finishing these stains reappear. Once the stains reappear, they are difficult or impossible to remove. Delaying cleaning increases the risk of permanent stain. The sooner a
stain is treated, the greater the chance that it can be removed chaccesfully.

removed. Consumers can help the dry cleaner to do a better job of cleaning by telling the dry cleaner of any potential stains, including

spills from even mildly acidic/alkaline foods and beverages can cause colors to fade in fabrics.
The reaction is slow. Color loss depends on the sensitivity of the dye, the fiber content,
acidity/alkalinity and time of exposure on the fabric. Hair spray and perfumes often cause surprise stains, esp
fibers.
Though
nvisible, hair appearing to be preparations spray and other hair become visible with age, exposure iight and heat. Stains usuall taindrop-ifike splaters. In some cases staining causes the fabric to feel stiff. Pointing out potentia stains to the dry cleaner can aler
them to taking precautions that might prevent staining and costly might prevent staining
losses to the consumer.
