County Commissioners Table ADC Funding Will Be Discussed Again Monday

Coleman County Commissioners met on Friday, January 30 in a special meeting.

The meeting began with Commissioners showing unanimous support for Taylor County's bid to botain a Juvenile. Justice grant.

Coleman County pays Taylor County \$6,000.00 per year to for Coleman County juveniles. The amount of the grant is \$23,000 from the State of Texas.

The Animal Damage Control funding item on the agenda was tabled until the February 9 meeting. The ADC members will meet prior to the next commissioners court meeting.

Two names were drawn by County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale for the Salary Grievance Committee. County Clerk JoAnn Hale will contact the persons whose names were drawn.

Commissioners voted to close FM 1026 (the Mozelle Road) at a location approximately 15 miles

south of Coleman for replacement of bridges and culverts. Traffic will be routed to the county roads during the construction. Work will begin in July 1998 and will take about two months to complete.

Commissioners agreed to not close a road in Precinct 2 due to the cost. The request came from the Department Texas Transportation.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing presented individual office audits for the offices of the County Clerk, Scramble District Clerk, Justice of the Peace, Tax Assessor-Collector, County Attorney and county Sheriff's Office. Each report indicated inand balance of cash on hand as of Sept. 30, 1997.

Commissioners were very complimentary of the reports and Ragsdale along with Sansing stated their appreciation to each department for their careful handling of the funds and excellent reports.

Commissioners reviewed and approved bills. for payment.

General Fund totaled \$1,010, Road and Bridge \$26.00 and total for the four precincts was \$5,139.00. No transfer of funds was requested.




Make Your Child Feel Special & Start a New Family Tradition

It's Time We Talk Openly... **About Social Security**

#1 in a series of 8 columns about Social Security

CHARLIE STENHOLM

There's a lot of talk in Congress these days about making changes to the Social Security retirement program. Why? Well,you don't have to go too far before you'll hear someone say that more people under 30 believe in flying saucers than in the survival of Social Security until their retirement. At the same time, today's seniors want to make certain their Social Security benefits keep up with inflation. Clearly, something is happening, but what?

This is the first of a series I will be writing over the next few months to provide some answers to this question. In these columns, I'll spend some time talking about why it was necessary for Social Security to be created and how the program has changed over the years. I will discuss some of the myths that have grown up around Social Security. I'll look at the issues that make a lot of people think we need to act soon to strengthen the program. I also will explore some of the reform ideas that currently are under consideration.

Most people know that Social Security was created during the depths of the Great Depression. Back then, no one ever could have imagined how the program would evolve. By keeping millions of seniors out of poverty, the system has proven itself to be one of the most successful Federal programs ever enacted. It also has grown into the largest of all Federal programs, currently comprising 23% of our annual budget and serving over 44 million retirees, survivors and disabled persons every month.

For all its successes, the future of the system is not bright. In their latest annual report, the Social Security Trustees estimate that the system will have cashed in all its IOUs and will be bankrupt by 2030. More urgently,

the report states that beginning in 2012 money used to pay benefits will start to exceed the money taken in to pay those benefits. That's just 15 years away. It still gives us time to act reasonably and responsibly to save the system - but we must act soon to give today's workers plenty of time to make allowances for changes in their retirement planning.

In the next column, I'll talk about why Social Security was created and how it works. But let me say something up front: The system is complex and, quite honestly, the details can get pretty tedious. However, because we have an obligation to protect current retirees and to preserve Social Security for future generations, we owe it to ourselves and to our children and grandchildren to learn about the program. Only then can we decide what should be done to make sure it is still around well into the next century.
