No Strep Here

A Strep infection remains rare and type bone infection is not rare as has not been seen in this area but concern has been evident here in Santa Anna.

A total of 117 Group A Strep cases have been reported in Texas since December 1, mostly in Austin, San Antonio and Houston, and 26 people have died, the Texas Department of Health reported last Friday.

Here in Santa Anna rumors have been rampant concerning the condition of kindergarten student Heather McMillan, causing parents to be frightened for the health of their children. In a telephone interview Tuesday morning with Dr. Hal Woodward, Brownwood Pediatrician who has been treating Heather, he said, "I would like to state emphatically that I am 100% sure Heather does not have the dreaded Strep infection, nor does she have Hepatitis or Meningitis as fears. some of the rumors have apparently indicated"

Helpful Tips From Santa Anna Elementary

Age 18 Mo. to Three Yrs. Critical Time for Building Language Skills

The 18 months between the time a child is a year and a half old and his third birthday are perhaps the most important for building his language skills. During this time, parents should be actively helping their children communicate more effectively. Here are some tips to follow:

Talk about yesterday and tomorrow. Toddlers live in the moment. They want things to happen now. Encourage your child to try to remember the recent past. "Didn't we have fun at Susie's house yesterday? What is her kitty's name?"

Or mention what will happen tomorrow. "We are going to the library after you eat breakfast in the morning. Do you want to get one book this time, or two?"

Supply words for your toddler. If she says, "eat, eat," say, "Yes, we're going to eat lunch. How about a cheese sandwich? Can you say,

'cheese, please?"

· Make words fun. Use all the rhymes you can with children this age. They will love it. "Your apple is red. Let's make the bed." "I'll tie vour shoe. First one, then two!"

 Reading is so important now. Read every day with your child. Encourage him to repeat the words he remembers. Ask her questions about the book. Show him you love reading by going to the library often, letting him see you read and buying books for a special treat.

Get ready for writing. No, your child does not have to be printing letters at this age. But did you know that doing puzzles and playing with play dough help with writing skills? Your child is building muscles in her fingers that will allow her to hold pencils and pens later on.

morning game run and an uneventful trip back to Nairobi, we checked into the Nairobi Serena and started repacking all of our luggage for the flight back home. Before finishing the packing we had a light lunch at the hotel and Abdul took us to Giraffe Manor and Karen Blixon's. At Giraffe Manor we saw some wart hogs and several other animals that we had not seen last year. At Karen Blixon's in addition to touring the house, we toured the remains of the coffee factory. Only the concrete and metal equipment remains. It is like we have said earlier that each time you visit a place you are able to see so many things that you missed on your previous

When we got back to the hotel, we ate a very light dinner and frantically finishing our packing. We did get everything packed but it was a struggle. We had a separate bag that carried our change of clothes that was necessary for our trip from London to Dallas. We left the hotel about 7:30 p.m. for the Nairobi airport. All too soon we cleared customs and said farewell to Abdul and the other personnel from Wildlife Safari. Our plane was scheduled to depart at 11:30 p.m. By the time we had boarded, we had already had a very long day.

Shortly after takeoff we served a fairly complete dinner. We started eating just before midnight. We had been up over 18 hours so far and the local time in Dallas was 4 drive. We saw the camp fire during p.m., Saturday. We did nap some after dinner and around 5 a.m. we awoke, changed our clothes (and on an airplane this is an acrobatic feat with hose, etc. David even shaved) and were served a light breakfast. It took a few days to get accustomed to the time change and the work day schedule. Next time (if there is one) we will try to get back Saturday evening so we can go to Church and rest up for the next

The highlights of this trip were the people we saw for the second time and the many new people we met for the first time. Even though we like to visit with the elephants we think we like the African people even more.

During the first week we had much more time than normal to visit with Abdul, our driver, guide and friend. We talked about one another's families and fond out his youngest child, a boy Aziz, was only eight days older than our youngest grandchild, Thomas. We think we have set up pen pals for two year olds hoping their parents will do a lot of the writing until they get old enough to correspond themselves. Our six year old grandson, Dugan, is going to write to Abdul's other child, a girl, Fatima, who is five and can already ready the newspaper. We look forward to eventually meeting Abdul's wife and two children. We have really appreciated our times with Abdul.


Adam, the head cook at our Samburu lodge is a person of high stature in his Samburu village. He is charged with the education of the children of seven villages. Adam's village is just a few miles from the Samburu Lodge but he only returnes to his village on his days off since he is responsible for all the meals from early breakfasts to late night snacks. He too lives similar to Jonathan in a primitive hut when he is not on duty. The Church of one of our Safari mates is going to assist Adam with school supplies and other help for his school. It is a delicate balance trying to help them while not interfering with their traditional culture. Even though primitive culture is not modern, it is not necessarily wrong or bad. Both the Samburu and Masai people seem to be very good stewards of the earth leaving the wild animals alone and sharing in the raising of their cattle.

Our visit with Cynthia Moss was an extremely enjoyable experience. To see her on the PBS special and

see how she studied the behavior of elephants was fascinating to watch on TV, but to sit there and listen to her tell of her past, current and future elephant study projects made the TV viewing almost cold and impressionable. Her love for the elephants really comes through both on tape and certainly in person. It is like she is studying members of her own family. The two hours spent will long be remembered.

From the PBS special with Cynthia Moss, we were introduced to an elephant by the name of Echo, a matriarch of a small family of elephants. On the special, Ely, her new born calf, appeared to be crippled at birth due in part to his extremely large size. The family's care and concern for Ely were a strong focal part of the show. Imagine our surprise when the evening before we met with Cynthia we saw Echopstar of the show, amid a herd of elephants leading her newest calf, Ebony. Ebony was slightly larger than Ely was in the film. We though we were also able to pick out Ely out of the herd where he was following his mother and new baby sister. Ely is now five and still very large for his age. It was so nice to "meet" real movie stars who were unaffected by their stage experience.


