Ministerial Alliance Needs Our Assistance

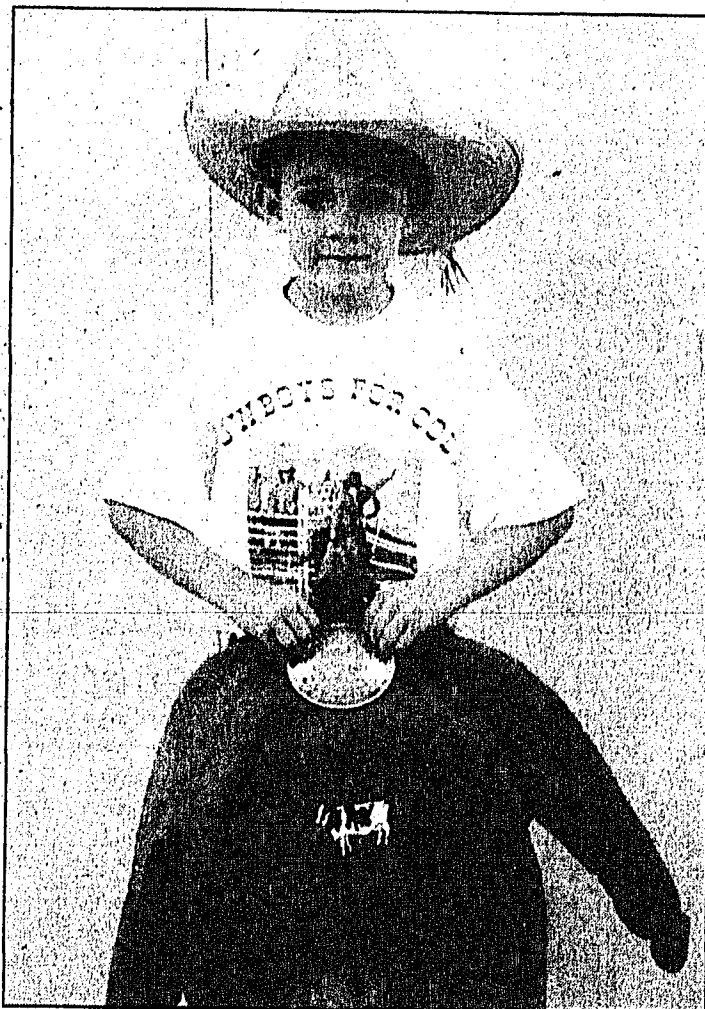

University of North Texas educators have set up in 13 learning centers a new curriculum for children. They have found that babies learn from birth. Train them to develop the brain until six years or loose it!

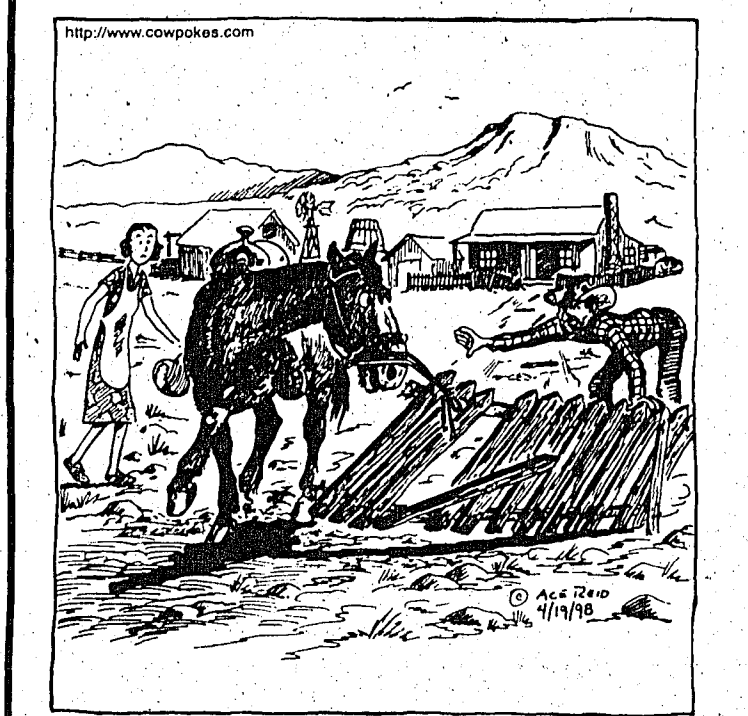
Stimulation develops skills. Too much stress has negative effect. Music--best so far is Mozart or Beethoven and visual patterns develop perspective like using a camera.

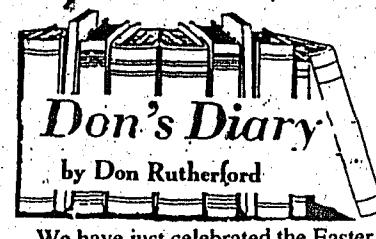

We have just celebrated the Easter season with all its splendor and grace. We heard a lot about the life, death, burial and resurrection of Jesus and how this effects our lives. I would like for us to revisit the night before the execution. Go with me to just after the betrayal by Judas to sometime in the late night or early morning of that fateful Friday.

The main character in this sinister alley of deceit and denial is a man who has been there and done that. He has even had his name changed from "reed" to "rock" by Jesus. But this night he is just about to be given over to a thunder-storm of failure.

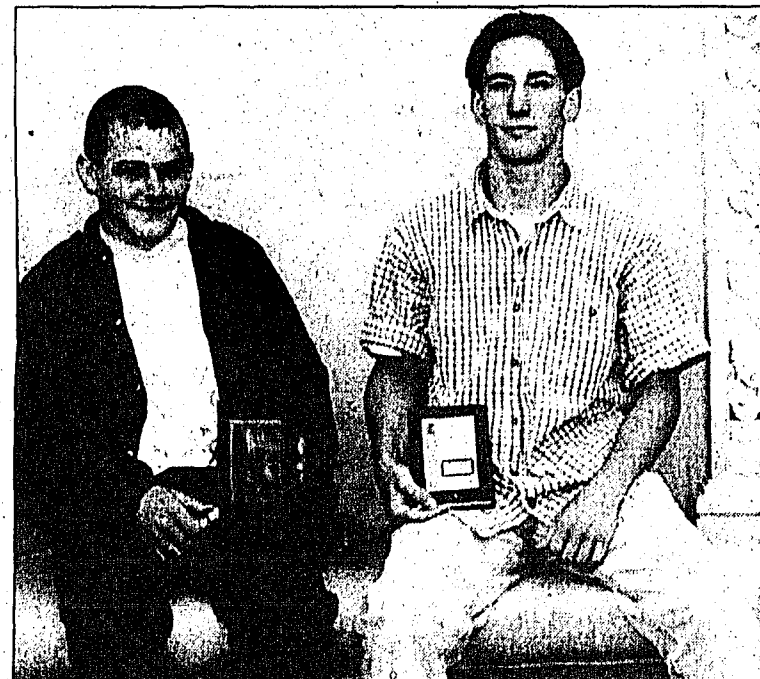

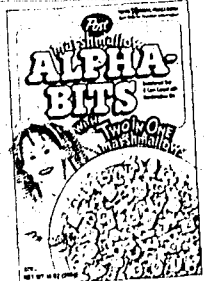

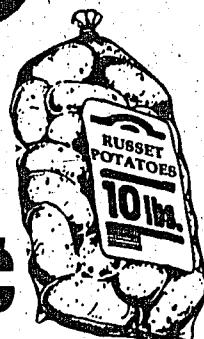
