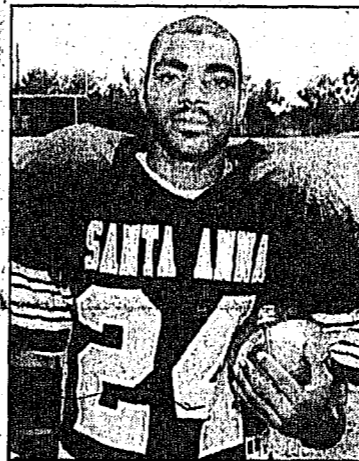
Twelve television stations, including KRBC in Abilene, will televise this 28th annual show which originates live from the Abilene Civic Center beginning at

## County Commissioners Accept Bids And Hear MHRM Report

Coleman County Commissioners met on December 31 for the end of the month and end of the year meeting.

Following the opening of bids, Darrell Walker was awarded the bid for the scrap iron and the 1980 Chevrolet pickup and Eagle Equipment received the bid for the Ford Dump Truck; both of which

were from Precinct 4. CST Trucks of Coleman was awarded the bid for the 1985 Chevrolet pickup for Precinct 2.

The Burn Bad was discussed and the commissioners agreed that at this time it is not necessary to have the ban reinstated.

The Texas Department of Transportation proposed road closing was tabled until the January meeting which additional information will be provided.

Bills were paid from the following accounts: The General Fund totaled \$2,117; Road and Bridge totaled \$3,520; and the four precincts totaled \$7,798.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing informed commissioners that the Worker's Compensation dropped from \$40,000 to \$20,000.

County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale reported on the MHRM program.

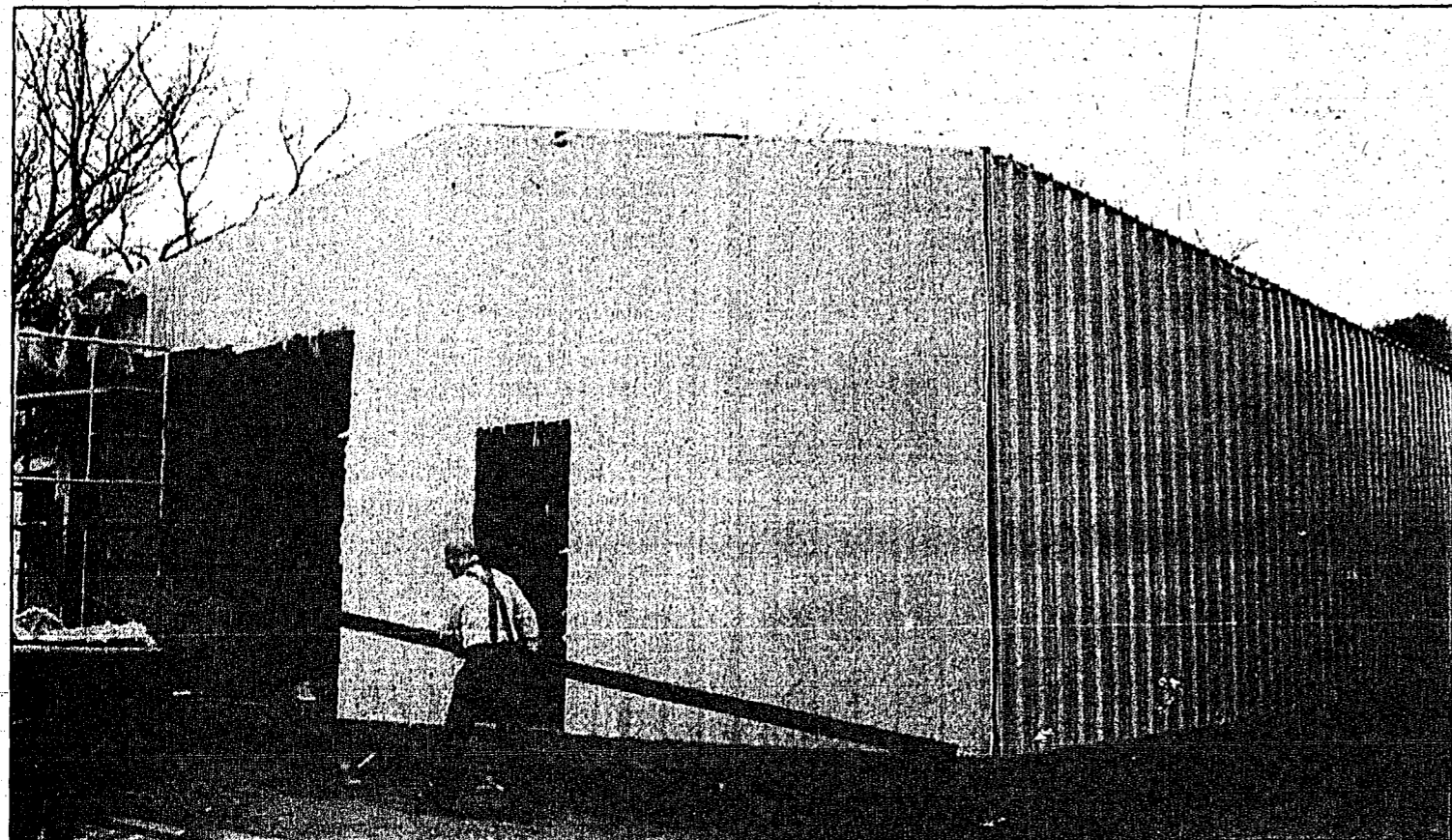

One of the committees she served while in Self Culture was for the library. Here's one instance:

At the end of World War II, Camp Bowie sold their buildings. Santa Anna bought and sold all but one of theirs. Most were bought by returning veterans to build homes. Representatives of the Garden Club, Daughters of the Confederacy and Self Culture Club went to the mayor and asked for the remaining building for a club house-library.

They were turned down. The women's answer—there is an election soon.

Officials, changed in that election, and the women received their library. They worked themselves, got volunteers and paid for the remodeling. Until a few years ago we were located in that barracks.

Mrs. Blue helped with summer reading—refreshments and donations. She could always answer questions of who and what happened in the past.

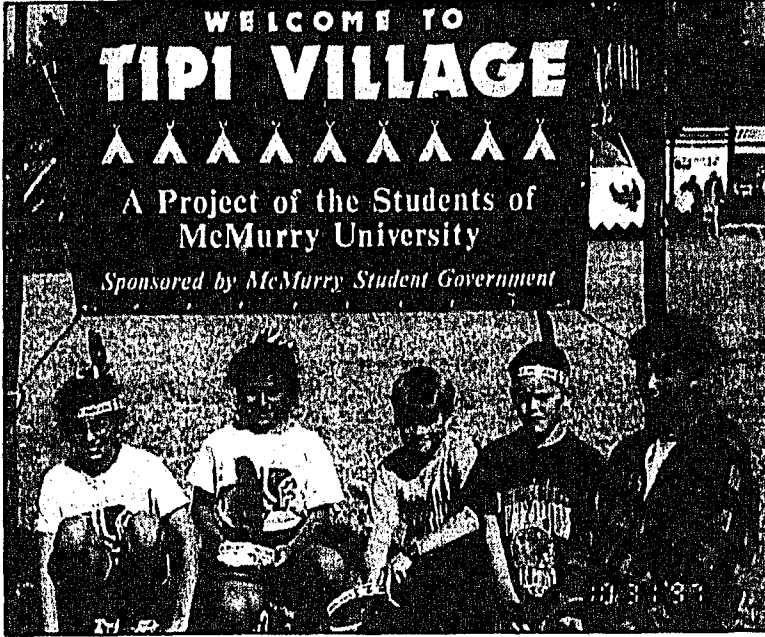

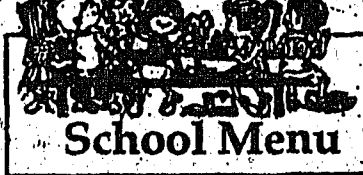

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# Karthausers Make Return Visit To Africa

The next day was our last full day in Amboseli and our game runs were as interesting as our previous days. We do think we were all a little more aware of the elephants. Amboseli will be a "must visit" place on our next visit. We hope that our trees planted by us with Shadrach's help and the elephant relocation project continue to be successful and the Amboseli game preserve continues to recover.

Instead of a game run the next morning, we ate an early breakfast, packed our luggage in the range rover and headed west. We had sort of a game run most of the way to the road at the Tanzania border. We had a few rain showers on the way but not enough to make the dirt roads difficult. As soon as we turned on to the paved road, we stopped at the same gift shop we had visited on our way to Amboseli. Jeannie's custom made walking stick was ready and it took a lot of bartering to get the price reasonable. We bought very few things here on either visit as the prices were quite high. Shortly after leaving the gift shop, we saw two dead zebra lying in the middle of the bridge. Evidently the rain or the paved road had caused the driver to not be able to stop in time.

Even though we had another week to spend in Kenya, we all got a sinking feeling as we approached Nairobi from the south. There are not very many wild animals in the cities and the traffic is terrible, so we don't really enjoy being in Nairobi. Abdul drove straight to the Nairobi Serena Hotel where we checked into our rooms for the night. Abdul left on some errands saying he would be back in plenty of time for our visit with Daphne Sheldrick. Since it was a little past lunch time the four of us ate a light lunch and went back to our rooms to rest for a while. We rearranged our luggage and checked some with the bellman again to keep for us until we returned next week.

It was late afternoon when Abdul arrived back at the hotel to take us on our next adventure. In less than a half an hour we arrived at Nairobi National Game Reserve. It was at this facility that David Sheldrick was game keeper for many years. Both he and his wife, Daphne, tried to raise the orphans of wild animals

that David found in the park. After his retirement, David and Daphne were permitted to live on the grounds and continue their work on the orphanage. After David's death, Daphne discovered the technique for taking care of baby elephants. Her work has been highlighted on PBS. This visit was as exciting as our visit with Cynthia Moss. As soon as we arrived we were ushered to the pens where they kept Scud, a female rhino who was almost fully grown. Daphne and crew have raised Scus from infancy. We were able to feed Scud some fresh apples that we had purchased for this occasion.

Our next stop were the baby elephants, Zoe (named for Daphne Sheldrick's own baby granddaughter

and Sengali, a seven month old male). Zoe was eight months old. Zoe and Sengali were not in any form of cages. They sort of had free run of the area but always under the watchful eye of several nursemaid keepers. It was late afternoon and they were trying to get the two baby orphans to bed. Since it gets very cool in the evening both babies had blankets, tied on them to help keep them warm. Like any small child, the two of them decided to act up for the company that had just arrived. They both loved to be hugged and petted. They did take time to smell each of us carefully with their trunk. We were told to blow into their trunk so they would recognize us when we met again. We must have played with the elephants for almost an hour and you could tell their handlers were getting anxious for them to calm down and get into their comfortable stalls for the evening.

Part of the secret that Daphne has discovered is that the baby elephants must not be left alone, even for a few minutes for the first several years. Both of these elephants were orphaned when poachers killed their mothers for their ivory tusks. The noise and the fear stay with these babies for life, but they are able to eventually live with the past trauma. The David Sheldrick foundation is another non-profit trust that is in need of funds to continue their work. All four of us asked many questions concerning how to help expand this effort.

It was well after sunset when we left the baby elephants for the night. Abdul drove us to the restaurant where we would eat dinner for the night. This was an upscale open-air restaurant in a very nice shopping area near Karen Blixen's place. There was quite a bit of wild game on the menu, so we chose different items to share. David had eland and Margaret had gazelle. The restaurant was somewhat reminiscent of our visit to the

Carnivore. This place had a menu instead of the chef's walking around with skewers of meat. The meal was quite elegant and we all enjoyed it very much. We got back to the Nairobi Serena about 9 p.m. Jeannie stayed at the reception area and pre-registered the twelve new people we were expecting. The other three of us went to our rooms to prepare for leaving early the next morning.

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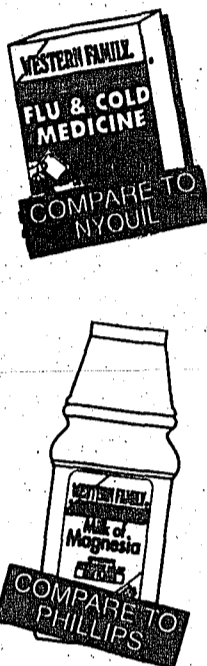
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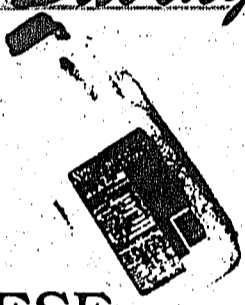

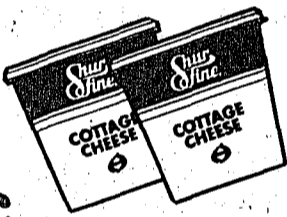
