## Council To Review Police And Judge Applications Tuesday

The Santa Anna City Council will hold a called meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, November 4th to review police and Municipal judge applications. The meeting will also be a workshop addressing police department policies and procedures.

The council had been planning to employ an additional police officer through a federal COPS grant. Since Chief of Police Carlos Torres is expected to be off the job until after the first of the year due to health problems, they have speeded up their plans to try to get someone on the job as soon as possible.

Current Municipal Judge, Barbara Kingsbery has tendered her resignation as of December 1 due to a busy schedule of operating her ranch and taking care of other personal business matters. The council is looking to find a replacement for her.

## Two Local Students Included In National Dean's List

Two students from Santa Anna are among the approximately 115,000 students included in the 20th annual edition of *The National Dean's List 1996-97*, just published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois. Students are selected for this honor by their college deans, registrars or honor society advisors and must be in the upper 10% of their class; on their school's "Dean's List" or have earned a comparable honor. Listed students are eligible to compete for \$50,000 in scholarship awards funded by the publisher and may also use a referral service for future employment opportunities. More than 2,500 colleges and universities nationwide use the publication to recognize their academically qualified students.

Local students selected include Laura Howze and Betsy Melver Jones, both who are attending Howard Payne University in Brownwood.

## Voters Go To Polls Tuesday For 14 Constitutional Amendments

Voters will go to the polls on Tuesday November 4 to cast their votes for or against 14 proposed constitutional amendments. Voting locally from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Mountain City Community Center (Hi-Rise).

Amendments to be voted include:  
1. To allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation.  
2. To authorize the legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property

tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead.

3. To authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented.

4. Eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution.

5. Authorizing the supreme court to sit to transact business at any location in this state.

6. Allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia.

7. Relating to the Texas Water Department Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water supply, water quality, flood control or state participation from one category of use to another category to maximize the use of existing funds and relating to more efficient operation of the bond programs.

8. Expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender,

with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead.

9. To authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property.

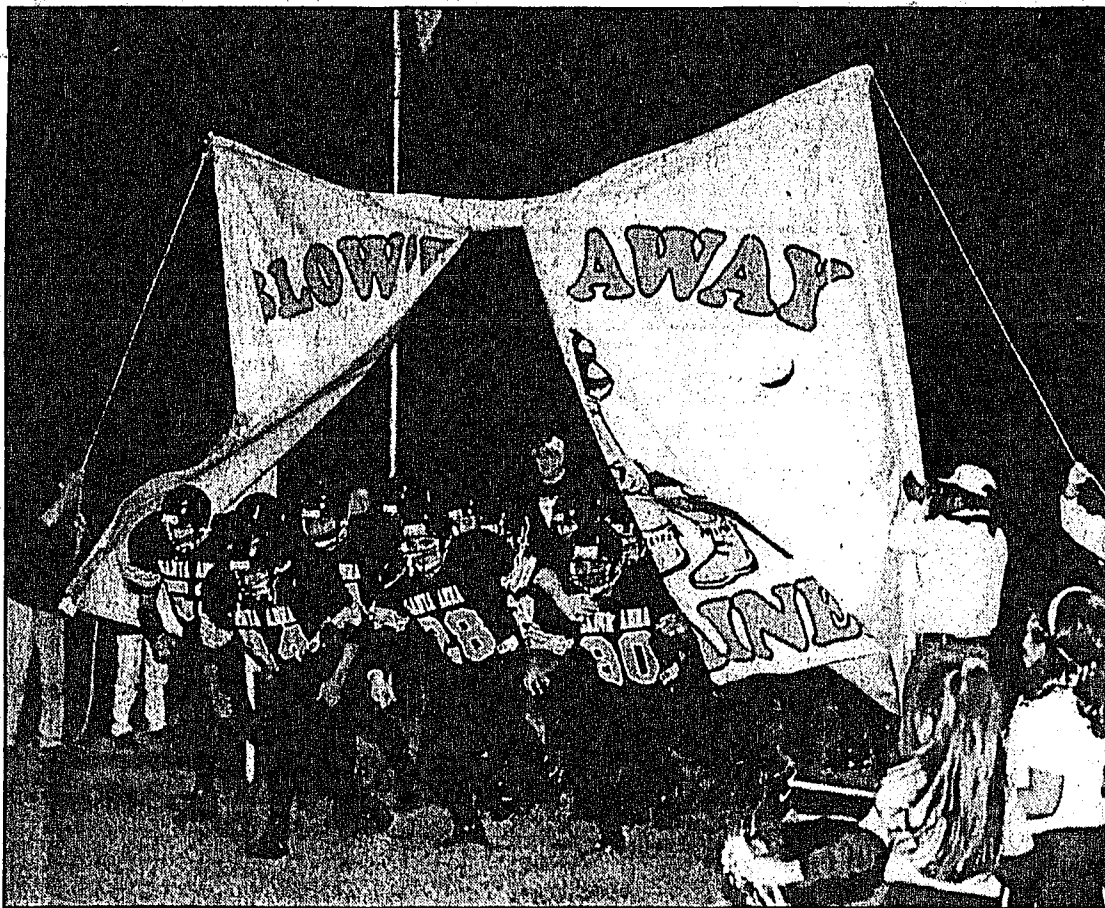
10. Designating the purpose for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used.

11. Limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund.

12. To establish a deadline for supreme court action on a motion for rehearing.

13. To encourage persons to plan and save for young Texans' college education, to extend the full faith and credit of the state to protect the Texas tomorrow fund of the prepaid higher education tuition program, and to establish the Texas tomorrow fund as a constitutionally protected fund.

14. To allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of constables.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers gave the homecoming crowd what they came to see last Friday night, a thrilling game in a 34-0 shutout of the Evant Elks.

According to Head Coach David Robinett the Mountaineers had 316 offensive yards in the game.

Mountaineers who helped with this yardage were Clay Crosley with a 45 yard punt return for a touchdown; Chris Boyet 31 yards on six carries; Shane Watson 21 yards on six carries and a touchdown; Josh Roberson 128 yards on 17 carries and two touchdowns; Hector Patino 48 yards on seven carries; and Jason Jones 82 yards on six carries and a touchdown. Defensively Lupe Castillo and Clay Crosley had an interception each, Ryan Keeney recovered two fumbles and Jesse Castillo recovered one fumble.

Offensive player of the game was

Shane Watson with Defensive player of the game going to Josh Roberson and Clay Crosley. These honors are named each Monday by the coaching staff.

Robinett said Monday, "It was a big win Friday night. We were a little slow getting starting but did a decent job executing our plays. Our backs did extremely well blocking for each other."

This Friday night the Mountaineers will face their big challenge of the year when they travel to Cross Plains. The Buffalos are currently ranked sixth in state and this is a must win game for the Mountaineers in order to have a chance of advancing to the playoffs. District standings at this time are so close that the teams advancing to the playoffs may not be determined until the final gun of the each game sounds next week. District stands are shown on page 4 of this weeks NEWS. Going into

the game with no injuries will help this week.

According to Robinett the Mountaineers are going to have to play with no turnovers, no fumbles and put a lot of points on the board Friday.

Last Thursday evening the junior varsity team traveled to Eden where they defeated the Bulldogs 28-0. Scoring were J. J. Beloit, Brent Beal and Dustin Maedgin.

This Thursday the junior varsity boys will host the Cross Plains Buffalos immediately following the junior high game at Mountaineer Stadium.

The junior team team traveled to Evant last Thursday where they were defeated 21-8. Scoring was Brandon Beloit. This Thursday they will be playing the junior high Cross Plains Buffalos with kickoff set for 6 p.m. at Mountaineer Stadium.

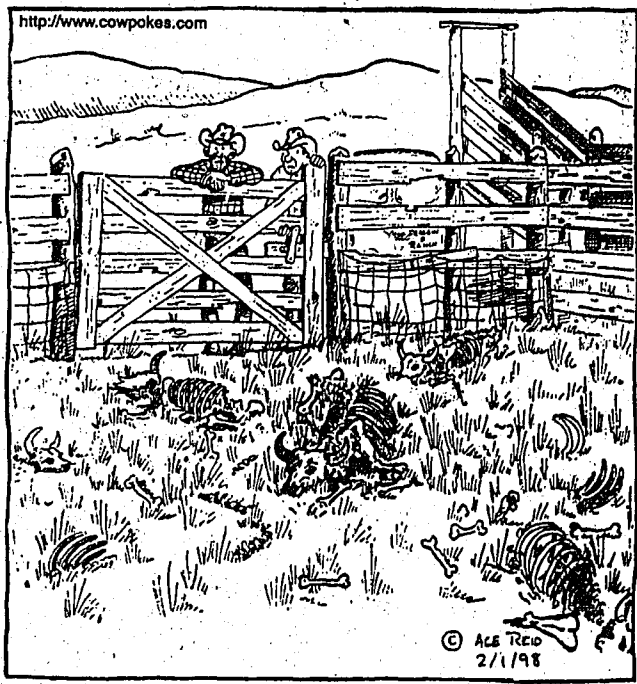

### Blind In Mind: New England Foliage

Taking things for granted is part of a human's nature, I'm told. I am of the human species, no doubt there!

My husband Thomas and I have just returned from two sightseeing weeks in picturesque New England. The visit was not meant to be for sightseeing and much of our time was spent visiting family and friends. But after being in Texas for two years with many natives commenting on the New England foliage, (I don't know which was the stronger influence: my two year absence from New England or Texan appreciation of the New England Fall Foliage, if only by word-of-mouth) I experienced the Fall Foliage as for the first time, from their eyes, so to speak.

The first weekend of our stay there, we drove up to Waterville Maine to visit my mother. The scenery was familiar yet novel. Each flaming tree became a memorial to my childhood, each burning bush, to my New England existence. I wanted to savor each scene into my mind for ever.

We drove up Interstate ninety-five in my son-in-law Harry's fire engine red Dodge pick-up truck from where we could better view our surroundings. There was much we could have talked about since we'd each visited different sets of friends for a few days but I was much too taken with the panorama before me: the fiery reds, the flaming oranges, the vivid buttery yellows, the somnolent browns with

every hue of green imaginable interspersed creating a canvass of brilliance only God could create.

For the first time in my life I was in awe of such rich intensity. I gaped, I started, I was mesmerized not only at the Technicolor view but at the realization that for some fifty years I'd experienced the changing leaves in autumn, I'd seen it all so many times and had been so blasé, so matter of fact about it all, I'd not internalized it.

I wanted to jump out of the moving pickup, run to each color and kiss it, smell it, listen to it, giggling, sobbing with all the emotion-filled heart within me. How could I have never really visualized such beauty!

Thank you, Dear Friends, for helping me to experience and appreciate this phenomenon. And it is a phenomenon of humungous proportions. For I recall rounding a bend on the highway, my breath intake was audible, again, my eyes becoming like saucers, again, to see yet another scene of even greater luster than the one before. Photographs are useless. Word pictures cry poverty. Witnessing is the only justice for the New England Fall Foliage.

This brings to mind our Niagara Falls trip. We drove there on our tenth wedding anniversary for a long weekend, Thomas and I. I had heard of Niagara Falls since I was little and wanted to see them but was not overly excited. It was one of the great sights in these United States, but no big deal, I thought. Thomas had seen them in another lifetime and thought I would enjoy them.

We drove onto the American side of the Falls, found a room in one of the hotels overlooking the Falls, then we took the elevator up to our floor, the twelfth, opened our door and traipsed in with our luggage. Thomas immediately went to the large window and withdrew the drapery. I naturally followed him and arrived facing the glass just as the drape swept across my face.

What I saw left me speechless. I could not catch my breath for the awesome sight of tons and tons of clear blue water cascading over a fall that must be hundreds of feet down to its base. But this sight wasn't enough for me! I wanted to get closer, so Thomas and I jumped back into the car and he drove across to the Canadian side so we could experience the famous Horseshoe Falls which are even more spectacular, if that's possible.

Once there, Thomas dropped me off to the fenced-in area for sight-seers while he went in search of a parking space. I elbowed my way to the iron rail with my camera and stood there transfixed. The bronze plaque (which I read later when the roar of the Falls were dizzying to the point of forcing me to inch away reluctantly) stated that the Falls were one hundred eighty-six feet high, twenty-one hundred feet wide, and dropped 500,000 tons of water every minute!! 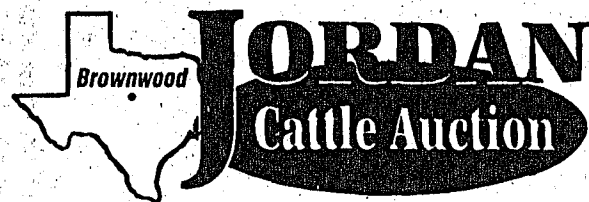

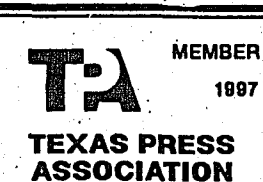
