Breakfast will be served each morning beginning at 7:30 a.m. until 7:50 a.m. This is also when the doors to the elementary building will be opened for children to enter the building.

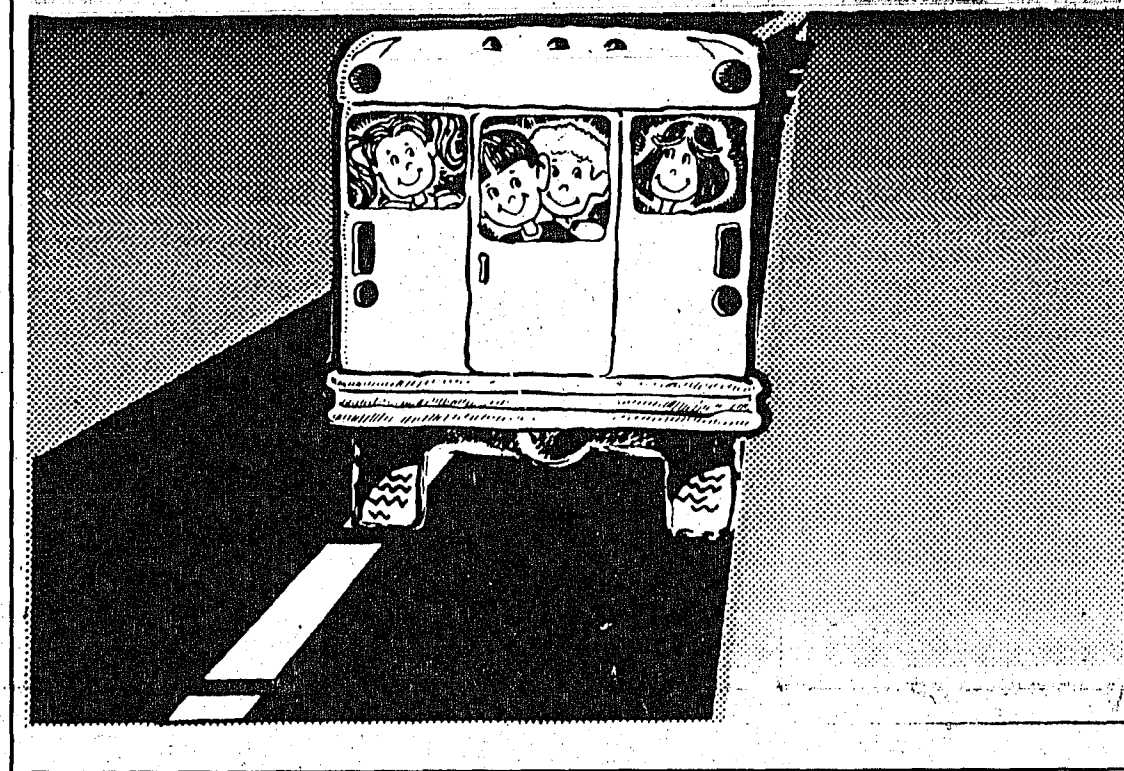
Faculty and staff returned to the classroom on Wednesday and Thursday for a teacher workday.

## Coleman County Commissioners Adopt Agreement With Harris County

Coleman County Commissioners met Monday morning for their regular meeting.

Meeting a prospective new county agent topped the agenda but was rescheduled for the next meeting.

The Interlocal Agreement with Harris County was approved. This allows Coleman County to purchase major items, at the same rate as Harris County, therefore saving money.

A Budget Hearing was set for August 17 at 8 a.m. in the county courthouse.

Commissioners adopted the Resolution for the tobacco settlement recently reached by the State of Texas. The local hospital district will receive \$171,000.

The 9-1-1 signs are being installed in each precinct. There will be over 1,000 poles and 2,000 signs located around the county when completed. Cost of \$60,000 was paid out of 9-1-1 funds which are collected on telephone bills.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing presented and received approval for bills for General Fund \$19,630; Road & Bridge Fund \$4,069; and total for all four precincts \$10,571.

## CAP School Officials Say TEA Rating Misleading

CAP HIGH SCHOOL—Information regarding the accountability rating of CAP High School was recently released by certain media sources in this area. These sources reported that CAP High School received an "Unacceptable" rating by the Texas Education Agency. This information is in error.

CAP High School in Coleman County is not currently, nor has it ever, received an "unacceptable" accountability rating from the Texas Education Agency. Any alternative campus in Texas receives one of two ratings, under the current system being used by the state: "Acceptable" or "Needing Peer Review". CAP High School is currently rated "Acceptable" based upon the performance data submitted for the 1996-97 school year. Performance data for the 1997-98 school year has been submitted to the Texas Education Agency. A new rating, based upon this data, will be released after Sept. 3, 1998.

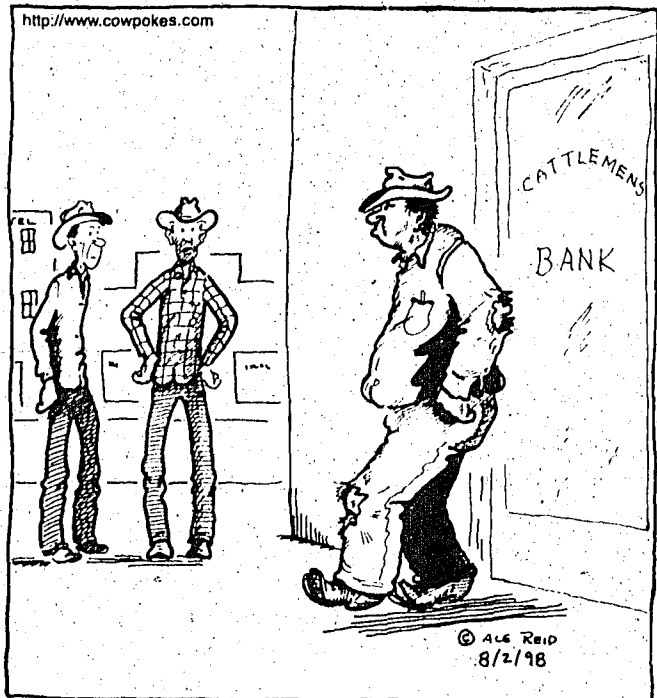

## Coleman County Added To Emergency Haying List

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved another 16 counties for emergency haying or grazing on acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program. Coleman County was among those added to the list. This brings the total number of counties approved in Texas to 104, accounting for 3.4 million acres in CRP. Texas has over 3.6 million acres in CRP.

Other additional counties are Baylor, Brooks, Callahan, Coryell, Fannin, Franklin, Frio, Grayson, Hemphill, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Karnes, Roberts, Rusk and Terry.

"The disaster designation for Texas counties does not apply to emergency grazing or haying of CRP acreage," said Perry. "Counties wanting approval for haying or grazing must show at least 40 percent loss in normal hay

and pasture production as well as precipitation levels 40 percent below normal."

In May, Perry requested that the USDA grant a waiver to allow Texas producers to hay and graze CRP land to provide forage for livestock and to help remove a source fuel for potential wildfires. The waiver to graze was granted in June. In July, counties that were approved at that time for grazing, were also approved for emergency haying.

CRP participants in an approved county must request and receive approval from their local Farm Service Agency office prior to grazing or haying eligible acreage.

CRP participants that do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the haying privilege to an eligible livestock producer in an approved county. Eligible participants cannot hay and graze the same acreage nor can the CRP hay be sold.

According to the U.S. Treasury Department, more than 65 percent of these payments are now made by Direct Deposit, and the numbers are increasing every month.

The federal government has been offering Direct Deposit as an option to Social Security, and other federal benefit recipients for more than 20 years. In 1996,

Congress passed a law aimed at requiring most federal payments to be made by electronic transfer.

The law intends to enroll most check recipients in Direct Deposit by the end of this year, but it also

allows the Treasury Department to extend waivers to individuals for a variety of reasons. Treasury emphasizes that no payment will be withheld or delayed for any reason, and payment recipients do not have to take any action now. More specific information will be available from Treasury later this summer.

"All federal beneficiaries will continue to receive their payment by check, unless—and until—they give us instructions to have those payments made by Direct Deposit into an account of their choice,"

said John D. Hawke, Treasury Under Secretary for Domestic Finance.

"We recognize that there are many circumstances in which federal benefit recipients will not be able to take advantage of Direct Deposit right away. We intend to give people plenty of opportunity to determine whether Direct Deposit makes sense for them."

Financial service providers' promotion of direct deposit among account holders and cash consumers has created some confusion about the specific requirements—and deadlines—that will affect federal payments.

Under Secretary Hawke said the Treasury Department will not tolerate any organization making false or misleading statements about the government's direct deposit program. Treasury will alert regulators about financial service providers it believes are misleading beneficiaries in an attempt to alarm beneficiaries into signing up for a specific service.

In addition to offering beneficiaries a safe, simple and secure way to get their federal payments, Direct Deposit will save taxpayers as much as \$100 million annually in processing costs. The cost to process a Direct Deposit payment is approximately four cents, while the cost to process a paper check is 45 cents.

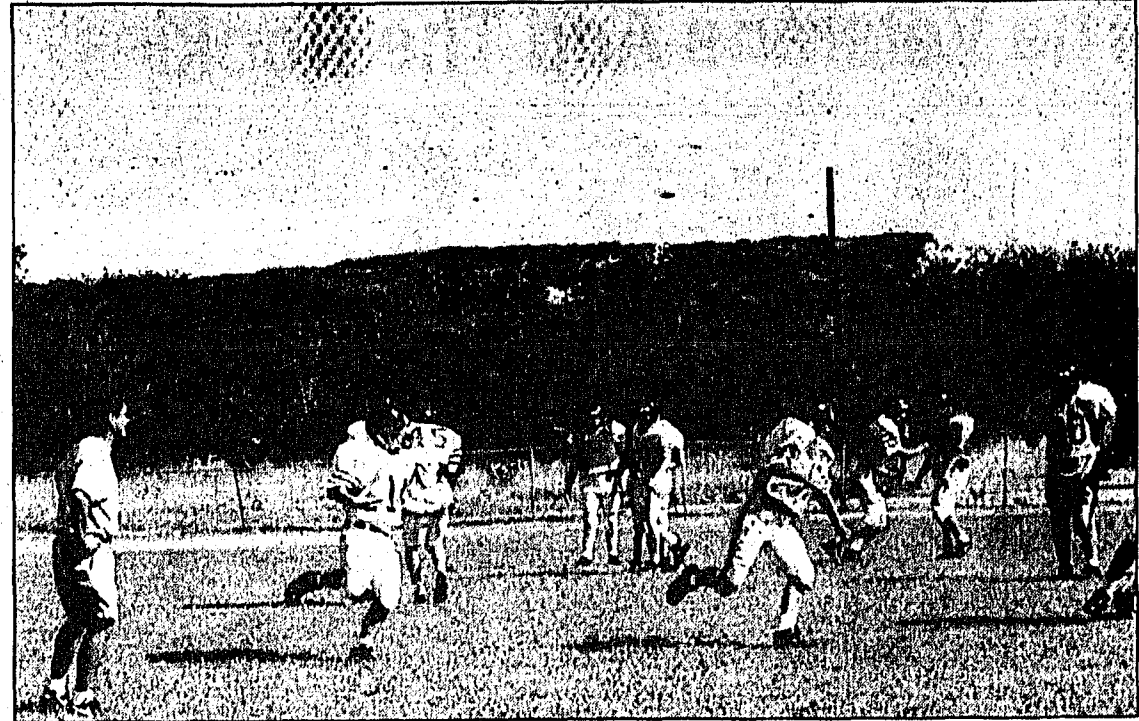

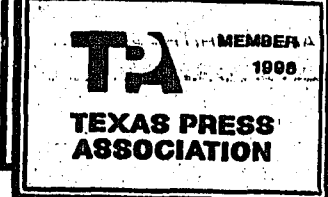


