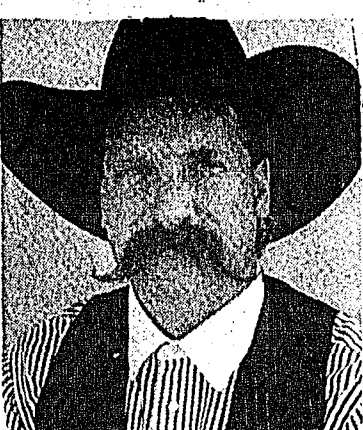
Lookin' Good, Mr. Patterson

Early Voting Begins Monday On Property Tax Relief Amendment

County voters will be going to the polls on August 9 to decide to adopt or reject the proposed Constitutional Amendments as submitted by the 75th State Legislature, Regular Session. The Amendment provides school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and provides for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes on

homesteads subject to the limitation. Early voting begins on Monday, July 21 and ends Tuesday, August 5. Early voting will take place at the County Clerk's office at the Courthouse during regular hours Monday through Friday. June 16 County Commissioners approved the consolidation of voting precincts for this election. Voters from Santa Anna and Rockwood will vote in Santa Anna.

August 1 Date Set For Football And Other Sport Physicals

Peggy Hensley, MSN, RNCS Family Nurse Practitioner of the Family Health Care Clinic will be giving physicals to boys and girls who will be entering the seventh and ninth grades in the Santa Anna school system this year. Hensley will be assisted by Athletic Director and Head Coach David Robinett and other coaches. The physicals will be done in the gym from 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Friday, August 1. There will be no charge. Parents are asked to stop by the school administration office and pick up the physical form in order

to have it filled out in advance. Those not picking up the form may do so that morning. ALL STUDENTS ENTERING THE SEVENTH AND NINTH GRADE MUST HAVE A PHYSICAL BEFORE BEGINNING PRACTICE. Parents should note that even though a student may not be planning to participate in football or volleyball, all other sports--basketball, tennis and track--must also have physicals on file. Two-a-day football practice begins on Wednesday, August 6.

Cheer Clinic To Be Held July 30 Through Aug. 1

The Santa Anna Varsity Cheerleaders will be holding a cheer clinic July 30 through August 1. Girls in grade 2 through 6 will attend from 9 to 11 a.m. with the junior high session being held from 1 to 3 p.m. Cost will be \$25 per child and \$15 for each additional family member attending. Those attending are asked to wear short sets and tennis shoes. Parents or guardians must sign the release form for those attending. Terri Jones is the cheerleader sponsor.

City Council Hears Audit Report

The Santa Anna City Council met in their regular monthly meeting on July 8 with Mayor Karen Morris and council persons Jim Spillman, David Powell, Bobby Morgan, and Jean Findley present. Others present were Barbara Kingsbery, municipal judge; Carlos Torres, police chief; David Huggins, fire chief/marshal; John Pearce, Collier Watson and Jane Patrick. Following the invocation by Jim Spillman, the minutes were approved as presented. Spillman made the motion to accept the audit was presented by Collier Watson and Jane Patrick. The audit showed: utility fund: revenues \$524,023.44 and operating expenses \$460,721.75 with non-

operating as \$50,868.68 allowing for a net income of \$12,433.01; general fund: revenues \$159,524.94 and operating expenses \$225,684.43 with a fund transfer of \$66,077.44 for a net loss of \$82.05. The police report was reviewed and discussed. A bid of \$436.00 was accepted by Sam Hays of Lohn for the old library building. The motion passed with Council Spillman voting against. Two mowing bids were received as follows: Mike Pritchard \$1800 per year/\$150 per month and Glen Lawhon \$500 per month. The bid was awarded to Mike Pritchard for \$150 per month. Director of Public Works Doug

Watson was unable to attend due to a water leak and was unable to address his questions regarding the fire department. The council discussed the following with David Huggins: what trucks were the City's; what are the City's responsibilities to the fire department and the fire department obtaining approval of purchases for the City's fire trucks and the like before the purchase is actually made. The job descriptions were tabled until the next meeting. A motion was approved to appoint a committee of Mayor Morris and Councilman Findley to discuss with Police Chief Carlos Torres and Municipal Court Judge Barbara Kingsbery the items discussed in executive session.

ISD Board Accepts Three Resignations One Replaced, Others Not To Be

The Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees met on Tuesday, July 8 with board members Roddy Dean, Dickie Horner, Mike Pritchard, Marty Donham and Gay Abernathy present. Also present were Superintendent of Schools Dean Bass, Business Manager Judy Hartman and District Principal Lee Coffman. Visitors attending the meeting were Sam Vacek, Lois Harper, Sharon Cheaney, David Robinett, Montie Guthrie, Sandra Guthrie and Rob Cheaney. District Principal Lee Coffman spoke briefly during the open forum. Bills for July 1997 were approved for payment. Sam Vacek representing Vacek Group Engineering Firm of Houston told the Board the results of the tests conducted recently on Perry Gym. A written report with recommendations for repair will be sent to the school district in approximately two weeks. Santa Anna National Bank was awarded the school depository contract beginning Sept. 1, 1997 through August 31, 2001. Burl Lowry, CPA was employed to conduct the end of year audit for the 1996-97 school year. Approved on second reading for update 55 to the local policy manual.

Superintendent Bass, District Principal Coffman and Assistant Principal Debbie Bacon were approved as teacher appraisers for the 1997-98 school year. Bass presented the first reading of Local Policy FD, Admission and Attendance, and Local Policy DBBA, Drug/Alcohol Screening. The board discussed implementing a policy requiring students to be enrolled in the corresponding course in order to participate in certain activities. No action was taken. The following was reported during the superintendent's report: Repairs are completed on the elementary roof and Neogard has given the school district a limited 5-year warranty and maintenance agreement. Board members were reminded of the TASB/TASA Convention scheduled for September 26-29. Marty Reed, pastor of First Baptist Church, has requested per-

Commissioners Discuss Cutting County Roads; Appoint Aug. 9 Election Judges

Coleman County Commissioners met on Monday with County Clerk JoAnn Hale addressing the group regarding the practice of "cutting" county roads for utilities, etc. Following an unanimous vote there will be no more cutting of roads. All road crossings must be bored beginning at three (3) feet below the bottom of the ditch.

Hale also submitted the names of Helen Brown to serve as temporary Election Judge for 2 East, which was vacated by Barney Ransberger and LaJuan Sneed as temporary Election Judge for 1 North, recently vacated by the retirement of LaVerne Parrott. These temporary positions are for the August 9 constitutional election.

Commissioners will advertise for bids to sell the old Talpa Presbyterian Church and the two lots which it sits on. Since Talpa is unincorporated at present and the land was previously deeded to the City of Talpa, the property belongs to the county. There will have to be an appraisal of the property and commissioners will be able to reject or accept the bids received.

Two Budget Workshops for the 1997-98 budget are set for Thursday, July 17 at 1 p.m. and Monday, July 21 at 8 a.m.

Commissioners gave approval to County Treasurer Kay LeMay to

publish the quarterly condensed statement of accounts.

Approved for also given for the Child Support Division of the Attorney General's Office which commissioners are required to do every two years.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing presented bill with the General Fund totaling \$13,509; Road and Bridge \$33.55; and a the four precincts \$17,706. Commissioners granted their approval for Sansing to transfer \$10,000 into each precinct from the Road and Bridge Fund.

County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale expressed his appreciation to the elected officials who attend the Commissioners meeting.

County Treasurer LeMay informed the court that a recent Stress Management seminar had an almost 100% attendance and there was 129% effort put out to county workers to attend, even though some were not on duty at the time. The sessions were held July 9. The sessions saved the county approximately \$12,000 in Worker's Compensation premiums. The sessions were held at LeMay and James Cain with the Texas Association of Counties.

AUSTIN — Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills, the Texas Education Agency's first major public school curriculum-revising proposal in a decade, has drawn the support of many top educators and bars from others.

State Board of Education member Donna Ballard and conservative groups including the Texas Eagle Forum, American Family Association and Texas Christian Coalition have criticized the proposal, "questioning whether the standards are adequately rigorous."

Education Commissioner Mike Moses, who called a news conference to answer critics, said the standards already have undergone many revisions to address earlier concerns of conservatives.

Ballard, in an opinion column published in several newspapers, called for another set of standards with "intensive systematic phonics; increasingly rigorous grammar instruction; and grounding in classical reading beginning in the second grade." In her published column Ballard also criticized Gov. George W. Bush for endorsing the proposal.

Early Voting Starts July 21

Early voting for the Aug. 9 election, in which voters will decide whether to use the state's \$1 billion surplus to cut school property taxes, begins July 21 and extends through Aug. 5.

Other Capital Highlights

State Rep. L.P. "Pete" Patterson, D-Brookston, said he will retire from the Texas House after 20 years and announce his candidacy for state agriculture commissioner "in the near future." Incumbent commissioner Rick Perry, a Republican, is running for lieutenant governor.

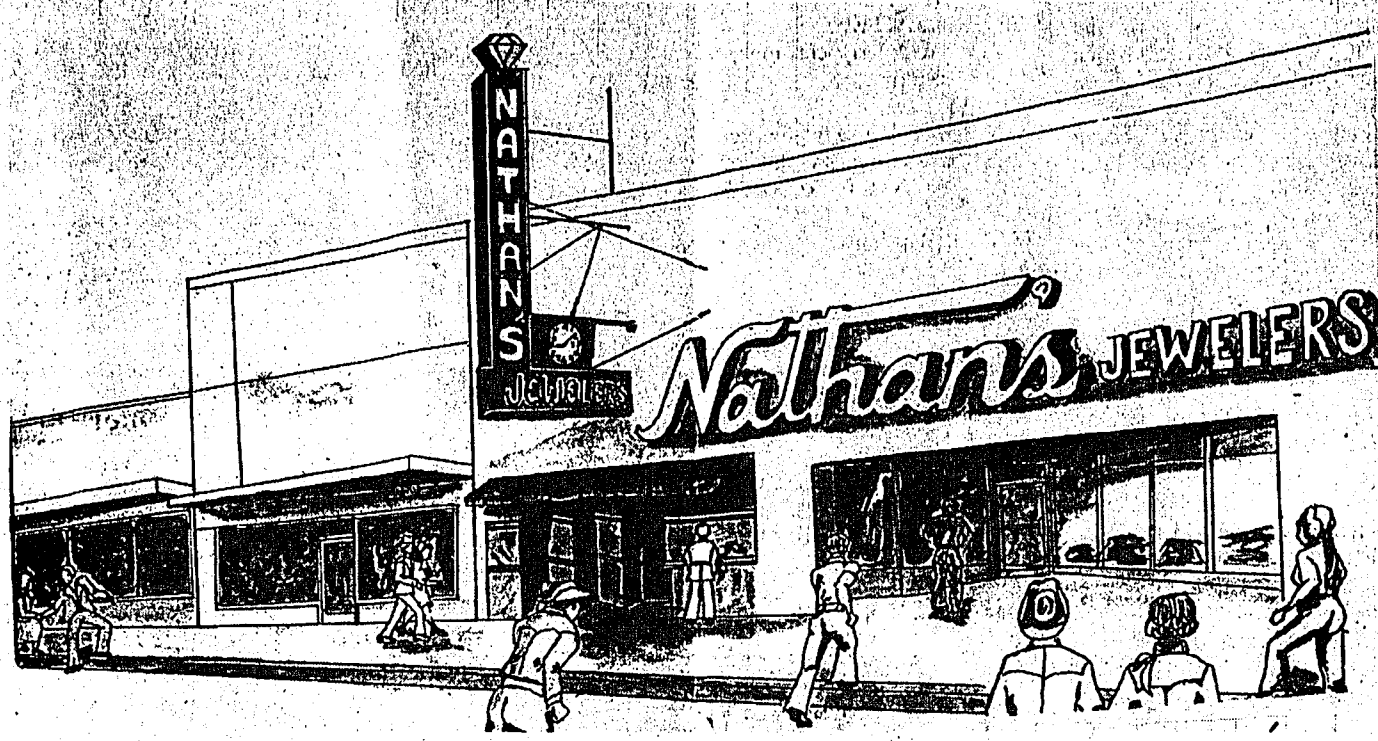

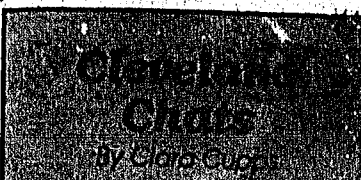

Blue and channel catfish are fair on cut bait and shad.

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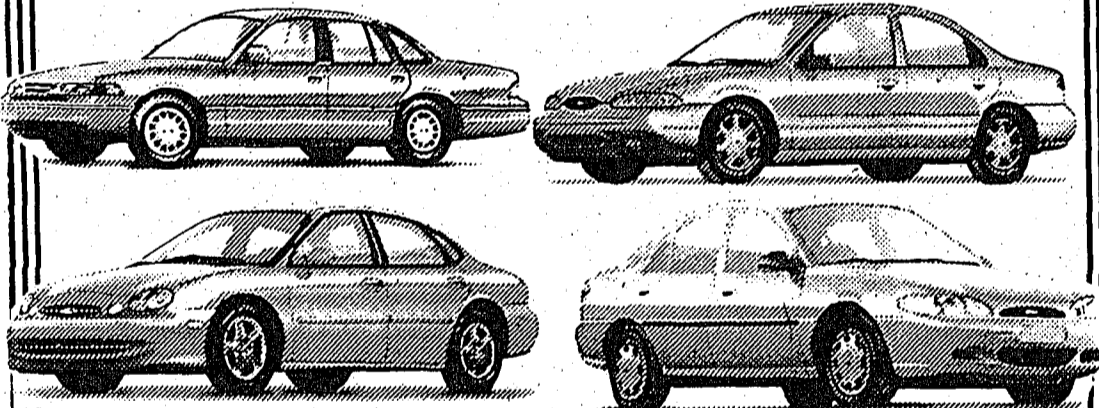
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
