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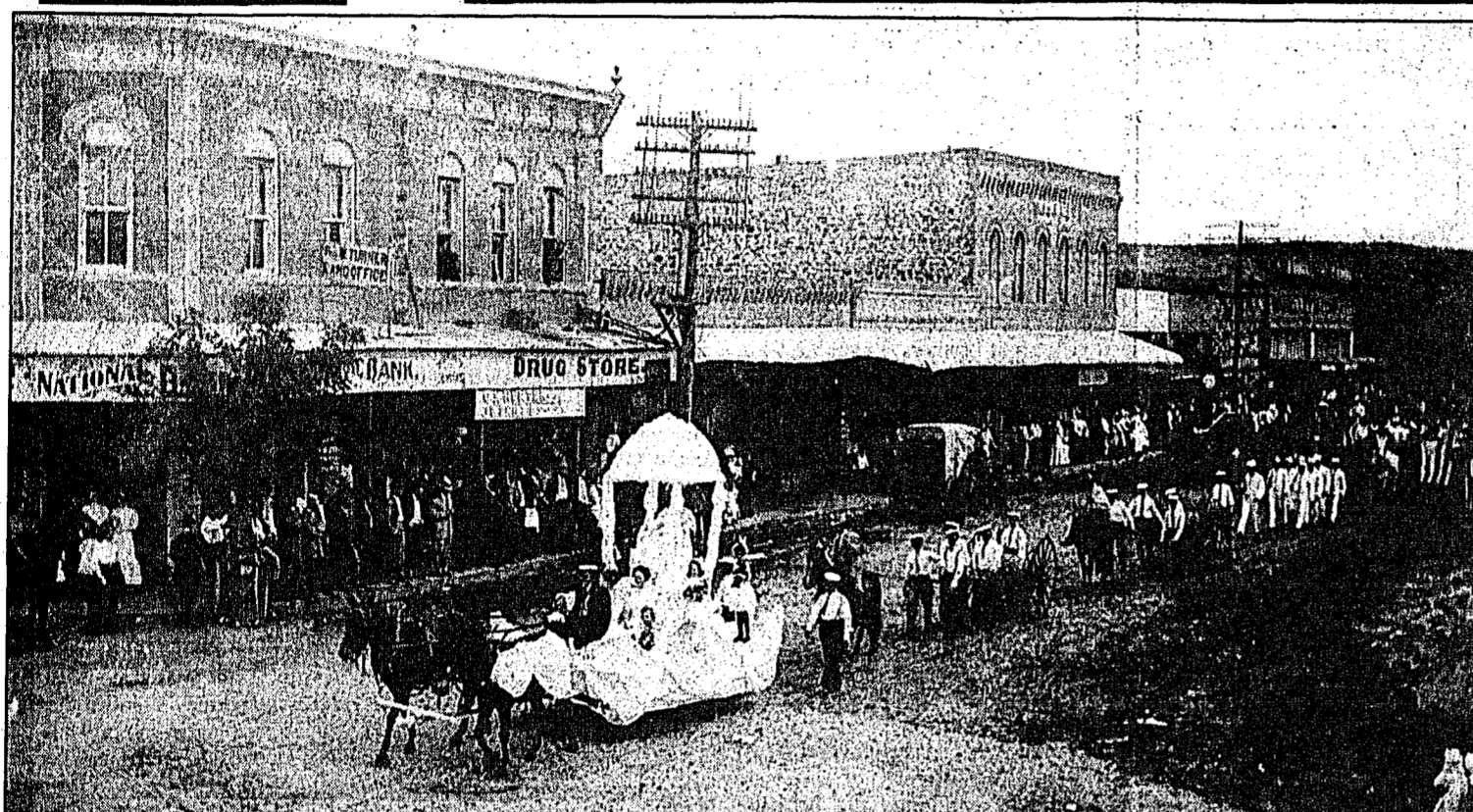

Everyone Loves A Parade

Everyone loves a parade and shown here is a parade scene in Santa Anna, believed to be about 1910, around the time when citizens first had a city water supply. It is not known what the occasion was that prompted the parade, but note, however, the two horse drawn "fire trucks" which seemed to be points of pride. In white

uniforms near the end of the parade line shown here may have been the community band we have read about in historical articles. Those wearing the uniforms are carrying something which could very well be musical instruments (or guns, as one viewer of the picture suggested). They are followed by several horse drawn carriages or wagons.

World Championship Bison Cook-off, Frontier Heritage Festival Set Here In October

October 11 is the date set for the annual World Championship Bison Cook-off at Santa Anna. The cook-off will be held again this year in conjunction with the Frontier Heritage Festival, with all events taking place at the Santa Anna Rodeo and Youth Association arena on the San Angelo cut-off.

Prizes of \$1000, \$500 and \$200 will be awarded to the top three Bison cookers who will converge on Santa Anna from many distant areas. Winners will also receive trophies.

To make it more interesting, this year an amateur division has been added for those not familiar with cooking bison meat. Cash prizes of \$300, \$200 and \$100 will be awarded in that division. The first place winner will also receive a trophy, and second and third places

will receive ribbons.

Entry fees for both divisions are \$50 each. The Bison will be furnished.

A beef brisket and beans cook-off will also be held with the entry fee being \$15. In the brisket cook-off, cooks will furnish their own beef and will donate it to the Historical Development Organization to sell at noon along with the bison. The winning cook will receive \$300 and a trophy while second and third places will get \$200 and \$100 respectively and a ribbon each.

Other events for the festival, which is organized by the Santa Anna HDO, will include the return of the Horse Cavalry Platoon from Fort Hood who thrilled spectators at last year's event and the ranch rodeo which proved to be a quite a popular event with festival goers.

There will also be living history exhibits and demonstrations such as blacksmith, weaving and other lost arts.

An accident four miles south of Santa Anna Saturday morning sent a woman to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by helicopter.

According to law enforcement personnel, Patricia Smith, 42, of Santa Anna east eastbound on County Road 258. She attempted to make a U-turn on U. S. Highway 283. The 1993 Jeep collided with a 1997 Dodge pickup driven by Bill Henning, 47 of Glen Cove.

Retirement Party Thursday For Delma Blair, Brookesmith Postmaster

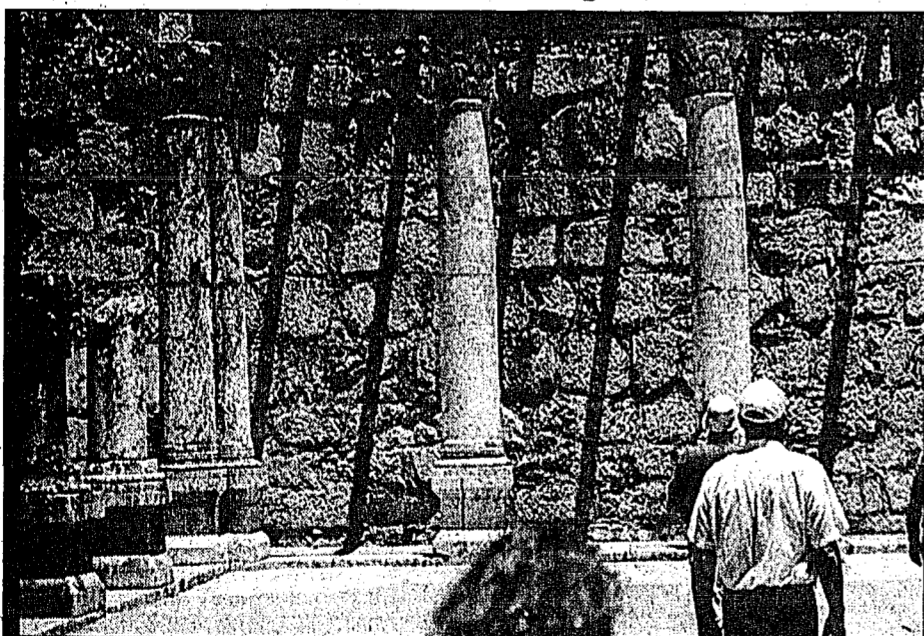
There will be a retirement party for Delma (Drake) Blair of Santa Anna, Postmaster at Brookesmith, Thursday, August 28.

This summer I had a wonderful opportunity to visit Israel in a special way. The norm is to go as a tourist to the different sights in that ancient country and see the places where the patriarchs of the Hebrew culture lived and worked from the time of Abraham. Although this was part of my experience in Israel,

the major portion of my time was spent in excavating the ancient city of Banias (Caesarea Philippi) in the Golan area of northern Israel. Being able to walk the same ground as people over 2000 years ago. And to uncover artifacts that had not been touched or seen in over 2000 years was awesome and beyond description. I gained a new

respect for archaeological excavation and the importance of learning about the past.

I could tell many stories of my experiences, and could fill this entire paper for several weeks, but to share one while digging at Banias will have to do for now. I was on my hands and knees, in a hole five feet square and six feet deep digging

slowly with a trowel when I felt something beneath my left hand. I began to dig with my fingers and found an ancient oil lamp, completely intact that according to our experts, was dated to the time of Christ. This was very exciting, because you had to move a lot of dirt before anything of importance was

August 24-30 Is Gun Safe Week

August 24-30, 1997 has been designated by the 75th Legislature of the State of Texas as GUN SAFE WEEK (House Concurrent Resolution No. 260). As many schools being a new year, their Gun Safe liaison—a health professional, PTA leader, or public safety instructor—will send home a letter from The Firearm Safety Coalition, the provider of the public service program coordinated by the Texas Nurses Foundation.

The Firearm Safety Coalition, a broad-based, non-partisan group representing both gun owners and non-gun owners, introduced the Gun Safe program in response to House Bill 44, enacted by the 74th Texas Legislature. That legislation encouraged Texas school districts to provide or participate in firearms safety programs for students in kindergarten through 12th grade and amended the Penal code to create an offense for negligently allowing access by a child to a loaded firearm. The Gun Safe program was introduced to the Lone Star State when Governor Bush designated "Gun Safe Day" in Texas May 16, 1996. Since that time, Gun Safe program materials—advocating proper storage

of guns in all Texas homes where children live or visit—have been provided to over 185,000 Texas families.

The Gun Safe secure storage standards are simple. There are no unlocked guns in a Gun Safe home. All guns—sporting gun, antique guns, BB guns, pellet guns and others—should be properly stored and locked for the protection of Texas children. Adults should secure guns in a safe container with a key or combination lock. Guns that are not stored should have a properly fitted trigger lock which can be obtained from a local gun dealer. Only adults should have access to lock keys and combinations.

To lose one child to gunfire is too many. This past spring in Houston alone, in a three week period, four children aged two to twelve were injured or killed as a result of access to guns. Throughout the year similar tragedies occurred around Texas. By spreading the Gun Safe standards we can all work together joining the Texas Nurses Foundation, Texas

I'm Deputy Barney Fife in a jail-break. The escapees have the guns and are locating the bullets. I'm still in control, but barely.

We have visited the big city playgrounds. Kids out of nowhere asked for chewing gum. A couple asked for 20 bucks. All wanted a little attention.

When I asked them questions, I recalled the genuine concern folks had for me 40 years ago.

My girls think I was bored in the small West Texas Coleman County community of Rockwood.

But I had a hectic schedule. And after I turned 10, three great-uncles demanded my services.

On my ninth August, I charged downhill on my red Ranger bike to scatter gravel between Rockwood's five buildings.

The elderly McCrary brothers, perched on soda boxes by 9 a.m. yelled, "That boy sure can ride." They asked me about the Yankees while they rolled cigarettes one handed, the cowboy way.

Rosabelle's cowbell clanged on her grocery store door. She still sometimes napped until a customer slapped change down.

Rosabelle updated me on the recovery of my recently departed city cousins.

Their bruised feelings from stock tank dunkings and snipe hunts were the last to heal.

Ronnie Pete was the only other town kid my age. We met at Rosabelle's. We licked a Popsicle on credit if we promised to drop in that afternoon. We gigged crawdads or shot pellet guns until his dad's garage lured Ronnie Pete back.

I studied the baseball box scores at Linnie's Cafe. Linnie quizzed me

Evenings I checked trotlines, floated the Colorado River, hunted the largest jackrabbit in Texas. My dog, Mickey, barked at full Comanche moons.

Rockwood's tallest antenna caught one snowy channel. We had no television.

Cards or dominoes were checked while the Cardinals' baseball radioman Harry Caray bragged on Stain Musial.

Age age 10, my great uncles discovered my talent for cutting and worming calves.

I disliked hauling hay but liked the pocked change I earned.

My uncles always needed help. My town dude loafing days were over.

My ranching relatives still need strong young backs.

I should send those shiftless playground kids I met. But those kids are not my problem, I guess.

Next summer, my girls can do light chores. I'll pay my cousins if I have to.

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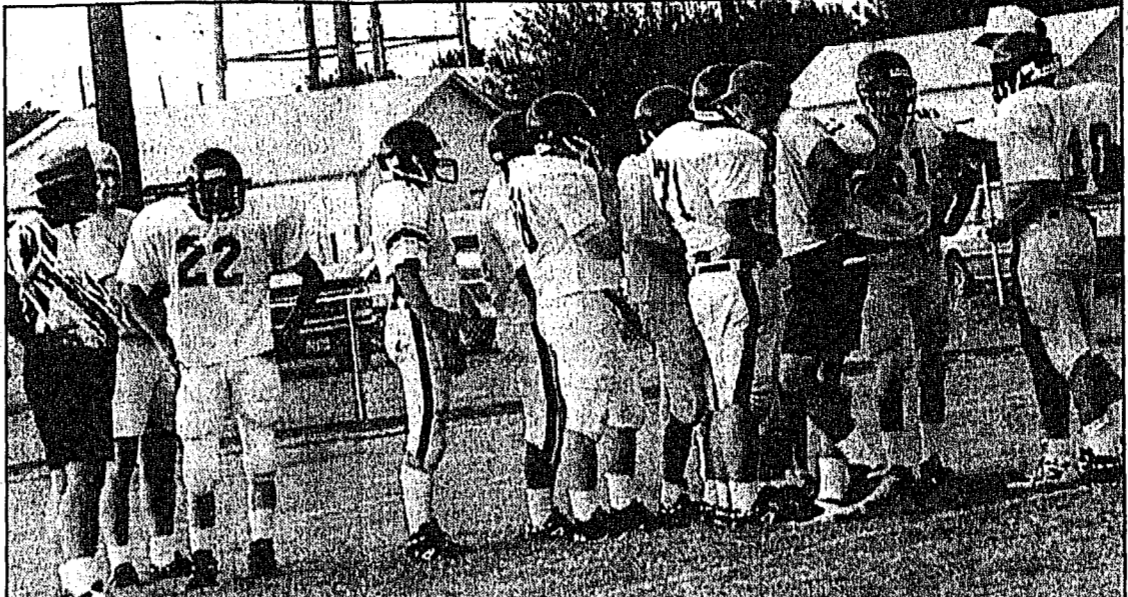

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Perry Tells Of "New Laws Affecting Agriculture" On September 1

AUSTIN--Commissioner Rick Perry is reminding Texas farmers and ranchers that several new laws impacting agriculture are set to become effective September 1.

"From private property postings to fire ant research to horse theft prevention, the 75th Legislature passed a number of bills that producers and landowners need to know about," Perry said.

The following is a summary of legislation passed during the 75th Legislature that affects Texas agriculture and becomes effective September 1:

***PESTICIDES:** House Bill 1144 consolidates the state's pesticide and herbicide legal codes, strengthens the enforcement of the state's pesticide laws and streamlines regulatory requirements.

***WATER:** One provision in Senate Bill 1 expands an agricultural loan program--the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority's Linked Deposit Program--that lends money to farmers and ranchers who implement water conservation initiatives such as converting to more efficient irrigation equipment, building or improving stock tanks or clearing brush.

***AGRICULTURAL LOANS:** House Bill 2499 increases the maximum loan amount available to buy farm and ranch land under the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority's Farm & Ranch

Finance Program from \$150,000 to \$250,000. House Bill 933 increases the maximum loan amount borrowed under TAFE's Young Farmer Loan Guarantee Program from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

***FIRE ANT RESEARCH:** A provision in the state appropriations bill, House Bill 1, provides \$2.5 million each year over the next biennium for research into long-term, cost-effective and ecological methods of controlling fire ants. Funding also will be used to organize community-wide fire ant management programs and to educate the public about effectively controlling fire ants.

***PRIVATE PROPERTY NOTICES:** House Bill 793 allows landowners to use purple paint marks on trees or posts as no-trespassing notices.

***CONFIDENTIAL WATER AND SOIL PLANS:** Water quality management or soil conservation plans developed by landowners or tenants in cooperation with local or state soil and water conservation districts will not be subject to the Texas Open Records Law under House Bill 1808.

***LIABILITY LIMITS:** House Bill 2664 clarifies previous liability legislation by specifying that limited liability applies only to owners of "agricultural land used for recreational purposes." The bill

also protects landowners from unlimited liability for non-paying as well as paying invited guests who visit agricultural lands for recreation such as bird watching, hiking and hunting.

***AGRICULTURAL IMPROVEMENTS:** House Bill 2945 allows agricultural landowners to construct barns, pens, equipment sheds and fences on their property without fear of liability as long as the structures do not affect public health or interfere with the flow of water, light or air to other agricultural lands.

***POACHING:** House Bill 1941 provides additional penalties for poaching that include suspension or loss of fishing or hunting licenses.

***LIVESTOCK INSPECTIONS:** House Bill 1823 allows livestock slaughtered for personal use to be exempted from inspections by the Texas Department of Health.

***HORSE THEFT PREVENTION:** House Bill 2396 strengthens horse theft prevention efforts in Texas by requiring the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to provide training to horse owners in horse theft prevention. The bill identifies certain law enforcement agencies that are responsible for training their employees in investigating horse thefts. And the bill provides various methods horse owners can use to identify their animals.

***TIMBER:** Penalties for unauthorized timber harvests and a trust fund for timber sales are established by House Bill 1128. House Bill 1723 allows landowners who convert agricultural use land to timber production to retain the agricultural classification and appraisal for 15 years--the amount of time it generally takes to grow a crop of trees that can be harvested.

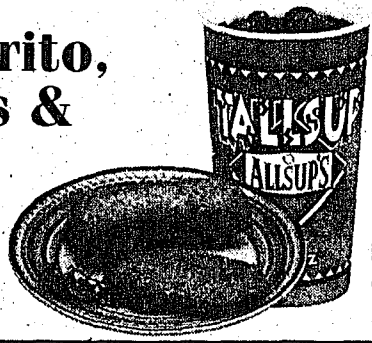
