Santa Anna Police Dept. Receives Training Funds From Comptroller

The Santa Anna Police Department has received \$652.10 in supplemental training funds from State Comptroller John Sharp. The local police department was one of 2,147 local law enforcement agencies received approximately \$6 million.

"More than 53,877 Texas peace officers now have additional funds for ongoing law enforcement training. The good news is the state's smaller law enforcement agencies--many of them hard-pressed for training funds--share in this allocation," Sharp said.

Law enforcement agencies across the state are required to meet standards set by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE).

"Many of these TCLEOSE-approved training programs cost between \$55 and \$75 per officer," Sharp said. "A class on crime-scene investigation or fingerprinting will cost \$125. A 560-hour basic peace officer certification class costs between \$775 and \$800."

In 1997, Sharp returned nearly \$6 million to over 51,800 peace officers in 2,156 agencies. The 1997 training fund allocation represented the first full year the program had been in effect.

The law enacted by the Texas Legislature in 1995 required that 20 percent of the total amount collected from a special \$2 court cost is to be allocated equally among the

Stenholm Announces Brown County Community Based Veterans Clinic

WASHINGTON, D. C.--Congressman Charlie Stenholm has announced that health care for veterans in Brown County and the surrounding counties will be expanded. The Department of Veterans Affairs recently submitted a plan to establish new community-based clinics including a primary care clinic in Brownwood. The House and Senate Appropriations Committees re-

cently approved the proposed clinic sites, and the Department of Veterans Affairs has announced additional details regarding the Brownwood clinic.

"We owe the men and women who defend our nation a great debt of gratitude, and these clinics which will make health care more accessible are one way we can express that appreciation to our veterans," note Stenholm.

The projected opening date of the Brownwood clinic is August 1998. The Veterans Administration has allocated \$126,500 for the start-up costs of the clinic. It is estimated that the clinic will serve 1,000 pa-

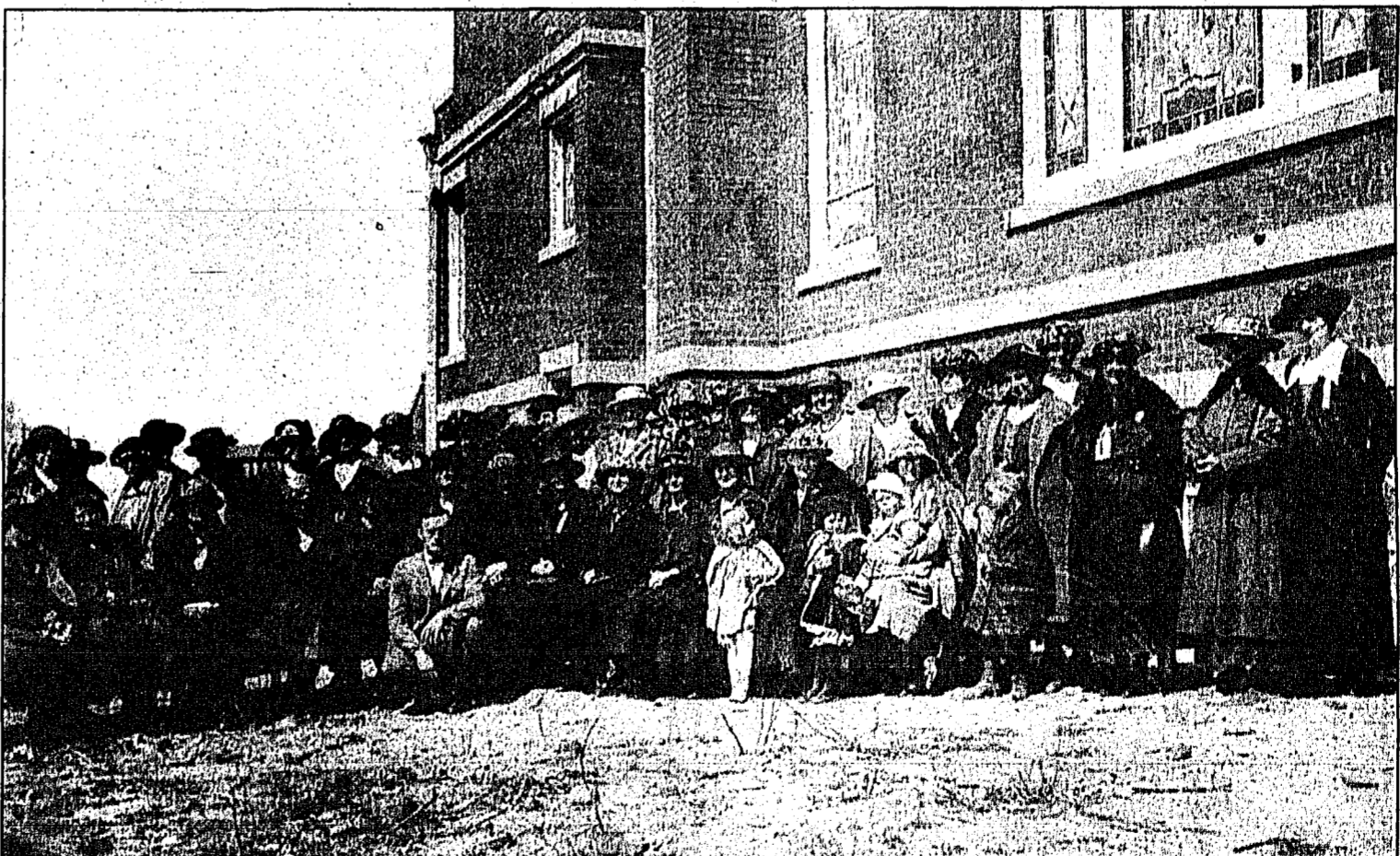
tients annually and the projected annual budget of \$388,221 will support an estimated workload of 4,000 clinic visits. Similar clinics will be established in Eastland and Decatur.

"We must continue to honor our service members who made supreme sacrifices for their Country," Stenholm remarked. "Regardless of weapons sophistication or technology involved, our National security has always turned and will always turn on the ability, dedication and determination of the individual human beings engaged in the effort. Veterans deserve our best in return for having given their best."

Access to health care remains a problem for many rural Texans, including veterans. The state ranks 49th nationally in the supply of nurses and 37th in physicians per 1,000 population. Currently, 12 percent of the state's primary care physicians practice in rural areas comprising 80 percent of the state.



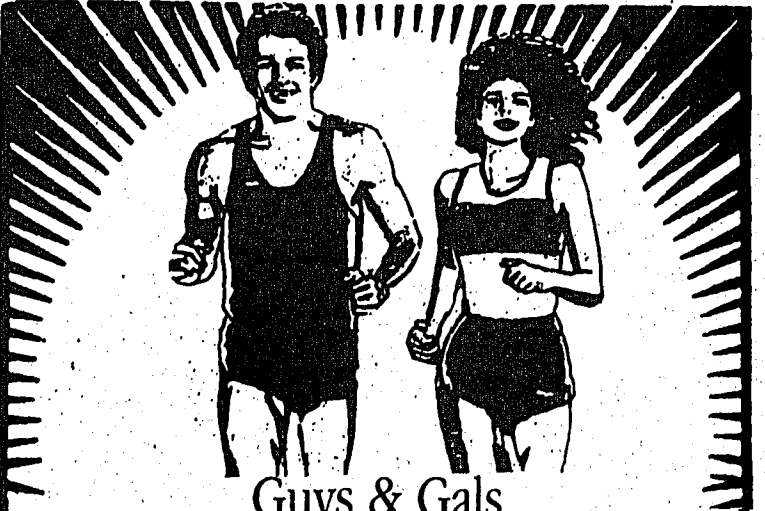

Yet Another Graveyard Plot Of A Buried Arm

Editors Note: The following article appeared in Jon McConal's Texas column of the Fort Worth Star Telegram on Monday, February 16. Joe Flores who is mentioned is the father of Carmilla Baugh of Santa Anna, Nancy Avants of San Angelo and Joe B. Flores.

GRANBURY--I am now armed with stories of unusual tombstones in cemeteries.

I had written two stories about arms that had been amputated and then buried. I figured that would be the end of those. Then I heard from Lem Robbins of Granbury.

"I was intrigued by the stories of the arms buried in the cemeteries. I would like to tell you of another," Robbins said.

So I visited with him. He's a red-faced, gray-haired, self-effacing person.

He said he remembered his late father telling the story of his Uncle Joe Flores when Robbins was a youngster.

His father was born and reared in the tiny community of Trickham in Coleman County. Flores was also raised there.

According to his father, part of Flores' right arm was amputated after an accident involving a shotgun.

The arm was buried in the Trickham cemetery. But Flores kept complaining that the arm was hurting.

The pain must have been devastating, because Robbins remembers that it was said that Flores and his girlfriend, Naomi Mae, postponed their marriage for a year.

"Finally, his (Flores') father went to the cemetery, dug it up, straightened the arm and then reburied it," Robbins said.

And the pain stopped.

After the reburial of the arm, Flores and Naomi Mae led a fruitful life. He became a mail carrier from Santa Anna to Trickham. He drove a Model-T Ford during good

weather and used a horse and buggy when roads turned muddy.

Actually, Robbins discovered these facts while doing genealogy work at the Fort Worth Public Library. He found this information in the book, *Historical Families of Coleman County*.

"The story had fascinated me as a kid, but as I grew older, I kind of forgot it and never dwelled on it. Then I began the research," he said.

He learned that the Flores family settled near Trickham in 1897. And while looking at the cemetery records of Trickham Cemetery, he found the record of Joe B. Flores' arm.

So one day while driving in that area, he decided to find the grave of Uncle Joe's arm.

"I found many markers of my ancestors from both my grandfather's and grandmother's line," Robbins said.

He kept looking.

"And, sure enough, right there between the marker for his (Flores') mother and his father was a marker engraved, 'Joe B. Flores' Arm.'"

Robbins had found in other research that his uncle had become quite successful after the accident. He was elected to the county office of public weigher. That made his in charge of weighing wagons and trailers of grain and weighing and sampling baled cotton for buyers and shippers.

Flores died in 1949. He was not buried beside the arm. Instead, he was buried in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

"Perhaps you can now see why I found the other 'arm' stories so interesting," Robbins said. "I hope this doesn't bore you."

Well, no. I like to be "armed" with stories.

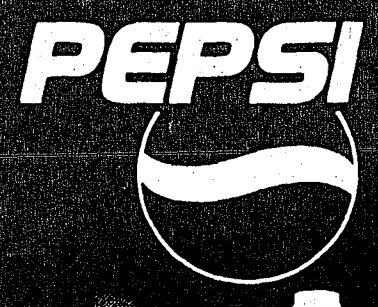

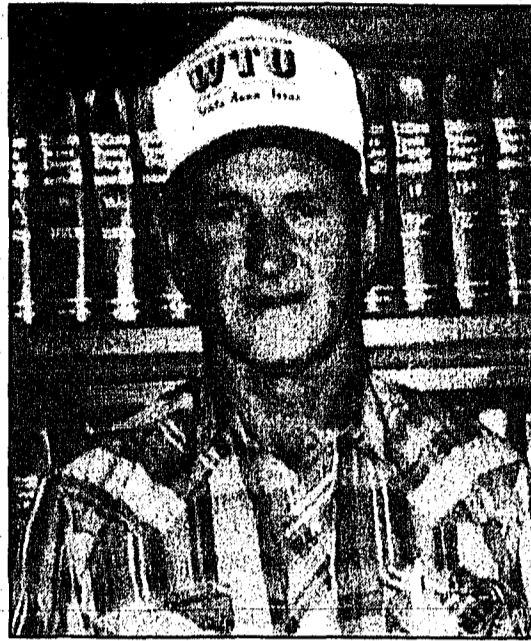
