Commissioners Appoint Two Local Residents To Board

Coleman County Commissioners met Monday morning.

They unanimously appointed three new members to the Coleman County Child Welfare Board including two Santa Anna residents. Pat Adams and Diane Smith of Santa Anna and Gay Underwood Morgan of Panther Creek will be serving two years along with current board members Claude Cervena and John Mark Weathered. Others who serve on the board are James Paul Bailey and Mary Griffin.

Commissioners were informed that Doodie Taylor-Knox, chairperson of the board was elected to serve on Region 2 Child Welfare Advisory Council. She will also be serving on the Region 2 of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Board.

Road sign installation was discussed. It was decided unanimously to hire additional part-time help to speed the placing of 9-1-1 road signs. Payment for this part-time help will come from the 9-1-1 Fund and not county funds.

Kay LeMay will be publishing a Condensed Statement of Receipts and Disbursements following agreement by the Commissioners.

Mark Berry has filled the jailer's position vacated by Jerry Dawson.

The Valera Volunteer Fire Department will be building another fire truck building on county property.

The County Sheriff's Office request to replace an area of fence around the jail. The fence is rotting, metal fencing will cost approximately \$1,300. The sheriff's office request was approved.

A discussion about the air conditioning in the courthouse. The system has been temporarily repaired. Judge Sherrill Ragsdale reported he was advised that unit should run continuously during the week and be turned off on weekends. At this time cost of a new air conditioning system would be approximately

Bill were reviewed and approved for payment. No transfers were requested by County Auditor Shirley Sansing.

Concho Glory Racers To Perform At Gouldbusk Arena Saturday Morning

The Concho Glory Racers of San Angelo (barrel racers) are scheduled to be at the Gouldbusk Arena Saturday, July 19. The program will begin at 9 a.m. with a worship service and activities following.

A concession stand will be available.

Concho Glory Racers was organized several years ago with 11 members. Through the years, the membership has grown. It is an organization for those who love the Lord and the rodeo sport of barrel racing.

The Glory Racers began when Shirley Dyches saw an ad in a barrel racing magazine for a national Christian barrel racing association. Although limited to Arizona, Nevada and California, the group took a small number of West Texas women into its fold and helped the Glory Racers get started.

In 1990, the group broke away from the national association, opting instead to go out on their

own and spread the Word across the West Texas barrel racing circuit.

A typical Glory Racers event begins when the books open. An hour later, entries are closed and a brief worship service begins. The group does not know if the racers it's reaching are church or not, so the message is one of salvation.

Each barrel used in competition bears a simple message. "Glory to God," "Jesus is Lord" and "Praise His Name". The bright red letters on the white barrels provide a stark contrast to the arena's soil.

Everyone is invited out to the Gouldbusk Rodeo Arena Saturday to watch the Concho Glory Racers' program and competition.

Development Screening Slated July 28 In Coleman

A developmental screening for children ages zero to three will be conducted at the First United Methodist Church in Coleman from 2 to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, July 28.

The Denver Developmental Screening which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas: personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays has proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers.

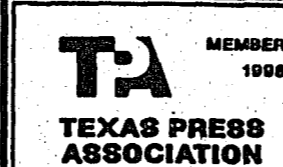

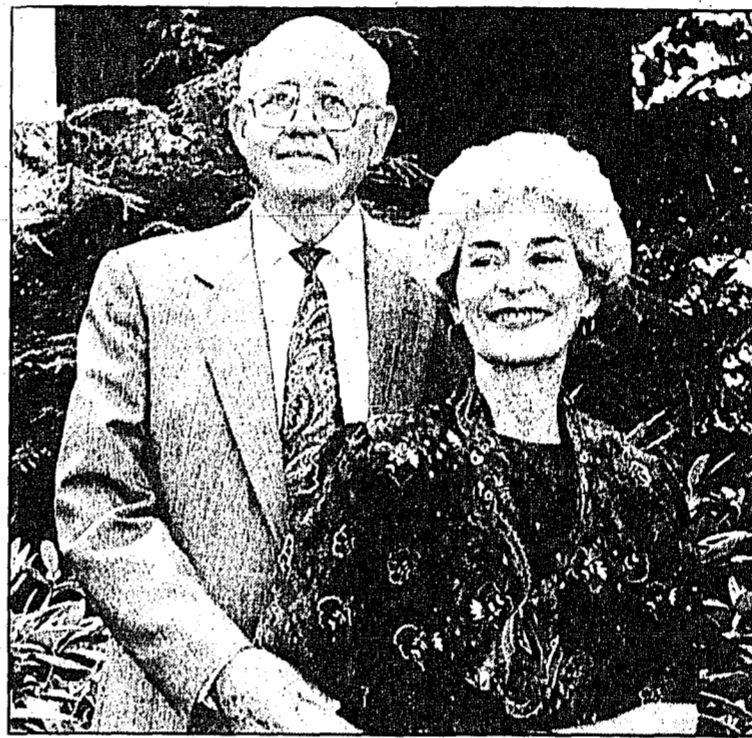
