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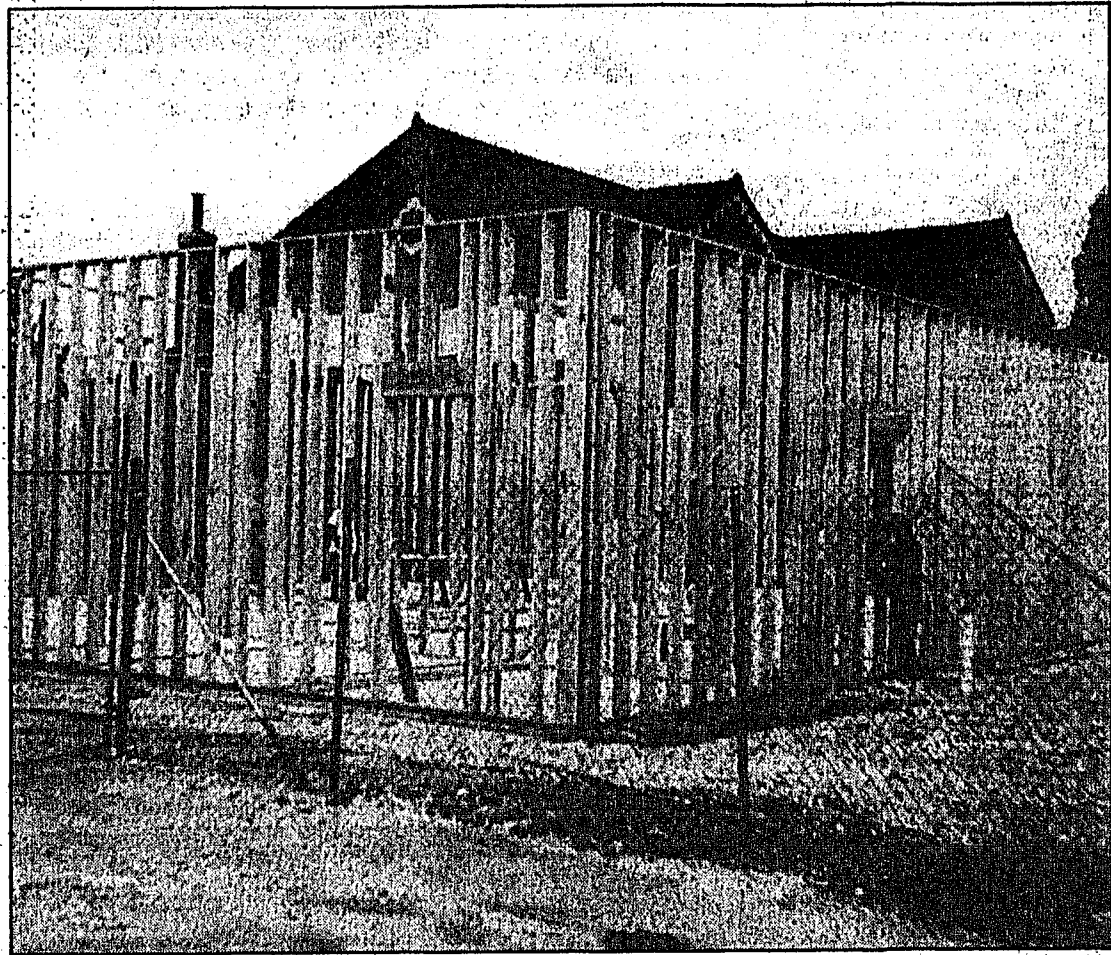

Construction Begun On School Library-Learning Center Facility

Construction at the Santa Anna schools is finally underway. The process actually started in November of 1995 when we submitted an application for a school facilities assistance grant. The grant was approved for an amount of \$425,000 on a \$500,000 project, or 85 percent of the total cost. The cost to the school district is only 15 percent.

Much deliberation and planning went into a list of projects considered by the administration, faculty and member of the school site-based committee. The list was then presented to the Board of Trustees for review and approval.

One of the projects on the approved list was the replacement of the electrical wiring in the elementary building. The electrical system had not been updated since the facility was built in 1952. The existing wiring is simply too old and inadequate for present day usage. In addition to the replacement of the old wire, the plan includes fire bell

alarm systems and wiring for communications and computer systems. This project was awarded to Bryant Electric of San Angelo. Paul Wilkerson of San Angelo is the engineer for the job.

The other major project is an approximate 6,000 square foot addition to the Home Economics cottage. This new facility will become the school library and learning center. This project was awarded to Michael Marrs Architects of Temple, Texas.

The current libraries will be combined and will be automated. Students will use computers to search for book titles instead of the old card file systems. We may be one of the few remaining public school libraries using the card file system. An electronic scanner and bar codes (similar to those used at check-out counters of most large department stores) will be used to check out books. This new technology will make our library one of the finest in this area.

A major feature of the learning center will be a distance learning

lab/network, capable of two-way video interactive distance education systems. Simply stated, students at Santa Anna I.S.D. can enroll in high school and/or college courses by means of two-way television.

These are courses that could not be offered locally in the classroom. This would be a tremendous addition to our school curriculum and would be of greater benefit to our students, especially those planning to attend college.

We are excited about these improvements and realize we must continue to provide the best education affordable for our students. Community members can help us by sharing ideas and methods of improvements. We recently published in the News a request for community input, but have received only one recommendation. I'm sure

many of you have suggestions of how to make our school better. Please share your ideas with me.

HDO Wants Citizen Input About Sealy Hospital; Making Plans For 2nd Historical Heritage Festival

The Board of Directors of the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization met Monday, June 30. Directors present were Celeste Simmons, Eva Siller, Eddie Hartman, Bobby Morgan, Tex Wright and Montie Guthrie.

The group discussed at length the report from the engineer who inspected the old Sealy Hospital building. After hearing the report read aloud, each member present took time to read it individually. After much discussion of options, a motion was made and approved to recommend tearing down the building. The board recommends to the citizenry of Santa Anna that what is left of the once proud building of hope and healing be

removed, not only for esthetic considerations but especially for safety reasons.

The members of the Santa Anna Historical Development realize the hospital building is still very dear to some citizens along with remembrances of what it once was and meant to our town and this part of the state.

That is why the HDO wishes to invite a survey type response concerning the tearing down of the building which is now owned by the HDO who had hoped to restore it for use as a museum. The examining engineer advises the group against proceeding with such an astronomical undertaking.

The HDO has plans to make a

survey and in the meantime you are welcome to make your thoughts known through a letter to the editor in the Santa Anna News.

The HDO is also making plans to sponsor the second annual Frontier Heritage Festival and World Championship Bison Cook-off. October 11 is the date set for the event which brought a large number of visitors to our town last year. Activities discussed for the festival included the return of the Cavalry unit, Comanche Indians, Crafts concerning the old west, Western, Art and food booths. Discussion of the festival will continue at the next meeting set for July 14.

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Regulations Relaxed On Live Trapping Whitetail Deer

AUSTIN--Texas Parks and Wildlife officials have streamlined procedures for individuals to trap and release whitetail deer for genetic enhancement. A permit must be obtained prior to trapping or moving any deer. The purpose of the regulation change is to assist private individuals desiring to improve the quality and health of wild white-tails.

In the past an individual who intended to relocate wild white-tails had a lengthy and complicated process which included on site inspections by wildlife biologists. The

capture and release sites had to pass many tests for permit approval.

Release sites now must be 200 acres or more (if they are under a game fence) to qualify. Whitetail bucks displaying above average genetic characteristics may be relocated for breeding purposes. Whitetail does may also be trapped and released when this transfer can be deemed desirable.

Permits will not be issued when an immediate harvest of transplanted animals is intended. The purpose of the regulation change is to improve genetic quality. The purpose is not to facilitate hunting.

Opponents of hunting state that hunters take out the best animals and leave undesirable bucks unharvested. These undesirable, genetically inferior bucks reproduce. The recent regulation changes will counter this trend by facilitating the reproduction of genetically superior deer.

If an individual has control of 200 acres with a high fence around it, this individual can obtain permits to bring exceptional whitetail bucks onto his land. These bucks would not be harvested immediately, and they would be able to breed existing does, thereby passing on good genetic characteristics. When whitetail numbers exceed carrying capacity on said 200 acres, then hopefully these deer could be released into the wild.

Also, a farm or ranch 200 acres or more could acquire whitetail deer to introduce deer to replenish low numbers.

The regulation change will be good for the 3-1/2 million whitetail deer in the state of Texas. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department should be congratulated for their efforts to improve the quality and health of wild white-tails.

CCMC Employees Complete ACLS Training

Mike Morris, administrator of Coleman County Medical Center, has announced that seventeen employees have successfully completed Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) training at the hospital.

"The two-day course was offered, on-site by CCMC as part of an ongoing commitment, by the Board of Directors to provide continuing education for the staff," Morris said.

The ACLS course provides the latest up-to-date protocols in identification and treatment of cardiac arrest-related to trauma, respiratory arrest and other medical emergencies, which can result in cessation of heart function and breathing. ACLS is an internationally used and recognized curriculum for providers both inside and outside the hospitals.

The latest American Heart Association information is employed and the course is specifically designed to allow providers to continue to upgrade their skills and keep abreast of current treatment protocols.

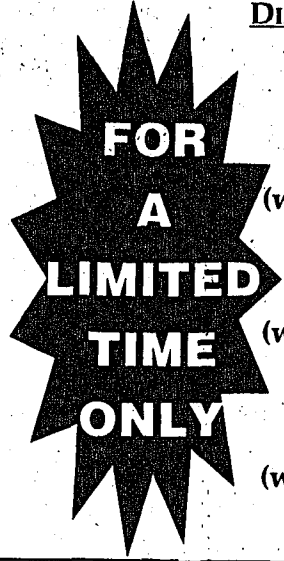

■ Treat school districts of any size as small employers — at the districts' option — for the purpose of obtaining health insurance.

■ Prohibit employer group health plans from treating pregnancy or genetic information as pre-existing conditions.

■ Require insurers writing health plans for employers of 50 or more workers to cover all or none of the eligible workers and their dependents.

The Risk Pool will provide individual major medical coverage for people deemed "uninsurable" because of their medical condition.

Coverage in the pool will not be expensive. Premiums for the first year must be between 125 percent and 150 percent of a "standard risk rate." The standard risk rate will be calculated by the pool, which will be governed by a nine-member board of directors appointed by Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer.

Bush Backs Curriculum Plan
Gov. George W. Bush called an impromptu news conference last week to endorse a new blueprint for the basic subjects taught in Texas schools, rejecting opposition from religious conservatives.

Bush, who criticized the curriculum proposal last fall by describing it as "mushy," said it has been reworked and is now satisfactory.

"I appreciate very much the voices of concern, but I believe this document puts Texas on the leading edge of educational change," Bush said. "After a lot of hard work by a lot of smart people, the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills curriculum plan has been improved a lot."

Six Republican board members aligned with conservative religious groups have opposed much of the plan and have called for wholesale changes that they contend will make it more rigorous.

Lottery Panel Delays Bids
The Texas Lottery Commission

voted to delay seeking new bids on the \$100 million a year lottery operator contract.

The commissioners had planned to get the bid advertisements out by June 30 but decided to give the agency's new executive director, Lawrence Littwin, another month to prepare the bid specifications. Littwin previously worked for a competitor of GTECH Holding

Corp., the state's current lottery operator. GTECH officials, who have opposed rebidding the contract, had no comment on the delay. The commissioners also agreed to pay Frank Stern, a New Jersey technical consultant, \$187,500 an hour, not to exceed \$30,000, to help draft the bid proposals.

Other Capital Highlights

■ If former pitching star Nolan Ryan runs for agriculture commissioner while his television commercials for Dairy Queen and Advil continue to air, Texas television stations would have to give his opponents equal air time, a federal official told the Associated Press. Ryan has told Texas Farm Bureau officials he will seriously consider running for agriculture commissioner if his lucrative television commercials can continue.

■ Larry Don McQuay of San Antonio, a child molester who sought surgical castration to stop abusing children, was sentenced to 20 years in prison last week for a second conviction on molestation charges. In a one-day trial, McQuay was convicted and given the maximum sentence by state District Judge Terry McDonald.
