills

West Texas Utilities Company retail customers will see a slight increase in the total amount of their electric bills beginning this week. The surcharge is being added to customer bills over the next twelve months to collect unrecovered fuel costs and interest.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved WTU's request to recover approximately \$13 million in unrecovered fuel costs and interest that are the result of unforeseen and significant increases in the cost of natural gas that have occurred over the last year throughout the country.

Implementation of the surcharge will result in a 1.6 percent increase in customers' bills over the 12month period. Typical residential customers using 1,000 kilowathours of electricity a month would see their bills increase, on the average, by approximately \$1.22. The effect of the surcharge on bills will vary depending on the rate schedule under which customers take service.

When actual costs of fuel required to issue a refund. significantly exceed the fuel charges that customers are paying in their monthly bills, PUCT rules require that the utility request permission to surcharge the additional amount. When actual costs of fuel are significantly lower that what the customers are paying in fuel significant during the colder charges, the electric utility is months.

Approximately 55 percent of WTU's annual generation of electricity is produced by power plants fueled by natural gas. The cost of natural gas was 38 percent higher during 1996 than it was in 1995. The increases were even more



#### Turner Legislation Could Be Lifesaver For Volunteer Fire Departments

Rep. Bob Turner (D-Voss) has passed legislation which will give volunteer fire departments access to firefighting equipment that normally would be destroyed because of liability concerns. House Bill 680 will protect companies from liability when they donate used or obsolete firefighting equipment to the Texas Forest Service.

The Texas Forest Service already operates a program whereby donated equipment is recertified, where applicable, and distributed to volunteer fire departments around the state. "House Bill 680 already has resulted in the donation of hundreds of air. packs," said Turner. "Most volunteer fire departments cannot afford to buy' these and they are absolutely critical breathing equipment for firefighters who enter burning structures;" Rep. Turner said.

"A lot of industrial and chemical companies have fire brigades on site at their plants. OSHA requires them to upgrade their firefighting. equipment periodically, and a lot of this equipment never even gets used. Until now, companies would actually destroy the obsolete equipment rather than donate it because of the liability. 
