## Welcome Santa Anna Ex Students

### Ex Student Of Year, Coming Home King, Queen

Ex students from across the state and the nation will converge on Santa Anna this weekend for the annual Ex Student Association Homecoming. Officers and directors of the association traditionally, with suggestions from members of honored classes, select an Ex Student of the Year and a Coming Home King and Queen.

This year's Ex Student of the Year is Novelle McClellan Boylston of Santa Anna, who is a member of the class of 1947. The class will be celebrating its 50th year after graduation from Santa Anna High School.

Guy Allen of Loving, N.M. and Gay Harvey Sewell of Abilene are Coming Home King and Queen, representing the SAHS class of 1977.

Mrs. Boylston's introduction is, as she wrote it, in first person:

Jasper and Veva Oakes McClellan were born, married and lived all their lives in Santa Anna. They both died in 1990. They were my parents. They and all their siblings (16) as well as my siblings, Frances, Joan, Jasper, Carol and I graduated from SAHS. Daddy was on the Board of Trustees for a number of years and Mother was an active member of the Ex-Student Association. They both supported the football team, the band and over-all education program of the Santa Anna schools.

After graduating, I attended Daniel Baker College for two years. In the fall of 1949, I went to Washington, D. C. with Aunt Era

Walters and started work with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The next year, I transferred to the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, when it was announced that the government had contracted the E.I. duPont de Nemours & Co. to build a plant that would produce the H-bomb. The plant was to be built in South Carolina and be called the Savannah River Plant. A lot of history was made with that announcement and the building of the plant in Aiken County.

In 1952 I married a native Aikenite and continued to live there forty years. We were blessed with two daughters, Veva Celeste and Jan Marie. Veva graduated from McMurry and is a teacher. She married Larry Cockerell, a native

### City Council Taking Steps To Assure Law Enforcement While Torres Is Off Work

In a called meeting Tuesday night, the Santa Anna City Council discussed several options concerning law enforcement in the city. According to Mayor Karen Morris, they had talked about the possibility of doing away with the local police department and contracting with the county sheriff's department to take care of law enforcement here as a long range plan. After consultation they found that was not an option.

The City will go ahead now and take applications for a second police officer under the COPS grant the city was recently awarded. If one can be hired soon this will relieve concerns while Police Chief Torres is off the job due to health reasons. He is currently in Hendrick Hospital, Abilene receiving treatment for a bone infection in the sinus and faces reconstructive surgery. It is estimated he will be off the job until after the first of the year. In the interim the Sheriff Dept. will cover Santa Anna as best they can.

In the meantime, according to Mayor Morris, council is

negotiating with Torres over payment for claimed days off not taken. His allotted 12 sick days have run out.

The Santa Anna City Council met on Tuesday, October 14 with council members Jim Spillman, Bobby Morgan, Jean Findley, Gilbert Morales and Mayor Karen Morris present.

Others attending were Debra Smiley and Jean French of the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce, Rusty Wells, Thomas Watson, Doug Watson, director of public works, and Alys Pelton, city secretary.

Gilbert Morales was appointed to fill the vacancy on the council.

Following the review of the police report, the police department's sick leave policy and options were discussed. It was agreed to leave the sick leave the same as other city employees at 12 days per year.

A public hearing was held for the closeout of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs Texas Community Development Program Grant. The contract began on July 1, 1995 and ended on Sept.

30, 1997. TCDDP funds used were \$248,262.00 and in-kind funds and

The program entitled "Growing Up With the Gatlins" was presented by Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Gatlin, parents of The Gatlin Brothers. Mrs. Billie Gatlin told about some of her adventures as the mother of a young singing group. Mr. Curley Gatlin assisted by showing videos that featured the singers today and included clips from home movies of their growing up years. He also added comments and stories to Mrs. Gatlin's talk.

Mrs. Gatlin said she grew up on gospel music and passed this love of music to her children. The boys displayed musical talent at an early age. The family lived in Odessa and the boys began singing in church and at local functions before they started to school. When Larry was 6, Steve 4 and Rudy only 2-1/2 they took part in a talent show at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene. They won first place in their age group. After that "The Gatlin Trio" was asked to sing on radio, TV and on the stage in the Abilene area. The group became The Gatlin Quartet when little sister Ladonna joined her brothers at age 3.

Each performance lead to invitations to perform somewhere else and soon the group was singing in churches in the Dallas area.

When the children were 8, 10, 12 and 14 they were invited to make a tour of churches from Texas to California and back. Mr. Gatlin was working so Mrs. Gatlin loaded the car, the kids and a trailer of costumes and equipment and headed for California. This became their summer schedule for several years. During the school year the family stayed in Odessa where the children attended school and took part in local church and school activities.

They did sing on some weekends through the year. The group continued singing together as each one graduated from high school and college. They became well known among quartet singers and after college Larry had the opportunity to fill in with a quartet singing in Las Vegas. Soon he was in Nashville and was joined by Steve and Rudy when they graduated from college. Ladonna married and she and her husband went into church music.

Today the boys own a club in Myrtle Beach where they entertain part of the year. This leaves time for their families, USO tours and

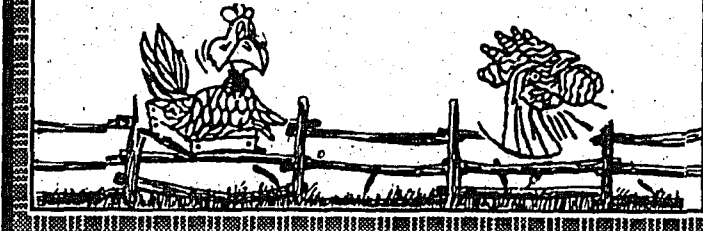

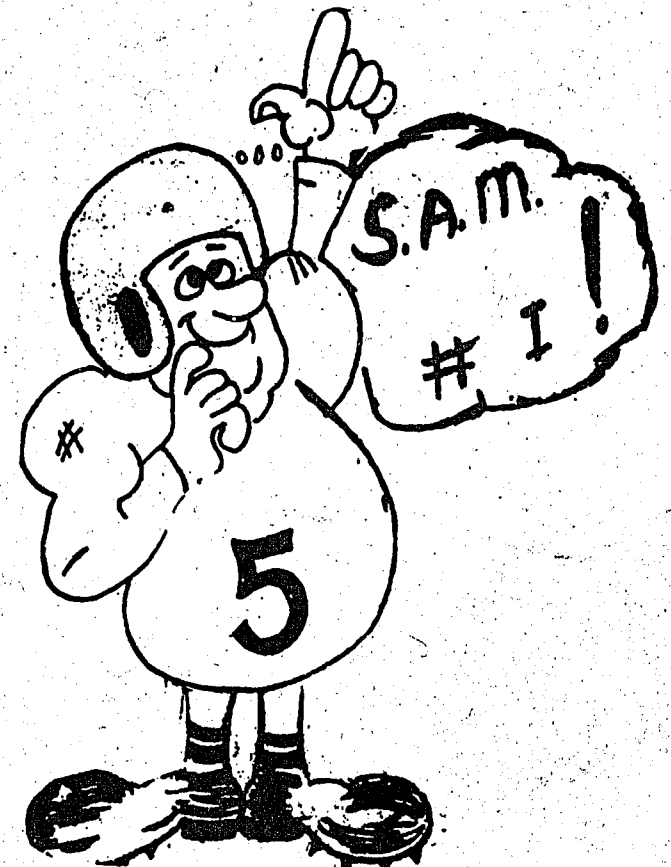

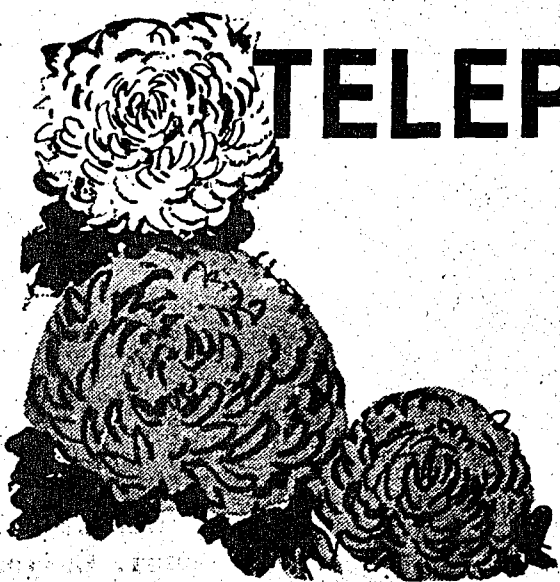

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### Feeding Children Nutritious Foods

Diet plans primarily target adults. So how do you know what to feed children? Three meals a day are not enough for kids. They have smaller stomachs, so they need smaller, more frequent meals and snacks. To make sure they get the proper nutrition, it is suggested to categorize foods. For instance, one important group includes breads, cereals, rice and pasta. These foods are good sources of complex carbohydrates, fiber and B vitamins. The best source of calcium would be milk, yogurt and cheese. So that's another nutrient group. Fruits and

vegetables contain essential vitamins such as A and C and they add fiber to the diet. The last group includes meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts. This protein group also provides vitamins, iron and zinc.



### Lone Star Gas Issues Winter Safety Tips

DALLAS—Lone Star Gas is urging customers to get a head start on winter by having their heating equipment inspected soon.

That is the first in a list of safety tips the company offered in connection with the approaching change of seasons.

Even when it is 90 degrees outside and difficult to imagine winter weather, Texans need to be aware of natural gas safety practices, Lone Star said. A good first step is to contact a certified heating and air conditioning contractor for an inspection of heating equipment.

One focus of that inspection should be any corrugated metal tube

connecting a gas supply line to the heating unit and all other appliances. Over time, pieces of these older brass connectors can separate, causing gas leaks. Although this type of connector is not believed to have been made for about 20 years, many may still be in use.

If any of these connectors are being used in your home or business, they should be replaced by either a qualified plumber or a certified heating and air conditioning contractor.

Lone Star offers the following additional safety tips for the cold months ahead:

\*If the pilot light of an appliance goes out, turn off the gas at the ap-

pliance for several minutes before you attempt to re-light it. You should find instructions attached to the appliance.

\*When re-lighting a pilot light, first strike the match and hold it to the opening. Then slowly turn on the gas.

\*Pilot lights and main burners on gas appliances should always produce a blue flame. If the flame is yellow or red, call a certified heating and air conditioning contractor immediately.

\*Use a gas appliance only for its intended purpose. An oven, for example, should not be used to heat a room.

If you use a space heater in your home, the following guidelines should be observed:

\*Before using a space heater, remove any cobwebs, dust or dirt.

\*If the space heater is vented, be sure the vent is operating properly.

\*If the space heater doesn't have a vent or an oxygen cut-off switch, provide proper outside ventilation such as a slightly open window.

\*Check the air/gas mixture of the space heater's flame to assure it is blue, not red or yellow.

\*Make sure the grille is intact and in place.

\*Keep space heaters away from furniture, draperies and other combustible materials.

Here are some other tips for year-round safety:

\*Never store or use gasoline or flammable liquids (such as paint, paint thinner, cleaning fluids, etc.) in the same room with any gas appliance.

\*Never store rags, paper or other combustibles near floor or wall furnace grilles.

\*Never store combustibles near an appliance with a pilot light or open flame.

\*Have qualified service people install and maintain all gas appliances.

\*Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for the installation and operation of each appliance. If your gas heater is in the garage, be sure it is installed at least 18 inches off the floor.

\*Before digging in your yard between the gas meter and the property line, call 1-800-344-8377 to have the gas line located and marked.

\*Have your plumber make periodic inspections of gas lines in your home and on your property.

If you ever smell the odor of gas in your home, follow these three steps:

1. Do not switch anything electrical on or off, strike a match, or do anything that might cause a spark. And don't use your telephone because telephones use small amounts of electricity.

2. Have everyone evacuate immediately. Leave the doors open for ventilation.

3. Go to a telephone away from your house and call Lone Star Gas. Wait until the cause of the odor is found before returning to your home.

## City Addresses Policy Of No Free Water

The City of Santa Anna has discovered that for over 31 years an ordinance has been in effect stating that the City shall supply no free water from the water system.

According to information received by Mayor Karen Morris, in 1965 and again in 1979, The City of Santa Anna, Texas issued revenue bonds to fund the improvement of its water and sewer system. This action was and still is authorized by Article 1111 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas. The Ordinances authorizing the bonds expressly prohibit the provision of

cost-free or reduced-free water service from the water system to any entity, including the City itself. The violation of any covenant or agreement in the Bond Ordinance is considered a default or violation of the terms of the Bonds.

Specifically, Section 25 of the Ordinance establishing the 1965 Bond Issue clearly states:

"That no free service of the System shall be allowed, and should the City or any of its agents

or instrumentalities make use of the services and facilities of the System, payment of the reasonable value thereof shall be made by the City out of funds from sources other than the revenues and income of the System..."

Similarly, Section 17 of the Ordinance establishing the 1979 Bond Issue states as follows:

"...Provided, also, that no free services of the System shall be allowed, and should the City or any

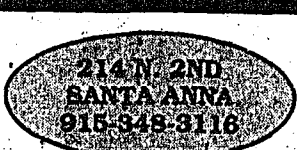
In July, Rose accompanied Bennie and family to Florida on vacation. She saw the old guest house she stayed in in 1943 when her husband was stationed at Camp Wood.

#### TESTING QUESTION

The American dream is as much about the future as it is about the past. Universal education is a pillar of the American success story. All of us are aware that without a first-class education system, that dream can rapidly become a nightmare.

Our national debate over how best to realize the dream has focused recently on the issue of academic standard setting — establishing educational goals and tracking the progress of students toward achieving them. There are two schools of thought surrounding this question:

- 1) That the federal government, through the Department of Education, should develop and administer national tests.
- 2) That states and individual school districts should be responsible for this tracking.

The administration favors the first method. My philosophy falls squarely on the second. I believe that parents, teachers and local school officials are better qualified to pass judgment on how children are learning than a bureaucrat sitting in an office in the Department of Education in Washington, D.C.

In addition, the administration has proposed a testing program based on the "whole math" approach. This controversial teaching method, which encourages students to rely on calculators and discourages basic math skills, has resulted in declines in math performance.

For example, median scores on the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills taken by more than 37,000 Department of Defense students one year after the Defense Department introduced whole math dropped nine points for third graders, 12 points for fourth graders, 11 points for fifth graders, 10 points for sixth graders, 10 points for seventh graders and four points for eighth graders.

This debate recently came to a head in the Senate. I voted for legislation that prevents the administration from allowing the federal government to develop and administer national tests. This bill, which passed 88-12, carries deliberate instructions and prohibitions: 1) Any future national test must be developed by an independent board comprised of individuals from states and local communities; 2) These tests must be administered on a purely voluntary basis, and may not be imposed on any state, school or student; 3) Nor may testing be tied to any federal funding.

With this legislation we are reminding the administration that the private sector already is doing a good job, without Uncle Sam's "help." Two examples of this are the advanced placement tests and the Scholastic Aptitude Tests (SAT), a series of privately administered exams taken by most high school students. The SAT's function, in effect, as a national standard measurement. They are not, however, mandated, paid for nor administered under the auspices of the federal government.

So the debate is not over standard-setting. Everyone favors the establishment of ways to measure competence in the basics. Testing at an earlier age, along the lines of the SATs, may well enhance efforts to provide all children with a superior education. We want all children to learn at the highest possible levels.

It is proven that when parents take an interest in schools and participate in their children's education, achievement scores are higher. Federal intervention has never been as successful. 10.03.97

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## Fishing Lake Ivie

Water pretty clear on main lake but a little murky in upper end and tributaries. Crappie fishing is really coming on. Best baits, minnows and jigs fished around brush piles. We are catching some black bass weighing up to 6 or 7 pounds using topwaters and buzz baits in mornings and late afternoons. Mid-day action on Carolina or Texas-rigged worms and spinner baits fished in 5 to 10 feet of water. White bass are good on live bait. Channel and blue catfish are fair on cut bait and live shiners. Yellow catfish are fair on trollines baited with live bream fished in the river and around the dam.

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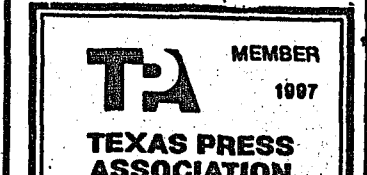
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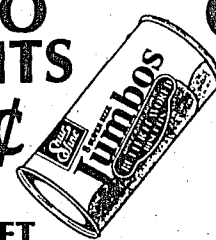


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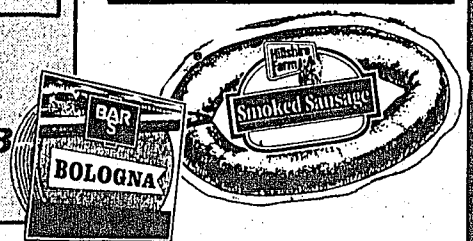
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
