Second House Fire In Two Weeks Here Sun.

Santa Anna had its second house fire in two weeks late Sunday afternoon. This fire all but completely destroyed the home of Annie Mearl Morris at the corner of Wallis Ave. and Parker Street. Ms. Morris was not at home at the time of the fire. Family members reported she was in Oklahoma visiting a sister.

Two weeks ago the Armando Mata family lost its home to fire. The Santa Anna fire department received the call Sunday afternoon through 911 at 4:15 p.m. and had the fire completely under control by 6:00 p.m. Firemen had to break in a door to

gain access to the inside. A fire department spokesman said the heaviest fire damage was at the back portion of the home although the rest of the house received heavy smoke damage. According to the report it is believed the fire probably was the result of an electrical short in the kitchen. It was reported that although some belongings could be salvaged from the house, it was questionable if the home could be repaired to a livable condition.

Self Culture Club Learns About Emergency Medical Services

Self Culture Club met Wednesday, November 12 at 2 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church.

Presenting the program were Bobby Brinson, Boone Tyree and Randy Watson, Emergency Medical Technicians with Coleman County Medical Center. They began the program with a demonstration of CPR, then answered questions about 9-1-1 and the ambulance service. When people in Coleman County call 9-1-1 for a medical emergency they get a well-equipped ambulance and trained medical technicians who work as an extension of the emergency room at the Coleman hospital. In almost all cases the first step is the emergency room in Coleman. If doctors there feel it is necessary the patient is immediately transported to a larger hospital.

The 9-1-1 service was also discussed. There are several things people can do to improve 9-1-1 service. First when a call is made it is necessary to stay on the line until they tell you to hang up. Our system is not computerized so it is also necessary to give your address and directions to the house. They sometimes have problems finding the right house because there are no street signs or house numbers.

Everyone should be sure their house is clearly marked with the correct house numbers. We should also work to get the City to replace missing street signs. We can talk to county commissioners about putting up signs on all county roads. We can work with the county government to upgrade our 9-1-1 service so a computer could give the phone number and location of any call that comes in.

After the program, refreshments were served by hostesses Novelle Boylston and Billie Gatlin.

During the business meeting Amanda Ellerbe and Cynthia Philpot were accepted as members. It was decided not to have a float in the Christmas parade because so many club members are unable to help. The Christmas service project will be continued.

The next meeting will be a field trip to the Rehab Center in Abilene on December 10. The group will meet at the Presbyterian Church at 9:30 a.m. There will be a guided tour of the Center at 11 a.m. The group will have lunch at a cafeteria. Activities for the afternoon will be decided during lunch.

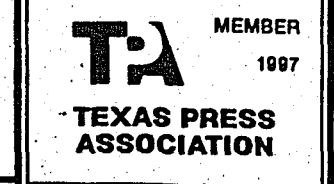

WTU Offers Holiday Lighting Tips

Holiday lighting with its twinkle and color, adds much to festivities. To keep your holidays merry and bright, decorate with safety in mind.

"Stringing lights is a fun activity for families," says Paul Valdez, safety consultant for West Texas Utilities Company. "Whether it's along the roof or on a tree, special lighting displays help welcome in the season. But people need to string lights carefully and avoid electrical hazards."

WTU offers the following tips for safe lighting:

Outdoors:
 *Use only lights approved for outdoor use with a "UL-approved" label. They are safety tested by Underwriters Laboratories.

*Check strings and extension cords for damage. Light strings and extension cords can crack and fray. Check all strings, sockets and cords for damage before you plug in your lights. Discard any frayed or damaged items you find. Be sure extension cords are capable of carrying the electrical load you are connecting. Each extension cord carries a rating which indicates its maximum load.

*Cover connections with plastic wrap and seal with electrical tape and use rubber gaskets in sockets to keep water out. For added protection, hang lights downward from the house or tree.

*Use insulated staples to attach wires to wood surfaces. Do not staple, tack or nail through wiring insulation or the conductor. Brass cup hooks are most convenient to use around the eaves of your house.

*When using a ladder to string lights, always make sure it is clear of any overhead electrical lines. These lines can cause serious injury if you or your equipment should come in contact with them.

*When working with outdoor lights, make sure your power is off. It is best to control outdoor lighting with a separate circuit breaker.

Indoor:

*Use only lights approved by Underwriters Laboratories. They will have a UL tag attached.

*Check all light strings for cracked insulation, frayed cords, wires or faulty plugs. Replace any damaged strings with "UL-approved" lights.

*Check and replace damaged extension cords.

*When stringing lights, make sure the power is off.
 *Don't overload wall sockets. Use a separate circuit if possible or a wall socket that is on a switch by itself.

*Always unplug lights when the tree or house is unattended.

*It is best that extension cords not be used, but, if necessary, place extension cords so they won't cause people to trip. Do not run them under rugs or carpets. Be sure to use only the length of extension cords needed and one capable of carrying the load connected to it.

*Water the tree frequently to prevent bulbs from scorching pine needles.

*Don't place hot bulbs inside a container or too near cloth, paper or other flammable ornaments.

Acorns Are Critical To Your Deer Hunting Success

When does your deer feeder work and when does it not work for attracting deer? It does not work well when there are lots of acorns. Last season the acorns were plentiful. The corn broadcasted from automatic feeders often sat on the ground and went uneaten. The deer like acorns more than corn.

This season we have a medium acorn crop. Some oaks have a lot of acorns and some oaks don't have any. Hunters wanting a nice buck right now should position themselves next to an oak tree with acorns on the ground. Deer will eat the acorns when they are green.

As the season progresses the acorns will get eaten and the corn will work better then. It is too early to tell yet what the impact of the acorns will be on the rifle season. The automatic corn feeders will work better by the first of December than on the first of November. I say this because I feel that all acorns will be gone by December.

Other nuts like pecans can also affect where you find deer. It appears that we will be blessed with a lot of pecans. I really do not know whether deer prefer corn or pecans. You might want to put a blind close to some pecan trees and see how you do. Please let me know. Local rancher says that he believes that deer like corn better than pecans.

I did do an experiment one time with milo. I put milo out free choice in a bucket feeder. I also put corn out in a trough. The deer walked past the corn and ate the milo. Then I put the corn in the bucket feeder and milo in the trough. The deer passed up the corn in the bucket and ate milo in the trough. I definitely believe that deer like milo better. It is cheaper usually than corn. It will not however work well in an automatic feeder. The deer have trouble picking up the milo when it is broadcast out on the ground. It works well in a "free choice" feeder. This is where and understand your needs.

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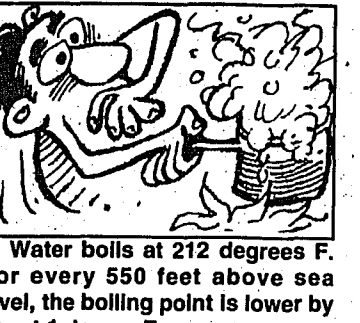
Fishing Lake Ivie

The water is fairly clear on the main lake, murky in upper end and tributaries. About 52 degrees.

Black bass and smallmouth to 3 lbs. or more are fair on plastic worms and crank baits, fished on secondary points. White bass are fair on live bait.

Crappie are fair to good on minnows fished in 20 to 30 feet of water in the creeks, coves and ridges at night. Catfish are fair on trotlines baited with cut bait over baited holes. Yellow catfish are fair on trotlines baited with live bait perch.

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 On Lake O.H. Ivie
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Water boils at 212 degrees F. For every 550 feet above sea level, the boiling point is lower by about 1 degree F.

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
