A budget resolution is a measure that sets only general targets for spending and revenue. It describes the size of the pie and a rough outline of

When that process begins, my priorities will remain the same: a child tax credit, significant capial gains tax cuts, expansion of IRAS and the eventualelelimination of the death tax. This budget
gives us an opening to pursue those objectives.
