Mountaineers Break Drought With Home Field Shut-out Of Santo

The Santa Anna Mountaineers were able to break the three-year home field drought last Friday evening when they shut-out Santo The last time the Mountaineers won on their own turf was October 1994.

After a scoreless first quarter, Mountaineer Quarterback Shane Watson threw to Chris Guerrero for a 15-yard TD. Josh Roberson added the kick.

In the second half of the game Roberson score from 20 and 18 yards out. One kick was blocked. Watson carried the ball across the line for two points on the other extra point.

Athletic Director David Robinett said on Monday, "I am very pleased with our defense, they kept Santo from moving the ball across the goal line. Our offense had 335 yards of which 317 were rushing."

Penalties were kept to a minimum this week with the team receiving only three for 20 yards.

Thinking of Christmas? Men are not easy to buy for. Maybe a subscription to The Family Handyman would be just the right thing. There are ideas for repairs, building, projects and the newest gadgets. I know many women who would love this too.

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) urges all Texans to get yearly flu vaccinations. The experts also warn that the elderly and others who may be at high risk of influenza and its complications should be immunized even before the flu season begins.

The flu season usually lasts from December through April.

The U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year predicts which strains of influenza pose the greatest public health danger in the U.S.

The vaccine CDC has recommended for the 1997-98 season is meant to combat the A/Wuhan, A/Bayern and B/Beijing strains of the disease. The effectiveness of year's shots declines with time, therefore, annual immunizations with the appropriate vaccines are recommended for everyone except people with serious allergies to

People most at risk of severe or fatal complications of the disease include those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems, diabetics and children on aspirin therapy.

Influenza kills about 20,000 in the U.S. each year. According to Jim Schuermann, public health technician in the TDH Infectious Disease Epidemiology and Surveillance Division, the elderly are the group hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of elderly Americans and others in high-risk groups heed our regular warnings to have yearly influenza vaccinations." he said. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of a persistent, unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strains of influenza, but not from the vaccine. If they do become ill with flu, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of the case."

Other categories of people who are most likely to develop influenza complications are:

*Adults and children with chronic heart and lung disorders, including children with asthma:

*People under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, diabetes, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems; and

*Children (18 and younger) who Devin is the son of James and aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reyels syndrome after influenza

The Starrs are very active church members and after retiring they started a church in the mobile


home, then adding a room to their home for worship. They were very involved in building a temporary chapel and worship center.

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


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
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
