City Council Hires Judge And Offers Police Officer Position

In a lengthy regular monthly meeting Tuesday led by Mayor Karen Morris, the Santa Anna City Council hired William (Bill) Worley as Municipal Judge and offered a position on the police force to Toby Virden, presently a resident of Ballinger.

Worley, one of four applicants for Municipal Judge, had been offered the job following a previous meeting but wished to discuss the position with the council at Tuesday's meeting before he fully accepted the offer. Barbara Kingsbery, who had served in the position for the past five years, had earlier tendered her resignation as Municipal Judge as of December 1 or until she could be replaced.

Worley is a local former/rancher who served nine years in the U.S. Marines and 21 years with the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

All told there were eight applications for the position of an additional policeman to work along with Carlos Torres, but the field had been previously narrowed to four were interviewed at Tuesday night's meeting.

In a closed executive session following other business the council discussed the applicants and upon returning to open session agreed to offer the job to Virden, who is a veteran of the Ballinger and Winters police departments having spent about five years in law enforcement work. The council set a pay rate using a COPS grant as a base and expected Virden's acceptance or rejection of the offer after contacting him on Wednesday.

In other business the council

approved a contract with the Coleman County Appraisal District.

The group set Friday, December 12 as date for the City's Christmas holiday open house.

The council agreed to submit its Personnel Policies to the City's attorney, Sam Allen, for review before final approval.

Doug Watson, Director of Public Works reported there had been

eleven water leaks repaired in the past month, all of which were quite costly to repair. He stated the crew would be getting back to vegetation of the closed landfill site in anticipation of its final state inspection next year.

Continuing its overhaul of the police department the council rescinded Ordinance #268, thereby doing away with the position of Chief of Police. When Carlos Torres returns to work after his leave of absence for medical treatment he will be one of two police officers in the Santa Anna Police Department. For the time being the two police officers will share a vehicle with mostly alternate work schedules until such time an additional vehicle can be acquired.

The council appointed Councilmen David Powell and Jim Spillman as a two member Police Commission. The Commission will be a policy recommending body working with the Police Department and the City with the Council being the final governing body regarding any concerns to be addressed.

Mata Home Heavily Damaged By Fire Last Wednesday

A fire on Wednesday evening of last week heavily damaged the home of the Armando Mata family on Ave B in Santa Anna.

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department received a call about 6:30 p.m. when Mrs. Mata discovered the fire. She had been in the front of the house but went to the back when she smelled smoke and there discovered the fire. The family escaped the house without injury.

The fire did major damage to the kitchen, a back bedroom the attic and roof areas. The heavy atmosphere of that evening hampered fire fighters as the smoke clung close to the ground rather than rising. But they had it "locked down" by 9:30 p.m. There was extensive smoke and water damage to most of the wooden frame house and its contents.

A fire marshal called in from a neighboring town said the fire in all probability started in the bedroom from an electrical short.

According to one source, it was expected that the fire damaged house would be declared a total loss since repair would be extremely extensive.

renting a home here in Santa Anna.

Fireman Freddie Dodson said recently that the Fire Department is awaiting the arrival of another truck from Texas Forest Service which will be added to their fleet as soon as it is rigged up.

Time, Man Turn Sealy Hospital To Rubble And Dust

Editors Note: The following article appeared in the San Angelo Standard Times Monday, November 17 edition. It was written by Ross McSwain in his weekly column, Out Yonder. He is the son of Jean McSwain a former Rockwood and Santa Anna resident.

SANTA ANNA—Another West Texas landmark will soon be gone, a victim of decay and the wrecking ball.

While on a recent business trip to Brownwood via Santa Anna and Bangs, I noted with a glance that the old Sealy Hospital here was in

the final throbs of death from the wrecking ball. Only a shell of the old three-story hospital remained.

Windows and doors had been stripped away, the roof was gone and only dull traces of the once glimmering white paint marked the structure where many of Santa Anna's residents were born.

Folks from around this section of Coleman County did not have to seek medical attention in other locations in days gone by. They had one of the finest facilities right here, its foundation literally at the foot of Santa Anna Mountain.

Some efforts were made in years past to save the old hospital structure and the related nursing school building nearby. However, the cost of renovating the structure, and the upkeep was just too much for local folks to handle.

The local historical development association was advised to tear it down.

The Sealy Hospital was first opened in 1919. The late Dr. T. Richard Sealy had started construction on the facility in 1917, but the world war interrupted work on the structure. When it first opened, it had only four beds. It was the first hospital in Coleman County.

During the following decade, the hospital had a consistent growth because of Dr. Sealy's commitment to his patients.

According to the book "A History of Coleman County and Its People", patients came from all over the Central Texas area, even choosing to wait in the hospital lobby for days to get in.

By 1935, the hospital had grown into three units totaling 35 beds, and Dr. Sealy would present his 10,000th patient, a woman from Goldthwaite, with a silver loving cup.

Over 11,700 patients had been served at the hospital by the following Nov. 1, 1936.

When the medical service opened in 1917, Sealy was assisted by Dr. T. M. Hays. By 1936, the hospital staff consisted of Sealy, Dr. R. R. Lovelady, Dr. E.D. McDonald and Dr. C. O. Moody.

Sealy, recognizing the need of nurses to staff his hospital and others in West Texas, started the nursing school in 1926, which was fully accredited by the State Board of Nurses. The nursing instructor was Miss Olga Neil. Others working with Sealy were Sybil Vinson, R.N., supervisor of the operating room; Mrs. Clifford Dye, day supervisor; Jewel Smith, R.N., night supervisor; and Bernice Doherty, R.N., superintendent of nurses.

Dr. Sealy operated the hospital until his death in 1939. The facility and Sealy's medical staff continued to serve Santa Anna and surrounding area until 1951, when a Canadian, Dr. Charles Mason von-Henner, a Seventh-Day Adventist, bought it from local pharmacist, Jim Riley.

A fire seriously damaged the old hospital in 1982, speeding up its demise.

At one time, Santa Anna, named for the Santa Anna Mountain that was used as a lookout both by hostile Indians and Texas Rangers, was second only to Coleman as a major trading center.

Like other small communities depending on ranches and farms for its livelihood, Santa Anna started to decline in population during the 1950's drought. It still has some progressive businesspeople, and a couple of good eating places.

I'll be seeing you again soon, Out Yonder.

"You see the trap in the back of my truck?" Clarence said. "I keep that full of fresh perch at the lake, so I can go fishing anytime I want to."

The back of the pickup was also stocked with rods-n-reels and other assorted fishing gear.

Alongside Clarence's driveway is a well-used aluminum boat that the able angler loads into his truck, by himself, and the last I saw of Clarence the day he was in his pickup headed for the lake.

I never got around to asking Clarence if he hunts, but it wouldn't surprise me a bit to find that he has several elk and deer mounted in his den and is planning a hunt in Montana next fall.

I've never been much for gardening, except for a few tomato plants, but next spring I'm going to convert half my tomato patch to sweet potatoes.

And I may get a perch trap.

Guidelines For Winter Storage

Common Sense Tips for Success

 As warm weather fades, it's time to pack away those summer clothes to make room for winter finery. By following a few simple tips from The Soap and Detergent Association, those stored summer clothes will look good as new next spring.

Wash or dry clean everything before storage. Even if a garment appears clean, it may be the victim of "invisible" stains. If left in the garment, these stains may darken and set, causing permanent discoloration. In addition, dirt and food particles left in stored items may attract insects. Pay particular attention to bathing suits and other clothing items that may have come in contact with sun screen and suntan lotion. Pretreat with a prewash stain remover or liquid laundry detergent, then wash in cold water, hang to dry.

Before storing items, check for sagging hemlines, missing buttons, broken zippers, split seams, etc. Make all necessary repairs so everything will be wear-ready when warm weather arrives. Do not starch or iron items before storage. Starch is food source that will attract insects. Ironing may heat-set pale or invisible stains that have not been completely removed. If they appear after a long winter's storage, they may be impossible to remove.

Store garments in a cool, dark, dry, well-ventilated area. Too much heat can cause fabrics to yellow, while dampness can promote mildew. The best location is a cool closet or airtight chest. A cloth or canvas bag or a cardboard box is an acceptable alternative. If garments are hung in a closet, cover them with an old sheet to protect them from dust and light. Avoid plastic bags. They hold moisture, while can create mildew. Use padded hangers to prevent creases and distortion.

Store garments away from light sources. Continued exposure to a real or artificial light may cause bright colors to fade. If garments are stored flat, smooth out the wrinkles before folding. To decrease wrinkles in summer knits, use white tissue paper between the folds and around the garment. If there is no suitable storage space in your home, consult a dry cleaner who offers box storage.

Safety Tips For Cold Weather For Lone Star Gas

DALLAS—Are you ready for winter? If not, there are a number of suggestions Lone Star Gas Co. has to help you be prepared when the first cold weather front hits. Specifically, the company recommends you contact a certified heating and air conditioning contractor to check your heating equipment prior to the beginning of the heating season.

Additionally, Lone Star offers safety tips for the cold months ahead.

*Check all gas supply lines to heating units and other appliances. If they are the type that was made of corrugated metal, constructed over 20 years ago, they should be replaced.

*If an appliance's pilot light goes out, turn off the gas at the appliance for several minutes before you attempt to re-light it. You should find instructions attached to the appliance.

*When re-lighting a pilot light, strike the match and hold it to the opening first. Then slowly turn on the gas.

*The pilot light on gas appliances should always be blue. If the

flame is yellow or red, call a certified heating and air conditioning contractor immediately.

And if you use a space heater in your home, the following guidelines should be observed:

*Clean space heaters before using; remove cobwebs, dust and dirt that may have accumulated during the warmer months.

*Be sure the space heater, if it is vented, is operating properly.

*If the space heater doesn't have a vent or an oxygen cut-off switch, provide proper, outside ventilation such as a slightly open window.

*Check the air/gas mixture of your space heater's flame. Make sure it is blue, not red or yellow.

*Make sure the grille is intact and in place.

*Keep space heaters away from furniture, drapes and other combustible materials.

Here are some other tips for year-round safety:

*Never store or use gasoline or any flammable liquids (such as paint, paint thinner, cleaning fluids, etc.) in the same room with any gas appliance.

*Never store combustibles near

floor or wall furnace grilles.

*Never store rags, paper or other combustibles near any appliance with a pilot light or open flame.

*Have qualified service people install and maintain all gas appliances.

*Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for the installation and operation of each appliance. If installing a gas water heater in the garage, place the water heater at least 18 inches off the floor.

*Before you dig in your yard, take precautions against disrupting underground gas lines by calling your local plumber.

*Contact your local plumber to make periodic inspections of gas lines in your home and gas lines on your property.

If you ever smell the odor of gas in your home, follow these three steps:
