## Wildlife Officials Optimistic About Spring Turkey Season

**BALLINGER**--Coming off a banner production year and taking into consideration prime range conditions, state wildlife officials are forecasting an excellent upcoming spring turkey season in Texas.

"Hunters should see lots of birds," offered Dr. Marcus Peterson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). Production last year was way above average, particularly in the Edwards Plateau, so there'll be lots of jakes on the ground. I would also expect there to be a lot of mature gobblers out there, too.

Rio Grande turkey hunting season opens March 28 in South Texas runs through May 3, and begins in the remaining counties having a spring turkey season on April 3 and runs through May 10.

In addition to possessing a valid Texas hunting license, turkey hunters are required to purchase a Special Turkey Hunting Stamp. The annual bag limit is four.

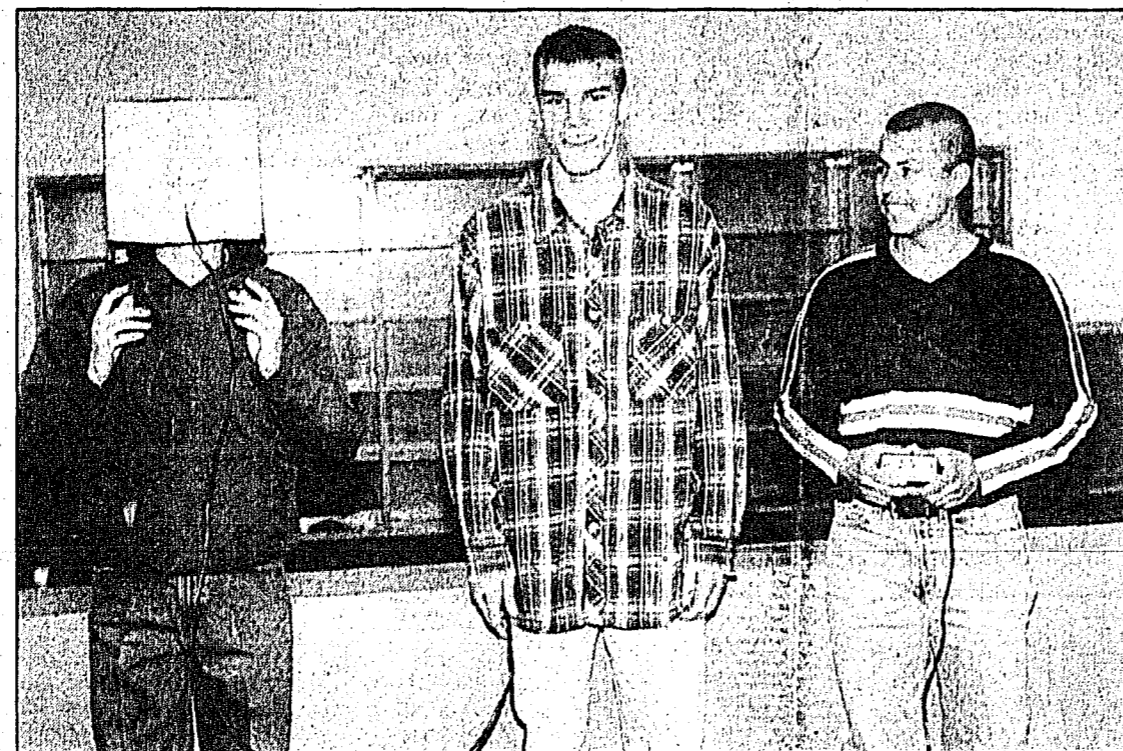
According to Ralph Suarez, a Ballinger based TPWD biologist, "We're expecting a real good hunt this spring. Things should get off to a quick start because gobblers are starting to talk already and range conditions are good."

Suarez states that during last year's hen/poult survey, a statewide field observation study which records the number of offspring accompanying hens, he was able to record the highest number of offspring produced from the past four to five years.

## Local Students Learn About Communication Technology

The Technology System's class at Santa Anna High School created "cyborg communication systems". It consisted of a sending unit (switch box) and a receiving unit (light emitting diodes and resistors mounted inside a helmet (box)). A student, Jesse Castillo is pictured, would control the cyborg unit, Clay Crossley in picture, by setting various switches to turn LEDs off and on inside the helmet. Dustin Maedgen is pictured untangling the wires. The student inside the helmet will respond to the commands by reading the combinations of the various LEDs that were on. Each group of students built their own cyborg unit and designed their own communication effectively. The student inside the helmet could not see where he was going, so he had to rely on the controller with the sending unit to give him commands. Each team had to guide their cyborg around the room by moving forward, backward, turn left, turn right, pick up objects, shake hands and sit down. Since each team designed a different code to do these tasks, there could be no effective communication made up with members from two different teams. The students learned the importance of standardization for communications. Communication technology is one of four major units of study in the technology systems class.

## Great Texas Trash-Off Sat. Santa Anna Presbyterian Church To Participate

Texas will be cleaner and greener on April 4, when more than 82,000 volunteers scour state highways, county roads and city streets and parks in the 13th annual Great Texas Trash-Off.

Statewide, 1,840 Adopt-A-Highway groups will pick up litter on state roadways. Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers in 100 communities will concentrate their cleanups on city streets and parks. Altogether, the volunteers expect to collect more than 6.8 million gallons of litter.

One of the nation's largest single-day litter pickup events, the Trash-Off is organized by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB). The one-day event reminds people of the state's natural beauty by providing cleaner, safer roads, streets and parks.

"Thousands of Texans are turning their convictions into action by

giving their Saturday to clean up their communities," said Doris Howdeshell, director of TxDOT's Travel Division. "These volunteers are role models. We hope the sense of pride they foster will cause their neighbors and visitors to stop and think before they litter."

The Great Texas Trash-Off is part of the TxDOT's "Don't Mess with Texas" public awareness program. The litter prevention program, which includes Don't Mess with Texas, Adopt-a-Highway, and a grassroots partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., works to change the attitudes--and the behavior--of would-be litterers. By reducing the amount of trash on state highways, these programs are saving taxpayers \$2-\$4 million in litter pickup expenditures each year.

According to a TxDOT official, the Santa Anna Presbyterian Church will be the only group to be participating locally.

## Stenholm Announces Two New RC&D Districts; Coleman In Concho Valley

WASHINGTON, D. C.--Congressman Charlie Stenholm announced the approval of two new Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Districts: The Chisholm RC&D in Bowie and the Concho Valley RC&D in Brady.

"Locally-led RC&Ds understand local needs and problems and have done a great job providing technical and financial assistance to rural America," said Stenholm. "In a time of shrinking budgets and scarce federal dollars, I am excited about the potential these new RC&Ds will have for improving the quality of life in West Texas."

The RC&D Program is administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and offers technical and financial assistance from the U. S. Department of Agriculture for

conservation and water management projects and expansion of economic, cultural and recreational opportunities.

Projects are led by RC&D boards or councils comprised of volunteers from the private sector and local government. Board and council members identify local problems and develop and carry out plans to solve those problems. The NRCS provides a full-time coordinator for each authorized RC&D Council, in addition to other direct support.

"Among the RC&D projects which have been proposed and undertaken are proposals to improve rural water distribution, prevent soil erosion on cropland, upgrade municipal solid waste facilities, improve medical and health care, create business opportunities through

Author Monroe Roberts, 82, and his wife, Loraine Roberts, 85, died following the accident which occurred shortly after 5 p.m. at the intersection of U. S. Highway 67-84 and North Eighth Street, as known as the Rockwood Highway.

Mr. Roberts was pronounced dead at the scene by Coleman County

Justice of the Peace Nance Campbell. Mrs. Roberts was transported by First-Flite air ambulance helicopter to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene. She died at approximately 10 p.m. Thursday evening.

Santa Anna Police Officer Wayne Robbins said the 1995 Buick LeSabre driven by the Roberts was heading north and attempted to turn left on the highway. He pulled out in front of an eastbound Peterbilt

truck driven by Christopher Paul Ryan of Zephyr. The truck was owned by Ryan and his father.

According to Robbins, Witnesses said Ryan made every possible attempt to avoid colliding with the vehicle. He was unable to stop the 94,000 pound truck. He was uninjured.

Law enforcement officials said this is the first traffic fatality in Coleman County this year.
