SAN ANTONIO—Flag Day commemorates the adoption of the first Flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by the Continental Congress. But a special day was not set aside to honor the flag until May 30, 1916, when President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation in which he said in part:

"It has seemed to me fitting that I should call your attention to the approach of the anniversary of the day upon which the Flag of the United States was adopted by the Congress as the emblem of the Union and to suggest to you that it should be this year and in the years to come be given special significance...

"I, therefore, suggest and request that the nation, and if possible, in every community, the fourteenth day of June be observed as Flag Day, with special patriotic exercises, at which means shall be taken to give significant expression to our thoughtful love of America...our determination to make it greater and purer..."

When we observe Flag Day, we help our children to better understand the principles of liberty and justice which make our nation great. We show the world that we are a nation of responsible citizens dedicated to preserving these precepts for future generations. Finally, as individuals, we renew our own belief in America and "in freedom and justice in all."

Coleman County Kids Fish Will Be Held Saturday At Hords Creek Lake

The first annual Coleman County Kids Fish will be held Saturday, June 14 at Hords Creek Lake from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. for youngsters ages 12 and under.

Kids 12 and under will fish free and personnel from the Department of Public Safety, Coleman and Santa Anna Police Departments, the Sheriff's Office, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Law Enforcement Explorers and the Hords Creek Corps of Engineers will be assisting.

Kids must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Equipment and bait will be furnished but youngsters may bring their own equipment. Park Ranger Stacey Slater is

tagging four fish stocked in the water behind the dam. The tagged fish will be worth a \$150.00 half-day trip to either Lake Coleman or Lake Ivie. Slater will also present a program on reptiles and wildlife in conjunction with the preservation of Natural Wetlands. Ken Brixey of the Coleman Police Department will instruct on the right kinds of bait to use and fishing techniques. Two classes on water safety and fishing laws and regulations will be presented by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Ages groups will be four and under, five to eight years old and nine to 12. Kids will be split up during the day, some fishing and some attending classes.

Awards will be presented at the end of the day to include trophies and ribbons.

Parents are asked to bring hot dogs, buns, chips, cokes, etc to help feed the youngsters lunch.

Other awards will be presented for the Casting Kit event (three casts at a bulls eye) and the heaviest five-fish stringer.

Patrol cars, a fire truck and ambulance will be on display during the day.

Class Of 1997 Receives Over \$22,000 In Scholarships

Wheat Crop In Pretty Good Shape In Spite Of Rains

According to an unofficial report, rainfall total for Santa Anna for the period from last Friday morning, June 6 through Monday, June 9 was 4.83 inches, bringing the year-to-date total to 21.13 inches

Coleman measured 3.91 inches Friday and another 1.11 Sunday. No total for Coleman on Monday's light rain.

Friday's rainfall reeked havoc in Coleman where some streets were flooded and electric power and phone service were interrupted for a while in various parts of town. The storm system which dumped torrents of rain here later deluged

portions of Mills County to the tune of 10+ inches.

Extension Agent Marty Gibbs says that county farmers are about 10% into the wheat harvest and 60% of oats.

Local elevator operator Terry McIver says the wheat crop should be alright if we don't get any more downpours in the next few days. With the sun shining, he expects combining to start again by the end of the week. Of course there has been some damage to the wheat due to the heavy rains, but McIver says not much of it has fallen and although there will be weeds,

Santa Anna Elementary School students read more books this year in the Accelerated Reading Program.



Darbi Neff's Second Place Property Rights Letter

The following letter is the second place winner in the Circle C CowBelles recent letter writing contest concerning Private Property Rights. Second place prize money totaling \$300 was awarded to Darbi Jo Neff, a senior at Santa Anna High School for her efforts.

Dear Senator Hutchinson:
My name is Darbi Jo Neff and I am an eighteen year old senior at Santa Anna High School. Throughout my school years, I have been involved in 4-H and FFA projects. My parents own farm and ranch land in Coleman County. Growing up in a rural setting and helping my Dad work the land and cattle has given me a keen sense of appreciation for the freedom of owning private property.

Private property rights no doubt consist of two views. On one side of the fence are government regulations and environmentalists, and on the other side are private property owners and farmers and ranchers. The right to own land and manage it wisely means everything to me because it is our livelihood. At the same time, living on the land all my life has given me an emotional attachment to the property. Ownership of property represents the basic principle that this country was founded on. The threat of government taking and controlling property through laws and regulations threatens my future of owning land or even holding on to land already in the family.

The Fifth Amendment to the Constitution safeguards the right of an individual to own property and not have it taken through regulation without just compensation. The ownership of land represents the freedom to purchase property and mold it to fit the American dream. If we lose personal property rights, we lose one of our basic rights as citizens of the United States.

One example of the devastation that private property over-regulation brings was when Margaret Rector's land value dropped from \$900,000 to \$30,000 just because of the Endangered Species Act. As new legislation is passed, I'm sure there are always good intentions for all, but misinterpretation sometimes results in a no-win situation. Another area of mismanaged regulation was when Margaret Rogers couldn't build a

fence on her own land because of an extinct bird. Water rights is also a hot topic that threatens where ranchers water their cattle, and where and when farmers can water crops. Economic deterioration can be the only result for my family and our country if this continues.

Senator Hutchinson, you are in a position to help matters. I realize you represent citizens on both sides of the issue. Ask yourself this question. Who do you think would be the best manager of private lands, individuals or the government? Landowners have a personal interest at stake to be the best stewards of the land because their hard-earned savings are invested in the property. If for some reason the land is taken, then there should be some sort of just compensation.

Farmers and ranchers such as my family, produce food, clothing, and shelter products for the whole world. Strict regulations are hindering our ability to produce efficiently. There's no doubt that government needs to be accountable for their actions. Society of course is always changing, so working together as partners on some issues I realize is a must. Remember though that for a society to continue to succeed, individuals must have rights and that includes personal property rights.

Everyone has an interest in this issue. Private property rights go further than just agriculture. Whether you're from the city or the farm, the question of who controls personal property will affect you in the future. If you don't have control of your own property, then you really don't own it. Government ownership leads to a planned society.

Thank you Senator Hutchinson for taking the time to read my letter. I will continue to watch this issue with great interest, and please give much thought to your vote on every piece of legislation concerning private property rights.

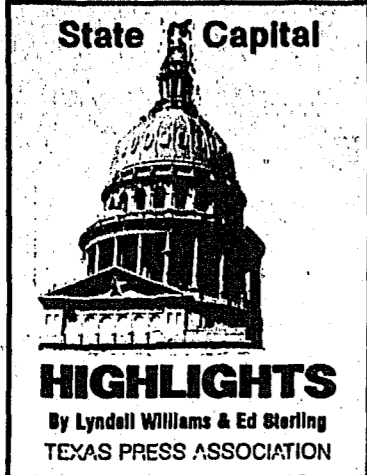

AUSTIN — Three days after the 75th Texas Legislature ended its 140-day session on June 2, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock called a press conference to announce that he will not seek a third term.

The 67-year-old Bullock, who was elected lieutenant governor in 1990, said it was time to "set aside public life and focus more on my family and friends."

"On and off for 40 years, I've had the honor to walk the halls of this magnificent building in partnership with the people of Texas."

"I've done so while serving as a House member from my hometown of Hillsboro, as an assistant attorney general, a governor's aide, as secretary of state and as comptroller of public accounts."

Bullock said he wanted no going-away parties, no banquets, no awards, no plaques, or speeches on his behalf.

"In January of 1999, I will leave this office. I do so with a heartfull of memories that will last the rest of my life," Bullock told the standing-room-only crowd.

Race for Governor Begins
Meanwhile, electioneering for the 1998 gubernatorial race began even before Bullock's surprise announcement.

One day after lawmakers departed Austin, Democrats questioned the effectiveness of Gov. George W. Bush, who made prop-

erty tax reform his top goal for the Legislature.

"Texans would prefer a governor who's effective," said Democratic Party Chairman Bill Whitc. "He started too late on tax reform and failed to deliver the votes."

Despite the Legislature's failure to substantially reduce the school tax burden on homeowners, Bush indicated he is not ready to quit the governor's mansion. "We've delivered the largest tax cut in the state's history ... you ought to assume I'm going to run (for reelection)," he told reporters.

If voters approve a constitutional amendment on the Aug. 9 ballot, the average homeowner can expect a \$140 break by increasing the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

Sharp, Mauro Eyeing Race
Comptroller John Sharp, a Democrat, who may have gubernatorial aspirations, said Bush's proposed business-activity tax would have taxed the income of limited partnerships and was nothing more than a personal income tax.

"If any Democrat had proposed this to the Legislature, they would have been run out of town inside 12 hours," Sharp said, adding that lawmakers did Bush a favor when they failed to agree on a tax reform plan.

Countering, Gov. Bush's spokeswoman, Karen Hughes, said Sharp had advocated a similar tax six years ago. And, she defended Bush's pre-session pledge not to raise taxes. She said it was "absolutely absurd" to portray the partnership tax as an income tax.

Meanwhile Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has hired a pollster and plans to travel the state, asking Texans "what they want in their next governor."

GOP Chairman Tom Pauken said Mauro is too liberal and Sharp doesn't have "any substantive issues" on which to challenge Bush.

Water Bill Is Approved
Both the Senate and House approved a massive water bill (Senate Bill 1), which requires a statewide drought plan and

addresses environmental protection and population growth.

The legislation was Lt. Gov. Bullock's top priority for the session. "Our future depends on this bill. Texans can now stand united on a subject that has long divided us," he said.

The bill will provide more than \$1 billion for upgrading standard drinking water systems. It will protect freshwater flows into bays and estuaries and it creates obstacles for transfers of water from one basin to another. The measure will appear as a constitutional amendment on the Nov. 4 ballot.

Cities, water districts and other local governments will have to work together to create and manage a water-conserving drought plan due September 2000.

'Gangsta' Investment Ban Revived
Texas could become the first state to prohibit agencies from investing in companies that produce or distribute "gangsta rap" music under a measure Gov. Bush will sign into law.

After a House committee threw it out, Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, revived the measure by attaching it as a rider to the 800-page state budget bill. Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said he wanted to stop public money from going to companies he said poison the minds of children and teen-agers.

According to a report in the *Austin American-Statesman*, the rider prohibits the use of state money to invest in or buy securities of a business that owns 10 percent or more of a company that records or produces any song, lyrics or other musical work that explicitly describes, glorifies or advocates:

- Acts of criminal violence, including murder, assault, assault on police officers, sexual assault and robbery;
- Necrophilia, bestiality, pedophilia;
- Illegal use of drugs;
- Criminal street gang activity;
- Degradation of women; and
- Violence against sex, race, ethnic group, sexual orientation or religion.

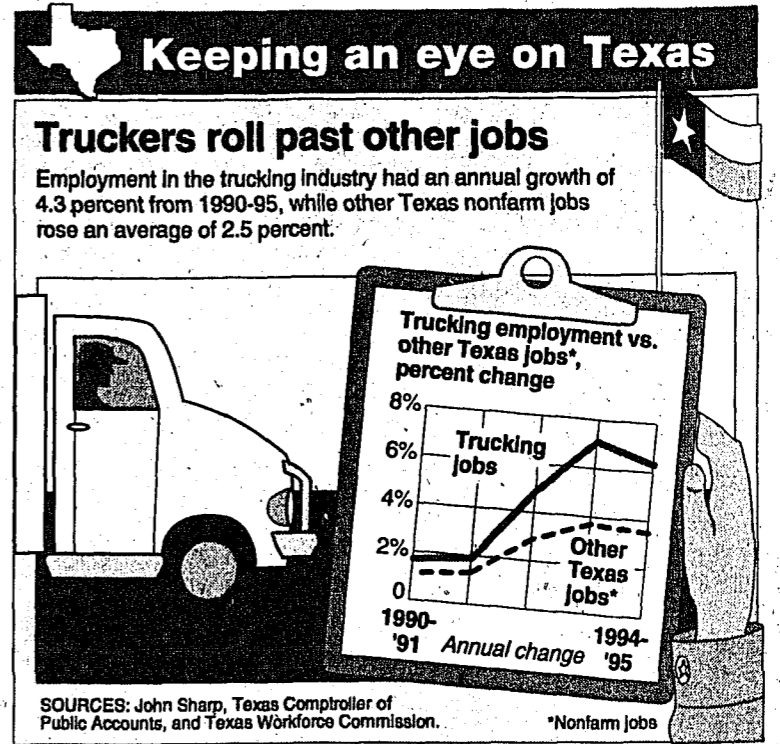
31 years ago Little George Havens resolved to renew that spirit of the Old West circuit riders by establishing his camp meeting here in Coleman County.

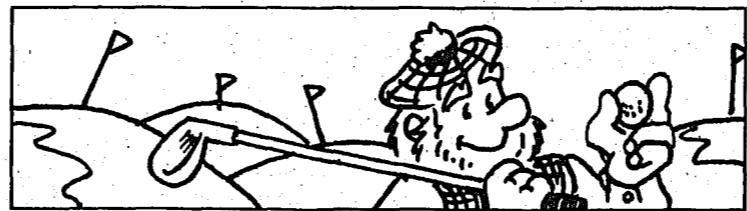
Each year in June, near the anniversary of Howard's death, fans from the

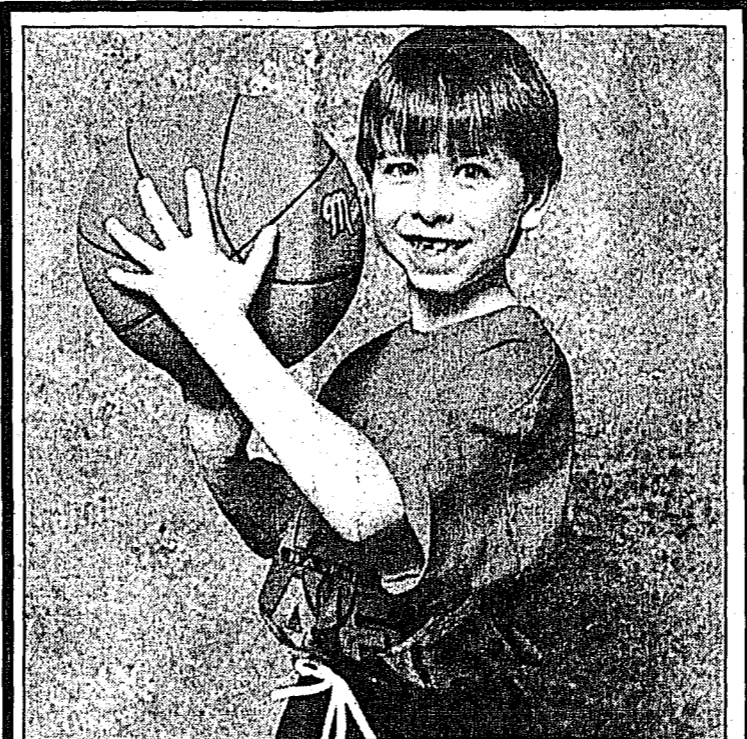
Original manuscripts, first editions and original "Weird Tales" will be displayed during Open House. Copies of documents and Howard memorabilia will be for sale.

BUDGET AGREEMENT GLASS IS HALF FULL

All government — indeed, every human benefit and enjoyment, every virtue and every prudent act — is founded on compromise and barter — Edmund Burke

The budget agreement Congress approved in May represents a classic illustration of Burke's observation. I was a less-than-enthusiastic supporter of the agreement because, like the proverbial half-empty glass, it leaves something to be desired. At the end of the negotiation process, the executive branch and members of Congress on both sides of the aisle achieved some (not all) of their objectives.

I voted for this agreement despite my reservations because, if its assumptions are correct, it will lead to balanced budget in five years. We have to keep our eye on the goal of achieving a balanced budget, and the agreement focuses on that over-arching principle.

The agreement outlines \$85 billion in net tax cuts which should include: a phased-in, \$500-per-child tax credit for families, a phase-out of income limits for IRA deductions and the creation of new IRAs that don't have tax-free deductions, but do allow tax-free withdrawals, cuts in inheritance taxes and capital gains taxes and education tax credits for college.

In addition, the following provisions were agreed to:

- An estimated \$16 billion for expanded health coverage for needy children
- \$10 billion to restore some benefits to immigrants
- Increased spending on schools and the environment
- A projected \$115 billion savings in Medicare spending to keep the program solvent for another decade

The agreement does not cut government spending as much as I would have liked. And I am committed to providing Americans with significantly more tax relief that this measure allows. But it does give us the opportunity to provide some tax relief for working families.

I suspect that I wasn't the only member of Congress who voted for this measure primarily because it offers a real chance of balancing the federal budget by the year 2002. I continue to believe that deficit spending robs this country of its life's blood, mortgaging future generations to pay for what we want to do today. Balancing the budget remains a critical necessity.

That said, Texans need to understand some pertinent facts about this budget agreement. It doesn't cut spending, it limits the growth of spending. The savings necessary to balance the budget will come largely in projected savings from reducing the growth of entitlement programs. And, most important, the books are not yet closed.

A budget resolution is a measure that sets only general targets for spending and revenue. It describes the size of the pie and a rough outline of how it's to be sliced. Specific tax and spending legislation remains to be written. That will be the hard part. When that process begins, my priorities will remain the same: a child tax credit, significant capital gains tax cuts, expansion of IRAs and the eventual elimination of the death tax. This budget gives us an opening to pursue those objectives.
