## The Old Buggy

When I was about ten years old Anna in Coleman County, Texas, would often visit my Grandmothe
Woodward who lived in Anna. Her next door neightars were the Coverwells. They were both elderly and had a buggy in their barn that had been stored there
after it had been replaced by the after it had been replaced by the car.
When my brother, Tom and I would visit the Coverwells, we would
look the buggy over from one end to the other. It was a fine buggy in set of harness on the seat.
Tom and I were really fascinated old cowhorses, Rollo, had pulled a buggy when he was young, we wanted that buggy. Two young,
adventurous boys set out to convince their dad that they needed that buggy. Dad finally said we could buy the buggy if the Coverwells would sell it and if we had enough
money. That was in the early thirties and times were hard.
We finally got up never enough
to ask Mr. Coverwell if he would to ask Mr. Coverwell if he would
sell the buggy and if sell the buggy and if so how much
he would take for it. Since it has been an expensive buggy and was in excellent condition, we just knew the price would be way out of
our financial means. We had our financial means. We had
pooled all our money and had pooled all our money and had
twenty-seven dollars. That was lots of money in those days and we just knew it wouldn't be enough.
Mr. Coverwell looked ove Mr. Coverwell looked over those old and real slowly said, "Five dollars". How surprised and thrilled we were." We immediately gave him see the other twenty-two dollars. We could hardly wait until we could go home and ride Rollo back buggy. buggy.

neighbor of us had ever put bug neighbor of us had ever put buggy
harness on a horse, it took a while, but we finally got Rollo harnessed. We. hooked Rollo up to the buggy and since it was getting hol,
we put the buggy top up. Rollo we put the buggy top up. Rollo
worked just fine and two proud littee boys drove right down the main street of Santa Anna in our newly
accuired method of acquired method of transportation.

When we got to the ranch, we
drove to the barn and as we went around the barn, two young horses that we had just started breaking took one look at the new contrap-
tion and over the fence they went. tion and over the fence they went.
We had a great time for several months taking our friends riding in the buggy, and we'd even go in the buggy to pen the milk cows.
Rollo was old and we began to real ize that we were working him too hard and we needed a replacement
for him. We had severa for him. We had several good ranch horses that we used work catlle so
we picked Sundown as Rollo's re we picked Sundown as Rollo's re-
placement.
Sundown was about four years old and was the gentlest one of the cowhorses. We knew we had to break him to a wagon first
before we could hook him buggy. Even though we were only nine and ten years old, we had had a
lot of experience with horses lot of experience with horses. We
hitched two of our work horses to hitched two of our work horses to a
wagon and drove out to the of a big field. Tom drove the wagon and I rode another horse and
led Sundown. We took the hose led Sundown. We took the harness
off one horse and put it on off one horse and put it on
Sundown and hitched him to the wagon next to the other horse. rode next to Sundown on my horse
with a lead rope so 1 could help with a a lead rope so I could help
hold him, and we had him hold him, and we h
good in a short time.
We worked Sundown to the
wagon for several wagon for several days and decided
he was ready for the bugy. Tom he was ready for the buggy. Tom
drove the buggy out in the middle drove the buggy out in the middle
of the big field and I led Sundown. We changed harness and hitched Sundown to the buggy. I was on my -horse and lad a lead rope on
Sundown to help hold him if he Sundown to help hold him if he
tried to run away with the buggy. tried to run away with the buggy.
Sundown was a little spooky at first and tried to run a few times, but with Tom in the buggy and me
holding him from holding him from my horse, he was
easy to slow down. We worked Sundown all morning in the big field and unharnessed him at noon. We worked him again that after-
noon and he was sure going good noon and he was sure going good
and Ididn't need my horse to help
out. Sut.

a big pasture. Sundown was running as fast as he could go and even

him around some of the tres and bushes, but he wasn't slowing down. We went down a little hill and Sundown made a quick turn to the left and the buggy skidded into a
