The Santa Anna Mountaineers ended their 1997 football season last Friday evening at Mountaineer Stadium with a 27-20 loss to the Lometa Hornets.

Chris Guerrero ran the opening kickoff return back for a 92 yard TD. Josh Roberson passed to Clay Crossley for a 47-yard scoring pass. This brought the Mountaineers ahead 14-0. Roberson scored in

the fourth quarter on a 41-yard run.

Individual stats include Josh Roberson 66 yards on 10 carries and 2 TDs; Chris Boyet for 21 yards on six carries; Jason Jones for 35 yards on four carries; and Hector Patino 18 yards on three carries. Chris Guerrero had 53 yards on two passes and Clay Crossley had 1 pass for 47 yards. The Mountaineers had four fumbles

during the game.

Offensive player of the game was Shane Watson with Defensive player of the game going to Aaron Guthrie.

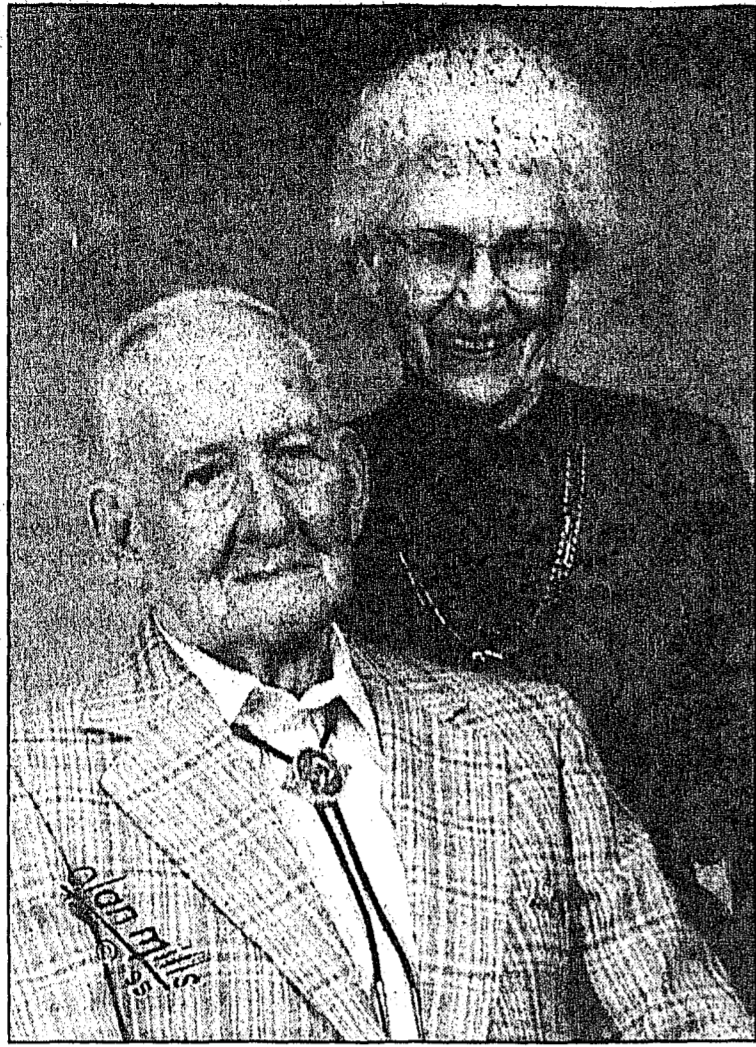

ZeWilla graduated from Santa Anna High School and treasures the memory of being called to the principal's office to receive her class ring which her brother Odell had

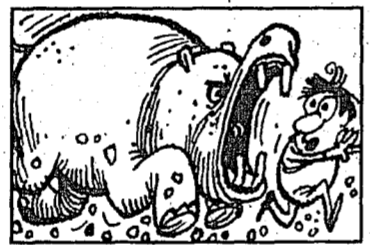

NOTICE OF PETITION REQUESTING DESIGNATION AS AN ELIGIBLE TELECOMMUNICATIONS CARRIER UNDER 47 U.S.C. 214(E)

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. ("Cooperative") has filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas requesting designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier ("ETC") by December 31, 1997. The Cooperative seeks ETC status for all the exchanges included in its certified service area.

The Cooperative is required to obtain ETC status in order to continue to receive federal Universal Service Funds beginning January 1, 1998. These funds are used by the Cooperative to provide the following services in high cost areas:

- Single party service
- The ability to place and receive calls on the public switched network
- Access to 911 and Enhanced 911 emergency services
- Access to operator services
- Access to interexchange toll services
- Access to directory assistance
- Lifeline and Link-up assistance for low-income consumers
- Toll restriction at no charge for Lifeline customers

The Cooperative's petition is currently being considered in Project No. 18100. Persons who wish to comment or intervene in this application should notify the Public Utility Commission of Texas by November 20, 1997. Requests for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326 or you may call the Public Utility Commission's Office of Customer Protection at (512) 936-7120 or (888) 782-8477.
