Cemetery Association Struggling With Excessive Water Usage

The Santa Anna Cemetery Association held their quarterly meeting June 11 at 2 p.m. in the home of Ken and Coyita Bowker. All directors of the association were present including, Coyita Bowker, Wanda Campbell, Carmen Donham, Billie Guthrie, Oma Dean Horner, John Pearce and Virginia Powell.

All of the old water lines have been "shut-off" and new water lines installed, thanks to the caretaker Mike Pritchard and his crews.

The main item of discussion was the tremendous water bill being paid by the Association. Directors have met with the City Council in May and June where the Council suggested we allow for those who want to water their lot to do so three (3) days a week between certain hours.

The Association agreed, on a trial basis, to have watering be done from Friday at 6:30 a.m. to Monday at 6:30 a.m. with the gates open from 6:30 a.m. until 9 p.m. each day. These times and dates will go into effect as soon as signs are posted on the gate.

The Cemetery operates on donations and interest gained by perpetual care accounts, as mandated by the State of Texas. To help with expenses the cost of opening and closing graves has been increased from \$25.00 to \$50.00.

The Association directors are open to suggestions and public comments.

The directors will be meeting as a group with the City Council at their July meeting to seek other solutions to the financial problems of the cemetery.

Blessed With More Rain



Early Thursday morning Santa Anna received some much needed rainfall which was accompanied by high winds.

Total rainfall for that period amounted to one and a half inches. Numerous trees, limbs and out buildings in town received damage.

Friday afternoon late rain once again returned. Santa Anna received an inch. The Whom Community gauged an inch while Rockwood only received a half inch.

That same evening a storm which struck in Trickham dropped from four inches up (some gauges ran over). This storm was accompanied by extremely high winds and pea sized hail with a few being nearer golf ball size.

Jackie Kirven's Quick Response Helps Rescue Child From Moving Vehicle

Santa Anna native Jackie Kirven was thinking quickly recently when he went to the rescue of a small child behind the wheel of a moving vehicle.

A 1994 graduate of Santa Anna High School, Kirven and Patti Musick, also a Santa Anna resident, were taking a group of patients home after completing their work on May 4 at 2:30 in the afternoon. Kirven and Musick are employed with MHMR in Coleman.

Upon arrival at the corner of College and San Marcos, Musick noticed a pickup rolling down the street and after a second look realized a small child was behind the wheel with no adult in sight.

Slamming on the brakes, Musick got out and began running after the pickup when suddenly Kirven flew passed her as if she was standing still.

Kirven reached the pickup just a second or two after it struck the railroad crossing pole and bounced back. The outside mirror struck him a hard blow as it bounced back. Without a hesitation, he grabbed the door handle, opened the door,

took the child in his arms and set the pickup's brakes.

Both Musick and Kirven said the child was very frightened and almost hysterical. Musick immediately began to search for the parents

with Kirven working to calm the child.

The mother of the child was found and realizing the child was not physically harmed, she could not thank the duo enough. How the child got behind the wheel was not clear. A police officer from the nearby police station was soon on the scene assisting.

Although from beginning to end the time span was only minutes and what could have been a disaster turned out to be a happy ending.

Jean Findley was appointed Mayor Pro-Tem.

The Council agreed to an ordinance to re-establish the Chief of Police and abolish the Police Commission.

City Council Discusses Traffic Lights, Approves Burn Ban

The Santa Anna City Council met on Tuesday, June 9 for their regular monthly meeting. Council members present were Mayor Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, Jean Findley and David Powell. Others present were Doug Watson, Cindy Pelton, Carlos Torres, Rusty Wells, Billie Guthrie, Celeste Simmons, Sam Schwann and Bryan Raschke.

Billie Guthrie discussed water usage at the cemetery. The Council determined that there is not enough data to grant a set billing at this time. A recommendation was made that the Cemetery Association limit watering to three days a week. The Council also made a decision to offer a bill extension.

Sam Schwann and Bryan Raschke of the Texas Department of Transportation presented a proposal for signal lights at the intersection of Wallis and Highway 283 and Wallis and FM 1176 and the removal of the traffic light at the intersection of Wallis and Second Street. TXDOT has done a traffic survey of the intersections and the lights are warranted. Costs would be \$123,000.00 at Highway 283 and \$90,000.00 at FM 1176. These figures include the signal lights, construction, and an easement cost. Funds for disadvantaged counties are available and the City will look into these funds to help with the cost of the lights.

Police Officer Carlos Torres gave the police report for the month of May and complaints of personnel harassment were brought to the attention of the police department.

Court Clerk Cindy Pelton gave the court report for May. There

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

A Burn Ban Ordinance and the City Investment Policy were introduced and passed. The burn ban states that it will be unlawful for any person to burn or attempt to burn paper, combustible material or trash of any kind within the city limits. This not preclude the proper use of devices of metal, brick, rock or other non-combustible material designed for and being used for cooking or barbecuing foods. Violation is subject to up to \$200 fine.

Doug Watson, Director of Public Works reported a 22% water loss for the month of May. Water usage was up 1,750,000 with fewer active meters compared to last May.

Watson told the Council of the inspection of the water plant. The City has six months to be in compliance with TNRC regulations on the storage tanks which include sand blasting, painting and placing the city logo on the mountain tank.

The new Chain of Command was presented. All city employees will be required to sign a copy, with the copy placed in their personnel files. In the chain all City employees have someone to answer to. Officer Wayne Robbins to Chief Carlos Torres; court clerk Cindy Pelton to Judge Bill Worley; as assistant city secretary she answers to city secretary Alys Pelton; City crew and water plant operator to Superintendent Doug Watson. According to information received, all employees will ultimately answer to Watson, Mayor Morris and the City Council.

Watson has conferred with the TNRC about the legalities of burying trash and such on private property. Numerous citizens complaints have been received on this and Watson was informed it is illegal to bury anything in the ground.

A citizen has asked about closing an alley on North Third Street. She will be put on the agenda for future discussion.

Celeste Simmons requested permission for the Chamber of Commerce to have a dance at the Armory next month. The Police Department agreed to patrol the area during the dance and the Council had no objections. Simmons also was given approval to seek grants for repairs of the armory.

The Council informed Superintendent Doug Watson that he could seek property to locate a city barn.

Coleman County Electric Cooperative To Observe 60th Anniversary Friday

Coleman County Electric Cooperative will be observing 60 years of service to this area on Friday, June 19. An open house reception for the public is planned for Friday, June 19 at the Cooperative Office in Coleman from 1 to 3 p.m. Everyone is invited to come by for refreshments and visit with employees, directors and friends.

Coleman County Electric Cooperative began bringing electric service to the rural areas of Coleman, Runnels and surrounding counties in 1938. The Cooperative began serving rural consumers in central Coleman County and later expanded into Runnels County. Today the Cooperative serves member consumers in Coleman, Runnels, Coke, Concho, Tom Green, Brown, Callahan, and Taylor counties. Currently the Cooperative provides service to 8,000 meters through 3,700 miles of electric line in these eight counties. Coleman County Electric Cooperative is owned entirely by these members who receive the Cooperative services. They select their representatives to a nine member Board of Directors from all across the service area. These nine Directors are responsible for setting policy and direction for the Cooperative.

The Board employs a General Manager, who in turn employs their employees to carry out all duties of operating the Cooperative.

The Cooperative way of doing business differs from other utilities, such as an investor owned utility, in many ways. First the entire business is owned by local consumers who use the service. It is directed by a group of Directors, who also are local, and receive service from the Cooperative. It is a non-profit organization where all margins at the end of the year are assigned back to each individual consumer's account. Out of state

investors, and out of state directors do not have any part in the operation of Coleman County Electric Cooperative. The Cooperative is financed totally by the members use of electricity, and funds borrowed from a National Cooperative owned bank called National Rural Utilities Cooperation Finance Cooperation. Coleman County Electric Cooperative is no longer a part of the Department of Agriculture's Rural Utility Service and uses no government funds.

Coleman County Electric Cooperative is actively involved in each community in the service area

in many ways. Directors and employees are also involved in many school and community activities.
