

Relating to the Texas Water Department Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water supply, water quality, flood control or state participation from one category of use to another category to maximize the use of existing funds and relating to more efficient operation of the bond programs.

8. Expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender,

with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead.

9. To authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of prop-

10. Designating the purpose for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used.

11. Limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund.



This brings to mind our Niagara Falls trip. We drove there on our tenth wedding anniversary for a long weekend, Thomas and I. I had heard of Niagara Falls since I was little and wanted to see them but was not overly excited. It was one of the great sights in these United States, but no big deal, I thought. Thomas had seen them in another lifetime and thought I would enjoy

We drove onto the American side of the Falls, found a room in one of the hotels overlooking the Falls, then we took the elevator up to our floor, the twelfth, opened our door and traipsed in with our luggage. Thomas immediately went to the large window and withdrew the drapery. I naturally followed him and arrived facing the glass just as

the drape swept across my face. What I saw left me speechless. I could not catch my breath for the awesome sight of tons and tons of clear blue water cascading over a fall that must be hundreds of feet down to its base. But this sight wasn't enough for me!
