


Herman Estes


Allene "Eva" Barnett, 90, of Coleman, died Wednesday morning,-June 11, 1997 at Ranger Park Nursing Home.



Disabled Person **Placards To** Expire Soon

The first of the permanently disabled person placards that were issued in 1992 will begin to expire on June 30. The Coleman County Tax Office reminds citizens that they must obtain new cards to remain in compliance with state and federal laws.

Permanently disabled person placards are hung from a vehicle's rear view mirror and entitle the holder to certain parking privileges. Placards may also be displayed in an vehicle used by or for the transportation of a disabled person.

"State law requires that permanently disabled person placards be renewed after five years," said Donna Seymore, Coleman County Tax Assessor-Collector. "We started issuing placards in July 1992 under the direction of state lawmakers and the Texas. Department of Transportation. Five years later, the first wave of these placard holders must get replacements. Citizens should pay close attention to the expiration date because there won't be any renewal notices for placards."

Placard renewals will be processed through the Coleman County Tax Collector. Citizens are asked to take their expired placards to the tax office, where they will complete a form and pay a statutory \$5 fee per card. Permanently disabled Texans may obtain up to two placards; they also have the option of getting one placard and one set of disabled person license plates.

Approximately 800,000 permanently disabled placards have been issued statewide since 1992. Firsttime applicants for permanently disabled person placards or license plates have to meet certain eligibility requirements; their application must also bear the signature of a licensed Texas physician or optometrist. The tax assessor-collectors issue placards locally to individuals, not motor vehicles. Because there's no centralized database, information as to the bearer of a placard is available only through the tax offices.

Questions are permanently disabled person placards should be referred to the Coleman County Tax Office.

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AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller John Sharp became the first candidate to officially declare for the office of the lieutenant governor, hoping to succeed fellow Democrat, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock. Bullock, 67, announced a week race.

earlier he would not seek reelection in 1998. Sharp, a former state representa-

tive, state senator and railroad commissioner, and one of the state's leading Democrats, made his announcement for the state's secondhighest elective office in the Senate chamber.

Addressing a crowd of friends and employees, Sharp said, "This will be a campaign to sell ideas for meeting the challenges that face Texas today and in the decades to come.'

Sharp pitched "Lone Star Scholars," a proposal he said will be a cornerstone of his campaign. The proposal offers free college tuition, books and fees to Texas students who maintain at least a B average. But Sharp did not say how much legislative support there is for such a program.

As comptroller, Sharp's Texas Performance Review has drawn national attention. The performanceauditing program seeks to streamline state government and improve services while saving taxpayers' money. Sharp said the audits have saved \$8.5 billion.

Two Republicans, state Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry and Houston businessman David Dewhurst, are expected to seek their party's nomination in March. Perry is a former Texas A&M University classmate of Sharp's.

Meanwhile, Republican Railroad Commissioners Carole Rylander and Barry Williamson and Houston attorney Paul Hobby, a Democrat, announced they are candidates for comptroller. Hobby is the son of former Lt. Governor Bill Hobby.




Some Sided With Tobacco





House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or, part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

stains from even colorless ingredients, such as beverages and sugar, can cause damage to garments. More than 2,500 garments were analyzed last year containing consumer caused stains. Stains ranged from ink, food, hair preparations, beverages, oil, perspiration to sugar.

Invisible stains can occur even when they seem to disappear when dried. However, when exposed to heat during dry-cleaning and finishing these stains reappear. Once the stains reappear, they are difficult or impossible to remove. Delaying cleaning increases the risk of permanent stain. The sooner a stain is treated, the greater the chance that it can be removed successfully.

The color and fabric type influence whether stains can be removed. Consumers can help the dry cleaner to do a better job of Lou Pierce visited Bobbie cleaning by telling the dry cleaner of any potential stains, including those invisible "spills". It is also helpful to know what kind of food or ingredient was spilled on the garment, how long the stain has been present and any techniques the consumer may have used to remove the stain. It is important for consumers to understand that some spills from even mildly acidic/alkaline foods and beverages can cause colors to fade in fabrics. The reaction is slow. Color loss depends on the sensitivity of the dye, the fiber content, acidity/alkalinity and time of exposure on the fabric. Hair spray and perfumes often cause surprise stains, especially on silk and wool

> Though appearing to be invisible, hair spray and other hair preparations may oxidize and ecome visible with age, exposure

to light and heat. Stains usually appear as tan, gray or black raindrop-like splatters. In some cases staining causes the fabric to feel stiff. Pointing out potential stains to the dry cleaner can alert them to taking precautions that might prevent staining and costly losses to the consumer.

TPWD Looking For Fields For Public Dove Hunting Program

Department (TPWD) is seeking to enroll suitable fields into the Public Dove Hunting Program. TPWD enters short-term lease agreements with landowners to allow dove hunting during the open season (last year Sept. 1 - 30). These areas are not available to all licensed hunters. They can be hunted only by those holding Annual Hunting Permits sold by TPWD. TPWD is able to pay up to twice the ad valorem taxes on fields for the two month period.

Availability of early fall food sources is the number one factor when considering a field for the program. Early fall food sources for dove in this area include native sunflower, croton, pigweed, ragweed, sudan, milo, and other small grains. Ideal fields will feature food plants adjacent to cover, water and grit source. wildlife biologist, Ralph Suarez, in water's edge. Ideal fields range from information.

Texas Parks and Wildlife 100 to 250 acres in size with at least 20 acres in suitable food plants. Large tracts of cropland are generally not suitable. Cropland interspersed with post oak or mesquite rangeland is preferred.

Fields that are enrolled in the Public Dove Hunting Program are posted with TPWD personnel as such prior to the beginning of the hunting season. Parking areas are also identified. Local game wardens are made aware of the location of these fields and will be periodically monitoring them. There will not be a game warden on site for the entire period, however.

If you have fields that normally attract doves, where you can wait to begin wheat cultivation until after October 1, or other areas that you think might meet the above requirements, consider this program. You can contact TPWD



The Sun By Carol Katzer

Your skin remembers every time that you tanned and every time you were sun burned. Research shows that two or more blistering sunburns as a child increases your chances of having skin cancer in life. Too much sun over the years can cause skin cancer, wrinkles of the skin and possible cataracts of the eye.

A baby's skin is very sensitive. It is up to the adult to protect their skin. Babies under six months should not be exposed to direct sunlight. Keep the baby in the shade of a tree, umbrella or stroller canopy

Child-sized sunglasses with UV protection are available to protect the eyes. Dress the baby in comfortable lightweight clothing that covers the body. Choose a hat with a brim to shade the face. Clothes made of tighter weave fabric are best. Clothing held up to a lamp or window with little or no light shining give the most protection. Cotton fabrics are both cool and protective.

Apply sunscreen at least 30 minutes before going out. SPF of 15 protects the skin 15 times longer than the same skin without protection. Apply sun screen more often when playing in the water.


