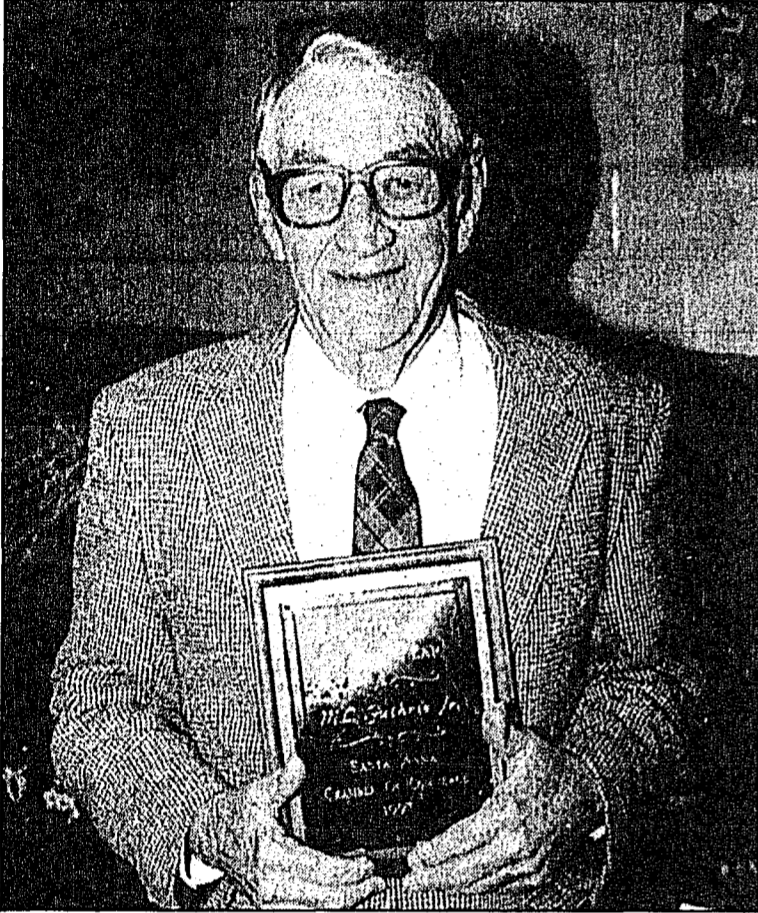

M. L. Guthrie, Jr. Named "Citizen Of The Year" During Chamber Banquet Saturday



M. L. Guthrie, Jr.—Santa Anna's Citizen of the Year

Apparently no one else was surprised when M.L. Guthrie, Jr. was named Citizen of the year at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet here Saturday night, but M.L. Guthrie was surprised. As one person was heard to say, "That's the first time I've seen M.L. speechless".

The reason he is not often speechless is because he loves to tell anyone interested about the history of Santa Anna and also extoll the virtues of Santa Anna today. Guthrie is the person people are most often referred to when seeking information about our little town.

M.L. loves Santa Anna and, as he said Saturday night after accepting his Citizen of the Year award, "If I live to be 100 years old, I'll still be telling people about Santa Anna." Guthrie was introduced by chamber director Bill Wagner who also presented him with a plaque commemorating the occasion.

With the exception of five years away in the Army Air Corps during WW II, Guthrie has lived in Santa Anna all his life. He spent 33 years as a postal employee and has been engaged in farming. He and his life partner, wife Billie, along with son, Lane, own and operate the Treasure

Hut (antiques and collectibles). Lane is also employed with Coleman County Telephone and the Guthrie's other son, Montie III is counselor in the Santa Anna Schools. Outside the shop M.L.'s many volunteer duties keep him busy.

He has served on the Santa Anna City Council, Chamber of Commerce, school board, is a member of the Lions Club, and is an elder in First Presbyterian Church.

Cowboy poet, humorist and storyteller, Zachariah Teague, known as Gary Karshner in real life, was speaker for the banquet. Karshner is community relations representative for United Blood Services of San Angelo. Citizens of Santa Anna had earlier rolled up their sleeves to give 24 pints of blood as a tradeoff in order to get Karshner as entertainer. Musical entertainment was provided by hometown talent Jerry and Dana Chambliss singing campfire music in a western setting. Decorations for the affair were done in the western theme using bales of hay, lariats, chaps, spurs and other cowboy paraphernalia. Tables were decorated with greenery, miniature bales of hay, cowboy hats and accented with sunflowers to add a very cheery air.

Chamber of Commerce president Jackie Smith welcomed those attending the banquet and Mayor Karen Morris was mistress of ceremonies. The program included Rob Cheaney who voiced the invocation, Chamber directors Bill Wagner who presented the Citizen of the Year award, Celeste Simmons who presented door prizes and Liz Morris who gave closing remarks.

In keeping with the Western theme, chamber director Sid Richards cooked beef brisket for the meal, and O.D. and Polly Warnock prepared red beans, Dutch oven potatoes and sourdough biscuits.

Our latest calls have come from Pleaman (Junior) Cruger of Rapid City, South Dakota who confirmed the lady second from left was indeed his mother, Mary Cruger, and Leta Parker of Denison who agreed. She had talked with Jesse Lee Sparkman of Missoula, Montana to confirm her ideas about who the ladies were. The two agreed that the ladies were all teachers in the Junior Department of First Baptist Church Sunday School at the time the picture was taken. According to their information, starting at the far left is Mrs. John Pearce, Mary Cruger, unidentified, Cody Wallace Matthews, Bulah Sparkman (Jesse Lee's mother) Mrs. Sydney F. Martin and Mrs. V.L. Grady. Mrs. Martin's husband was pastor of the church at that time and was seen in another photo we ran picturing what appeared to be most of the ladies of First Baptist Church. Our callers think photo is dated 1921 or '22 although we are still not sure what the occasion was even though the consensus is it probably was the dedication of the church building.

More On Liquor Petition

In last weeks NEWS we reported that a liquor petition was being circulated in Santa Anna. We have since learned the information we had received was erroneous, it was in fact an application for a liquor petition.

In order to obtain a petition at least ten (10) signatures of registered voters are necessary on the application. Since the sale of beer would be inside the city limits only, the voters registered must reside in the city.

The election code requires that 35% of the registered voters must

sign a petition in order for an election to be called. This would mean 240 voters registered as living in the city of Santa Anna would have to sign the petition if and when one is circulated.

Heaven's Jubilee To Be In Concert At FBC Sunday At Ranger Park Inn Nursing Home Sat.

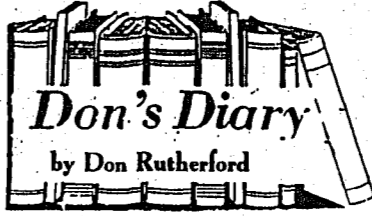

WINDS

On April 2, 1958, in Wichita Falls, the fastest winds ever recorded hit in a Texas tornado terror with winds of 280 mph.

On August 17-18, 1969 Hurricane Camille hit Pass Christian, MS with winds of 200-210 mph.

On October 29, 1991 Hurricane Grace was churning up the East coast towards Nova Scotia, at the same time a gale was blowing off Sable Island, in the midst of these two storms was a Canadian high pressure system. The gale of Sable Island and the Canadian high caught Hurricane Grace like huge gears and caused a meteorological phenomenon that happens in a major storm only every 100 years or so.

Sebastian Junger is his best seller *The Perfect Storm* describes this in these words: "It was the storm of the century boasting of waves over 100 feet high, a tempest created by so rare a combination of factors that meteorologist deemed it 'the perfect storm'. When it struck in October of 1991 there was virtually no warning. "She's coming on strong boys, and she is coming now", radioed Capt. Billy Tyne on the Andrea Grail off the coast of Nova Scotia."

We are all affected by winds; oh they may not be the "perfect storm", but they are winds that are very real.

The first is the wind of change. This wind sometimes comes into our lives like a sudden storm, black clouds, cold air, sheer terror. These may come in the form of loss, such as the loss of a loved one, a loss of a job or even loss of direction or purpose in our life.

Change will touch all of us, it may be in tears, sometimes even in a smile. Sometimes change gives us a chance to become stronger.

This wind is often uncertain and many times causes hurt.

But there is another wind that comes on to us slowly. It is the wind of compromise. This is a slow shift in direction. Compromise is defined as making concession in order to gain something. We start compromising with no intention of being conquered by it, but slowly and surely our beliefs and values get shoved around by this hindering wind.

George Berna may have said it best, "In making ethical decisions 57% of Americans choose what would work at the time, or situational ethics." Compromise is costly, it corrupts and it will bring collapse.

And thirdly there is a gentle healing wind of compassion. This is a gentle breeze, a gentle touch, a gentle handling of people. The word compassion comes from the Latin word COMPAT which means to sympathize with. Another word that could describe this gentle wind is comfort or to soothe in distress; to bring consolation or hope. You and I may know of someone who needs the gentle call, or even a note. If you know of someone, may you be a part of this wind of compassion to gently heal hurting hearts.

Self Culture Club Learns About Weight, Calories

Self Culture Club met Wednesday, March 11 at 2 p.m. in the home of Oma Dean Horner.

A program on body weight was presented, by Peggy Hensley, Family Nurse Practitioner from the Family Health Care Clinic in Santa Anna. She talked about the need to balance the scales between the calories we eat and the calories our bodies use. Each lady figured her ideal weight and the number of calories needed each day to maintain that weight. They also figured the calories needed each day to maintain their present weight. If a person takes in fewer calories than their body is using, they will lose weight. The ladies learned to figure their Body Mass Index. To figure BMI take your current weight in pounds and multiply by your height in inches. If the resulting number is 27 or greater, you are at risk for a number of health problems related to overweight. Exercise is important in balancing the scales. Exercise burns calories. In order to lose one pound the body must burn 3,500 calories or take in that many fewer calories. To lose weight both diet and exercise are necessary. In a weight loss program, a person should exercise 30 to 45 minutes a day five days a week. The exercises should be vigorous enough to raise a sweat. Exercising for 30 minutes, three times a week is recommended to maintain good health. Walking, bicycle riding, swimming and dancing are all good ways to exercise. The ladies discussed the need for a local square dancing or line dancing group, that would make exercise a fun social activity.

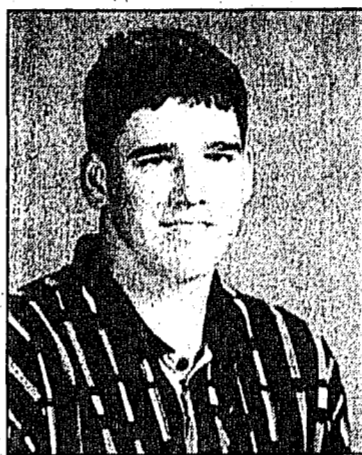

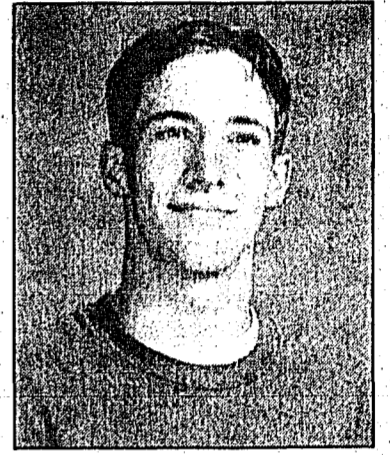

Helpful Tips From Santa Anna Elementary

What Do You Do When Your Child Starts Lying Often?

All children lie, and at some ages (especially four and five), they seem to lie rather often. But if children reach the age of seven or eight and are still telling a lot of lies, it's time for parents to take some action. If your child has told you a lie, try first to think about what might have caused the child to lie. Children do engage in wishful thinking. Start from the assumption that your child probably meant well. Don't corner your child, and try not to overreact. But on the other hand, let your child know you

know the truth. As calmly as you can, talk with your child about the consequences of not telling the truth. "Michael, when you tell me you've done your homework and then I find out you didn't, it makes me wonder whether I can trust you the next time. I want to be able to trust you more than I want you to do your homework." Finally, don't give your child many chances to lie. If you see spilled milk on the floor and ask, "Who spilled the milk?" you can almost expect that your child will answer, "I didn't." If you ask, "How did the milk spill?" you're likely to get a straight answer.

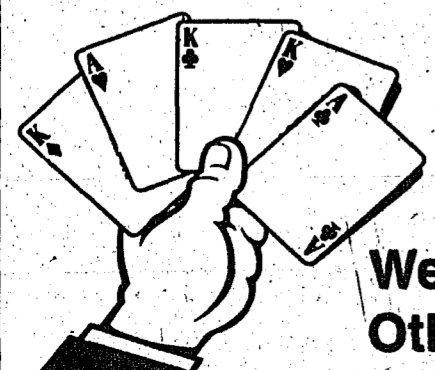

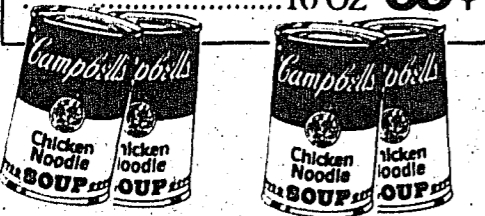
