

Weeds Growths Are Menace To Health

AUSTIN, Aug. 14.—Texas has been fortunate this year in having beneficial rains in many parts of the State during the first summer months. The rains, however, have made the weeds grow faster and left water standing in secluded places and has created an unsightly and insanitary condition in many communities.

"While many places are well kept, there are some individuals who do not realize the necessity of keeping the weeds down and eliminating the standing water so that mosquitoes cannot breed," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

"An appeal to the civic pride of the citizens in a community will often result in a clean-up campaign with astonishing results. Each individual can help by inspecting his premises to see that all nuisances are eliminated.

The inspection for conditions which might need correction should include:

1. Weeds and long grass which spring up almost overnight this time of year.
2. Cans and other rubbish which might furnish a sufficient amount of water for mosquitoes to breed. Inspection of fish ponds.
3. Garbage should be disposed of in such a manner that flies will not be attracted.
4. Out-door toilets should be made sanitary.
5. Wells and cisterns should be inspected to see that the family water supply is free from contaminated material.

DEMONSTRATOR STORIES

A comfortable, well equipped bed is the goal of Mrs. Paul Riddle, bedroom demonstrator of the Indian Creek Home Demonstration Club. As a foundation for her bed a good 50 pound mattress and vertical coil type springs, in good repair, were

Mrs. Riddle's first consideration. Unless both mattress and springs are good a bed can never be comfortable or satisfactory.

In this part of the country where dust and sand are constantly in the air a bed needs as much protection as possible from getting dirty. Mrs. Riddle plans to make a spring cover, mattress pad and pillow protectors to keep her springs and mattress from becoming soiled.

The spring cover will be made from heavy A. C. A. ticking to give the maximum of protection and wear. Unbleached domestic is a good material for mattress covers as it is light enough to laundry well, tho quite durable. The mattress pad may be made from an old quilt covered with unbleached domestic or made new, containing about 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of cotton. A soft material such as bleached domestic, or nainsook is best for pillow protectors. With such adequate protection from dirt and soil it is easy to keep a bed clean and comfortable so as to encourage good, restful sleep that is so

necessary.

In a yard that slopes both the soil and moisture are lost after each rain if nothing is done to hold them, says Mrs. Tom Poppoe, yard demonstrator of the Silver Valley Home Demonstration Club. Her yard slopes from the front to the back and most of the good top soil has washed away as a result. She plans to break up the ground and sod the lawn in Bermuda grass. Grass not only adds to the attractiveness of the entire place but does much to hold the soil and moisture. Mrs. Poppoe feels that the smooth, grass lawn will do much to add to the pleasure of her family this summer as well as help keep down weeds and dust and make her home more attractive.

Texas Disposes of Surplus Commodities

Texas was one of 36 states of the nation which during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936, disposed of burdensome surpluses of agricultural commodities for distribution for relief purposes.

Purchases in Texas included 11,812,050 pounds of early intermediate onions. Total purchases of fruits and vegetables under this program were: apples, 1,348,355 bushels; dried beans, 1,300,000 pounds; dried peas, 7,502,040 pounds; citrus fruit, 328,592 boxes; dried prunes, 17,699,600 pounds; late carrots, 2,688,000 pounds; late onions, 5,933,650 pounds; cabbage, 4,369,760 tons; and early and intermediate onions, 28,116,050 pounds, obtained in 35 other states. Surplus eggs also were handled under this program in New York, Illinois, Massachusetts, Missouri, Texas and Oklahoma.

The purchasing was conducted by the Commodities Purchase Section, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, and the purchases financed from funds made available by Congress from customs receipts. Distribution of the commodities was made by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation.

Surplus dry swim milk, evaporated milk, butter, cheese, wheat for flour milling, flax, turnips, grapes, and cherries also were handled during the year under other programs.

Care was taken in each instance to distribute these surpluses only to those who could not buy them, thus preventing them from conflicting with like commodities handled in the regular channels of trade.

FARM YOUTH CONTENTED

An extensive survey made not long ago by the research bureau of a large business concern revealed the surprising fact that boys and girls living on American farms are more generally satisfied with their lot than were any other young people in the world. The fact was surprising because that the opposite was supposedly true according to the belief of a majority of people.

Seven hundred fifty thousand investigations were included in the canvass and of that number, 93 per cent of the girls reported that they intended to remain in the country, while 89 per cent of the boys had made definite plans for careers in farm communities.

The old myth that opportunity dwells only in cities exploded long ago. While it is true that such great financial and industrial successes as are achieved by the very few are possible only in cities, farm life offers the greater certainty of independence and competence. There is no problem of unemployment in the country for those who can work and are willing to work. The farmer's problem is to get enough competent help.

Superficially it might seem that in the matter of education city youths had the advantage. Yet of the farm youth concerned in the survey already mentioned, 75 per cent of the boys and 73 per cent of the girls intended to go to college. In no large city do such percentages of youth enjoy the advantages of college education.

No longer is the farmer isolated. Machinery has lightened his labor. And good roads, the automobile, the telephone, the radio, and the circulating library enable the farm population to keep abreast of the times as readily as do dwellers in cities.

Youth on American farms, all things considered, has special reason to be gratified by its prospects.

The same is true of many individuals who wear, particular ties, eye glasses and the like. They would not look like themselves if they changed their style of such accessories.

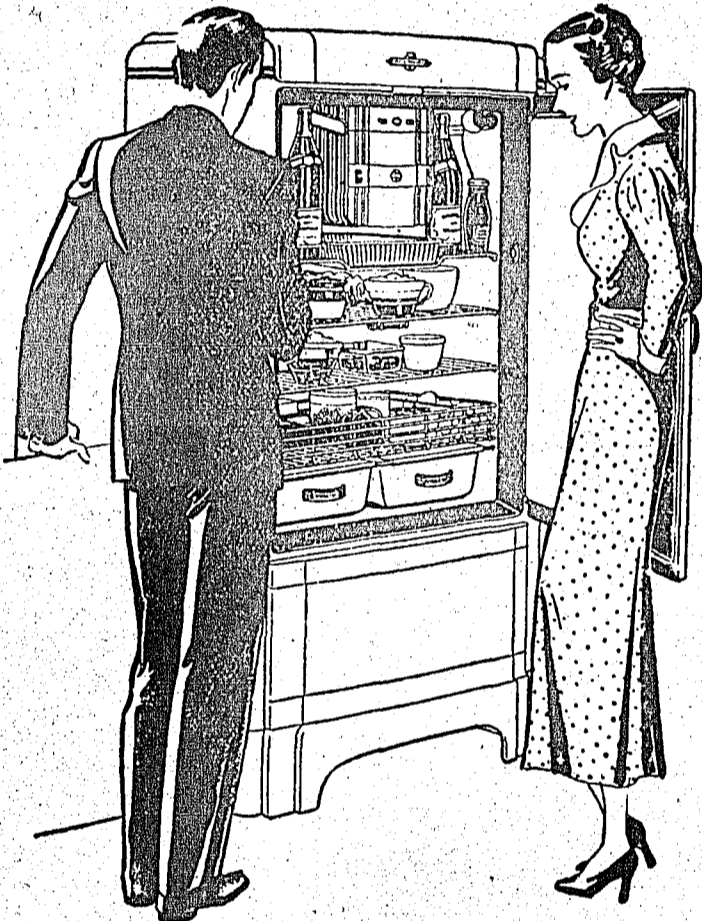
